Governor Dolph Briscoe sent out a resolution urging all citizens of the state that are eligible to be sure they are registered for voting and then to vote on November 5, the date of the general election. There is also an appeal to all voters who have moved since the last election to be sure that they are registered in the precinct of their new residence.

There is no way that the governor, television, newspapers, or word of mouth could stress too strongly the importance of people voting in the general election.

Your vote in the Democratic or Republican Primary is completely meaningless if you do not vote in the general election. In fact your vote in the primary election could be nullified by a write-in campaign unless you support the nominee of the primary -- which you promised to do at the time you marked the ballot in the primary election. The state has so held in previously contested decision -- according to information that we have read -- and a ballot in the primary that did not have the "party loyalty oath" was a void ballot and was not to have been counted. So there is the moral obligation of the primary voter to support the candidate nominated in the general election.

It is most discouraging to hear stories of abuse of food stamp purchases by some of the users -- it is almost sickening, even, to know that people who claim qualification for the purchase of the food stamps would have no better set of values than to use the stamps for large purchases of cold drinks, candy, etc., instead of good food. It causes a person to wonder!

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## Terrell County Is Brucellosis Free

Dr. H.Q. Sibley, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt designating Terrell County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area.

This recognition signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time, and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area, all herds of cattle must be blood tested and found negative or at least 10% of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slaughter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.

The Animal Health Commission expresses its appreciation to the livestock producers and all persons responsible for the cooperation extended to its representatives while in the county doing the testing. Now that Certified Free status has been obtained it is important to all producers to maintain the nationally recognized status of the county.

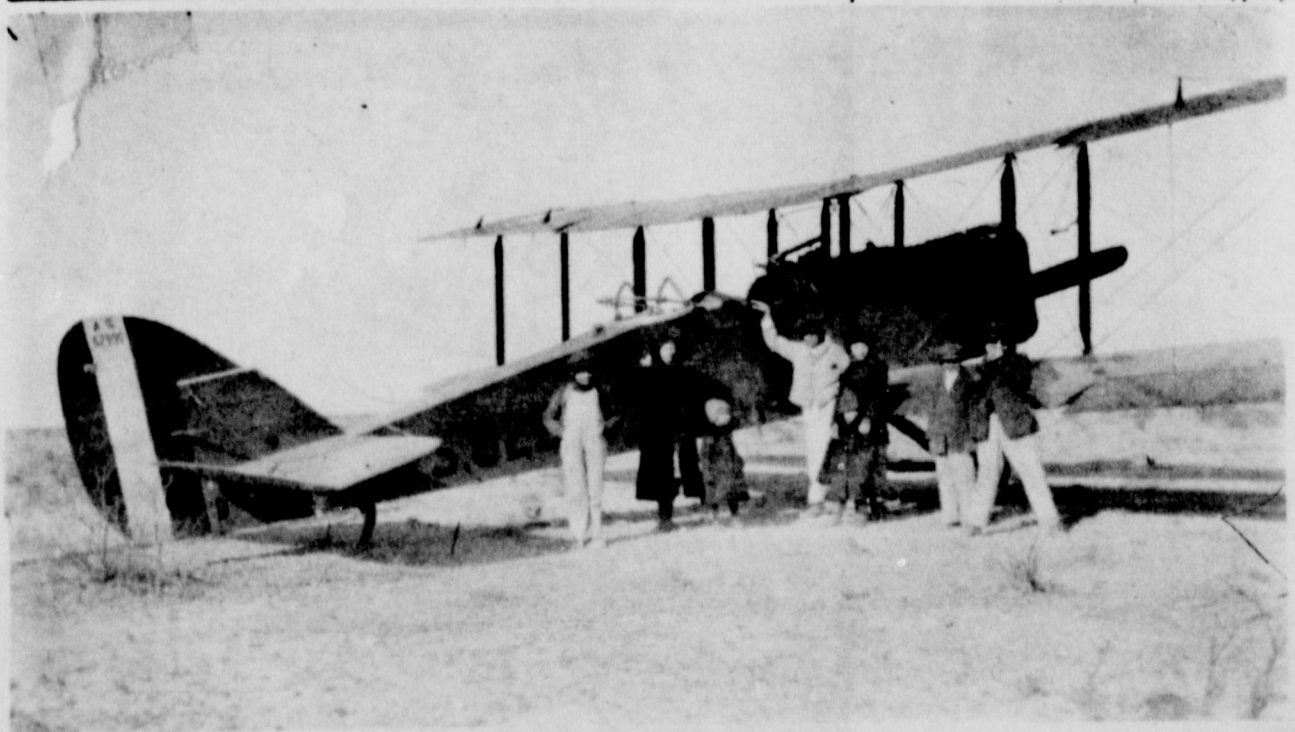
Intermittent showers fell all day Tuesday and Tuesday night, with Wednesday morning dawning with showers and heavy overcast.

So many of us mortals like to think that we have a clear-cut set of principles that we are willing to live by -- and even die by. Our thoughts about fairness, probably, are the ones that would stand little scrutiny. Our ideas about the fairness with which we individually and collectively treat people sometimes are in direct conflict with the way we would like to be treated or demand that others treat us!

Materials are being brought in for the re-surfacing of some local streets and for seal-coating the others. The work will do much to preserve and protect the investment of the county and property owners of several years back when the local streets were first surfaced. The most economical time to do this work is when there is some seal-coating being done in this immediate vicinity and the crews and equipment are here for a state highway job. The current project is in keeping with this practice.

Not a direct relationship to this project, but related nevertheless, is the chore, expense, trouble, etc., of all the work of keeping the local garbage dump location suitably well kept to keep department of health, environmental agencies, etc., from forcing the county to do it their way. This involves a lot of effort, time, trouble, and expense, but another of those deals where it is probably much better than some alternate ways would be.

the levels shown are eligible for free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria, but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may

be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for the benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, Mrs. E.J. Hanson, school nurse, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Supt. Carroll B. Card, P.O. Box 747, phone 345-2515, 710 Fourth St., Sanderson.

The school district central office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

**AUSTIN** — Gloomy predictions of increasing natural gas shortages during winter months were made to southern governors at their conference here last week.

Federal Power Commissioner Don S. Smith reported major pipeline operators expect natural gas supplies to fall 9.6 per cent below demand.

Smith forecast gas pipeline curtailments this winter will be 81 per cent greater than last year.

To sustain present levels of gas consumption would require discovery of "a new Alaska every year," the federal agency official told the governors.

FPC, according to Smith, has taken these steps to relieve impact of the shortage:

- Entered an order to allow 2,400 of the 3,900 smaller gas producing companies to sell interstate gas at 63 cents per thousand cubic feet, instead of the 42 cent wellhead rate permitted major producers.

- Reinstated emergency provisions to allow utilities to buy gas through pipelines for 60-day periods at market rates rather than lower, regulated interstate rates.

Texas' Gov. Dolph Briscoe said the action would have little effect in Texas, where demands will keep prices far above the 63 cent rate.

**INFORMATION SOUGHT**—A Cleveland firm hired to survey tax values in 35 school districts sought tax appraisal and computer contracts with all 1,100 districts in the state.

Legislative Property Tax Committee Chairman Sen. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock said the solicitation seemed "inappropriate" to him.

LPTC staff members expressed some concern that the firm would be reporting to the state on data paid for by the district. The firm is being paid \$382,000 by the state for its data on market value of district properties.

Some LPTC members also complained about slowness in getting a recodification of property tax laws as a guide to legislative improvements.

**CRIME FIGHT MAPPED**—Atty. Gen. John Hill has called for establishment of a statewide grand jury and a central information bank as weapons in the fight on organized crime.

At a law enforcement conference, Hill said state and local law officers must cooperate to combat the increased threat of major crime.

Governor Briscoe, meanwhile, said he plans to propose to the legislature again in 1975 a law to permit wiretapping where ordered by a court to gather evidence of organized crime.

**DEPARTMENT SHAKEN**—Texas Department of Labor and Standards got its third assistant commissioner in a week's time.

Commissioner Jackie W. St. Clair named Kirby Suggs of the Houston regional office after (1) firing Tommy W. Smith and (2) temporarily elevating Bob Hubbard, son of AFL-CIO State President Harry Hubbard, to the post. Hubbard resumed his position as administrative assistant.

A total of 10 of the department's 40 employees were discharged at the same time by St. Clair, who pronounced their job performances "unsatisfactory."

**TEXAS AHEAD** — Texas leads the nation in the percentage increase of new business incorporations.

Secretary of State Mark White Jr. reported the number of business incorporations increased dramatically from 1,569 in May, 1973, to 2,513 in May, 1974. This is a 62 per cent increase for Texas, compared with a five per cent increase for the nation as a whole.

Coupled with the increase, however, is a rise in bankruptcies and business failures. There were 680 bankruptcy petitions filed during 1973 in the U.S. District Courts for the Western District of Texas—and 768 so far this year. May recorded an alltime peak of business failures—925—nationwide.

**APPOINTMENTS**—Speaker Price Daniel Jr. named Rep. Herman Lauhoff of Houston to House committees on revenue and taxation, natural resources and elections.

Daniel also named Rep. Chris Semos of Dallas to the House committee on appropriations, Rep. Phil Cates of Pampa to the committee on calendars and Rep. Jon Newton of Beeville to the committee on rules.

Susan Longley of Austin will manage Attorney General John Hill's campaign office.

Hill was reappointed chairman of the National Association of Attorneys General Consumer Protection Committee.

**TAX CUT TALKED**—Both Governor Dolph Briscoe and Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby have suggested sales tax rate cuts next year.

Briscoe called for elimination of the four per cent tax on utility bills.

Hobby, in a speech here, said he thinks the projected \$1.5 billion general revenue surplus will lead legislators to consider "very seriously" lowering the state sales levy in 1975.

Briscoe's proposal would take an \$80 million annual load off utility bills.

**AG OPINIONS**—The secretary of state may use statistical samplings or other reasonable means of determining adequacy of political party petitions for places on the ballot, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, the attorney general concluded:

- Laboratory reports on retail dairy products and ground beef are subject to disclosure.

- An unlicensed person can perform professional nursing acts under direct control or supervision of a physician.

- Child abuse case records revealing the identity of the complainant are excepted from disclosure requirements.

- A Senate sub-committee (consumer affairs) rule permitting executive sessions to get testimony or evidence or confer with counsel conflicts with the open meetings law.

- County commissioners may sell land belonging to the permanent school fund and distribute money to county school districts, but the districts may not pay back to the county funds to create a vocational school.

- Counties may contract for minor children's custodial care.

- City councils must call, within 60 days of a valid petition, an election under the firemen's and policemen's civil service act. Actual holding of the election must take place within a reasonable time.

- A justice of the peace may not delegate to any employee exercise of his constitutional or statutory judicial powers.

- Records of State Bar Grievance Committee proceedings are not subject to mandatory public disclosure under the open records act.

- The Workmen's Compensation Second Injury Fund may be deposited in an interest-bearing account.

- Wages must be paid at least semi-monthly and within 16 days after the day earned.

- Certain medical records of county hospitals may be protected from forced disclosure.

**SHORT SNORTS**

The Texas National Guard has been requested to take additional steps to increase security of federal arms and ammunition.

Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale reaffirmed his request for investigation into cost of each step in cattle raising.

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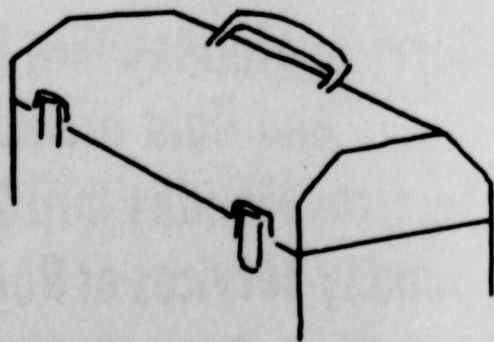
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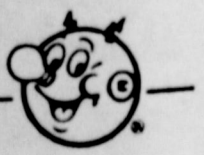

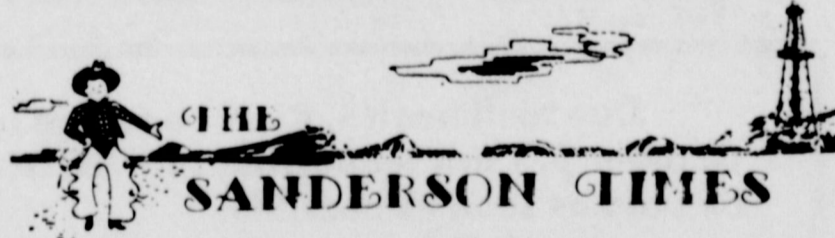

## 2, 4, 5-T Herbicide Okayed For Use

The Environmental Protection Agency's decision to cancel 2,4,5-T hearings is good news to Texas ranchers, John A. Matthews, chairman of the Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Committee, said today.

"We're relieved to see the EPA agree there is no case against 2,4,5-T" added Matthews, whose organization is supported by Texas ranchers who use 2,4,5-T and other herbicides to control brush that limits grass growth on Texas ranges.

Matthews was one of numerous witnesses scheduled to appear at the hearing, now cancelled. The TBCRI Committee he heads has actively opposed any move to cancel use of 2,4,5-T, arguing that its removal would significantly reduce the number of live-stock produced in Texas where brush has invaded 88 million acres of rangeland.

Ranchers who have used 2, 4,5-T extensively for the last 20 years without observing any adverse affect "on so much as a single head" of their range animals joined others in challenging the EPA to present indisputable scientific evidence of adverse effects before attempting to restrict use of 2,4,5-T, Matthews said.

## Voter Registration Week Sept. 16-21

Governor Dolph Briscoe signed proclamations denoting the week of Sept. 16-21 as Voter Registration Week and designating Tuesday, Nov. 5, 1974, as the date for the state-wide General Election.

In signing the proclamations the Governor urged all eligible Texas citizens to register to vote in order to insure maximum citizen participation in this year's important elections. He pointed out that the voters will be selecting all State officials, many members of the Texas Legislature, members of the U.S.

Congress and numerous county and local officials. "Only 30% of the registered voters cast their ballots in the May primaries," Governor Briscoe said. "I certainly hope that many more of our citizens will participate in the November elections and vote for the candidates of their choice. The right to vote is one of our greatest Constitutional privileges and I urge all Texans to exercise this right on Nov. 5."

All residents of the county that have moved since the last election are reminded from the governor's office to be sure that their registration has been changed if they are now in another precinct, or if they are in doubt about their precinct in which they live since the move. Persons who have moved from one precinct to another will not be allowed to vote unless they change their registration to the proper precinct and the registration in the new precinct of their residence must be made before a pre-voting date deadline.

### Soil Maps Available At SCS Office

The soil survey report of Terrell County, made by the Soil Conservation Service, has been published. A limited supply of these reports is in the Sanderson SCS Field Office. More reports will be received soon, and will be used by District Cooperators.

This soil survey contains information that can be applied in managing ranches; in selecting sites for roads, ponds, buildings, and other structures; and in judging the suitability of land for farming, industry, recreation, and wildlife.

All of the soils of Terrell County are shown on the detailed map at the back of the publication. On each sheet of the detailed map, soil areas are outlined and are identified by symbols.

Also given in the soil descriptions is a description of vegetation on each range site.

Scientists and teachers can read about how the soil is formed and how the soils are classified.

Newcomers in Terrell County will be interested in the general soil map where broad patterns of soil are described.
