

W.H. Lemons Jr. ... wage-hour director retires

W.H. Lemons Jr., Houston area director of the Labor Department's Wage and Hour Division, retired at the end of June after almost a quarter of a century in government service.

Lemons, 55, said he will be starting his own consulting business in the field of labor

A native of Sanderson, Lemons has been with the Wage ar and Hour Division since 1950 and has been the area director in charge of the Houston office since September 1962.

He was previously with the Wage and Hour Division in San Antonio and Tyler.

The Wage and Hour Division is responsible for enforcing wage and hour laws, including equal pay and age discrim ination in employment acts.

Lemons said that in his years with the division, the biggest change he has seen is the increase in the number of persons covered by his division.

When he began, that number was about 15 million. Today, it is about 60 million workers.

According to Lemons, there are already enough wage and hour laws, but the problem is compliance with such existing statutes.

Lemons holds a business administration degree from Texas Tech which he received in 1940. He was in private industry until 1944 when he entered the Army. Later he worked three and a half years in Lubbock as a representative for the Veterans Administration.




