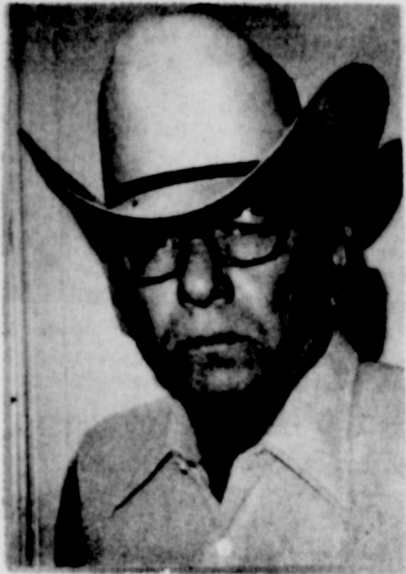
The news story has already been published! And the disappointment has been expressed by readers in their not noticing the importance of the story either!

This brought to mind an incident of several years ago, when we were told that there would be a "big secret" bit of news revealed to us in good time. That very week we published what was pretty much of a "routine" story as far as we were concerned, about a "pretty routine" bit of action by law enforcement officers, and when the story appeared in black and white, it was no real shock to most residents of the county, save the person who was saying it was a big secret. We were threatened with "going before the grand jury" to be forced to reveal our news source and blow the secrecy, but it soon came out that there was very little secrecy to begin with!

We normally are not easily "loaded", but there comes a time when people are anxious for some "good news", and we were gullible at that time for something that we could share with all of our neighbors that would be good news for us all.

This has absolutely nothing to do directly with the story, other than by association, but we had just gone through 10 days of rain that, while it was a blessing to most all of us in town, was a tremendous cost and inconvenience to many of our friends who live in the country, as well as a benefit to them, also. We, as most all other residents of Sanderson, had gone through 10 days of anxiety in watching the clouds to the west and alert to every possibility of high

## Absentee Voting Now Possible

Absentee balloting for the November 5th general election began Wednesday, October 16.

Terrell County residents expecting to be absent from the county on election day may vote by personal appearance during regular office hours in the office of County Clerk Ruel Adams, or secure an absentee ballot in an application by mail.

Friday, November 1, is the last day for absentee voting.

## Rain Damage Is Extensive

It was several days following the recent 10-day rains before an evaluation could be made of any damage done by high or swift water. Benefits could be easily ascertained by noting the amount of penetration of the moisture.

Severe damage was reported from some parts of the county to fencing, to roads, and pastures.

Besides the customary and usual loss of water gaps, some ranchmen reported heavy loss of fencing otherwise. Where fences paralleled draws and ran across draws where normally there is no loss or little loss of fencing, there has been a major loss of fencing and posts.

Damage to roads on ranches is considered very severe in some areas. Where there was any kind of run-off, the roads were either littered with large rocks, rutted severely, or eliminated by the deposits of gravel.

In some wide draws, all signs of vegetation were completely eliminated with the expanse of gravel increased appreciably causing the loss not only of some cover in the draws, but also the loss of forage and cover for possible increase or recovery of forage for livestock.

Large deposits of gravel in draws makes recovery of roads difficult and costly and has prevented, in some instances, the possibility of vehicular travel to some parts of some ranches.

There has been the revitalization of some springs in the county that had either subsided or disappeared, to mark some of the benefits of the rains, and doubtless there has been a recharging of underground water supplies over most all of the county.

Specific damage was noted by Mr. and Mrs. Vic Littleton to their home in Dryden. A leak in the roof caused a saturation of insulation material in the attic which caused the ceiling to collapse, causing extensive damage consequent to furniture and household goods in the house. Some damage has also been noted to exterior walls of adobe that did not have a plaster protective coating, causing portions of the wall to crumble after complete saturation of moisture.

## 1" Rain Monday, More At Dryden

About one inch of rainfall was gauged by Sanderson residents Monday morning early. Loud thunder and heavy lightning preceded the rainfall which began about 2:40 a.m. Monday.

For a short period, there was an extremely heavy downpour of rain, but later the precipitation was steady and much lighter.

About one and a half inches of rainfall was reported at Dryden earlier than the rainfall here, and it was also reported that there was a twister in that area, but no damage was reported.

## Eagles Top Wink 20-19 There Friday

The Sanderson Eagles topped the Wink Wildcats by one point in their meeting there Friday night of last week. It was a closely-matched game, a fact revealed both in the score and in the play.

Wink drew first blood when Raleigh Morton scored from five yards out in the first period and Mauricio Luna kicked the extra point to give the host Wildcats a 7-0 lead.

Sanderson had two touchdowns in the second period, both within 44 seconds of the end of the first half. Quarterback Marvin Davis threw a pass to Ricky Marquez good for 26 yards and six points, with the second coming only 11 seconds of the half-time buzzer on a six-yard scoring pass from Davis to Bernie Castro. Kendall Billings kicked extra points after each of the scores to give the Eagles a half-time lead of 14-7.

Carlos Munoz scored on 67-yard run in the third period, and the try for the extra point was not good.

In the final period Wink scored two touchdowns. They

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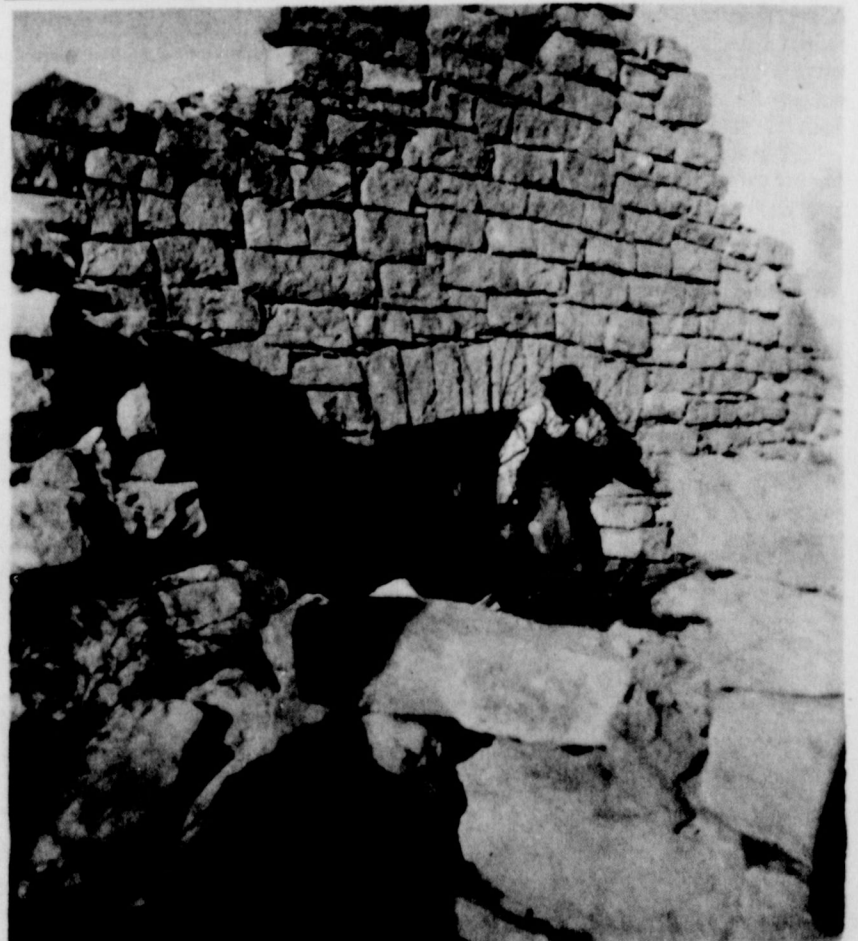
## Survey Crew To Check Dam Site For Possible Change

A survey crew of the Soil Conservation Service is scheduled to be here next week to make a re-appraisal of the location of a flood control structure on the W.G. Downie ranch north of Sanderson, according to information received by The Times. The work of the survey crew on the possible re-location of the structure was initiated "from the top of the organization", according to the news source.

Site 7, a structure proposed to be located in the canyon above the house of Mr. and Mrs. Downie, is 49 feet high, according to plans submitted several years ago when the crews from the SCS spent several weeks in this area in their selection and designation of proposed sites for water-retaining structures to control flood waters into Sanderson Canyon. This site became the center of local attention recently when a letter bearing the names of Mr. and Mrs. Downie was mailed to all box-holders in the county. The letter called attention to the possible inconvenience, cost in operation of their ranch, and hazard to their home and lives by the situation of the structure in that place. Their contention as stated in the letter was that there was possibly another site for the dam that would not be such a possible inconvenience, cost, and hazard to them. This is the area for

And we are well aware that there is no P-TA -- the illustration is used to draw an analogy.

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And while you are thinking about that, think about the fact that absentee balloting has begun for the general election which will be November 5, which is not many days away.

All areas of interest on the national and state level are stressing the need for voter participation, voter turn-out, voter interest. We have been urging these things in every election since we came to Sanderson in 1947, but there are other voices that should be heard in these urgings. Your vote in the primary is in direct jeopardy if you do not vote in the general election.

To select a nominee and not support the nominee in his or her bid for election comes near to hypocrisy; a vote of confidence for the nominee is the complete effort of the concerned citizen.

Get busy and work up an interest of all voters in the coming election. In the races of district, state, and national representatives, there should be sufficient interest to get almost all of the voters to the polls.

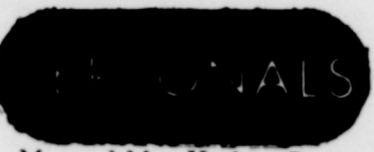

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**GPC Program Money Received**

The Sanderson Soil Conservation Service field office has received its allocation of \$35,000.00 for developing new Great Plains contracts this fiscal year. Larry W. Seymore, district conservationist, requests those producers interested to come by the office and make application for participation in the program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program was designed by Congress in 1956 to provide a means of minimizing the hazards of farming and ranching brought on by erratic climate. It is a special program for improvement of land in a needed area. In certain ways it differs from other programs directed at conserving soil and water. It requires a farmer or rancher to develop a complete long-range plan for making the needed changes in his land use or in his cropping system needed to conserve the soil and water resources.

The producer enters into an agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out the plan according to a schedule acceptable to the producer -- but within 10 years. All cost sharing for the entire job, ranging from 50 to 80 percent of the average cost, is earmarked when the agreement is signed. Cost-sharing is paid as the producer completes each step in his plan. Technical assistance in planning and installing the conservation measures is provided by the Soil Conservation Service.

When developing a Great Plains contract with a land owner first priority is given to adequately treat the land along with the desires of the producer. The producer under the GPCP still has complete control over his operation as he always has had. He is also not being made to open his gates to the public for recreation, as some people think or have heard, if they enter a Great Plains contract.

The Great Plains Program is to assist a producer in carrying out a good sound conservation program developing the land where it will produce its maximum on a sustained basis and continue to produce for future generations.

### S&GRA Has Meet Saturday in Del Rio

Some 150 members and directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association met in Del Rio last week to consider several important matters.

Of primary interest to the group, according to a news release, was the screwworm situation, which is expected to be worse before the end of the year. A resolution was passed recommending that urgent consideration be given to obtaining emergency funds for the screwworm plant at Mission.

The directors recommended that the Association support the mohair promotion program carried out by the Mohair Council of America and urged passage of the state mohair referendum which will be in the spring of 1975, and provides for a maximum reduction of 2-1/2¢ per pound from mohair sold each year.

They also recommended the Association urge all producers of sheep and wool to vote favorably in the November 4 national wool referendum. It will provide promotional funds for wool and lamb through the American Sheep Producers Council in Denver. The money is deducted from the incentive payments that growers have received for all but one of the last 19 years.

The Association recommended that the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and the Texas Agriculture Experiment Stations, both branches of Texas A&M University, be combined by the use of the same personnel cooperatively.

The Tax and Labor Committee recommended that the Association commend Cong. Omar Burlison of introducing H.R. 15435, which would reduce the inheritance tax program and make it much more workable for the farming and ranching industry. They also commended him for re-introducing the bracero labor bill which he has introduced for the last several years.

Monty Harkins attended the meeting.

AUSTIN—The high cost of campaigning for statewide office in the State of Texas continues to be evident.

Incumbent Gov. Dolph Briscoe reports expenditures from March through September 26 at approximately \$800,000.

Republican gubernatorial hopeful Jim Granberry reported expenses of \$412,880 in his effort to unseat Briscoe and become the state's first Republican governor since Reconstruction.

Sam McDonnell, the American Party candidate for governor, reported contributions of \$20,842 and expenses of \$20,336. Granberry's expenses exceeded his contributions by \$5,417. Briscoe's contributions totalled approximately \$17,000 more than his expenses.

Excluded from Briscoe's contributions is about \$407,000 raised at an October 1973 dinner, where Briscoe announced his intention to run for a four-year term. The money remains in escrow, pending final determination of a lawsuit filed by Briscoe's Democratic Primary challenger Frances Farenthold.

WATER BOARD DIRECTOR CRITICIZED — The Texas Attorney General's office has asked a subcom-

mittee of the House Environmental Committee for authority to enforce anti-pollution laws without waiting for action of the Texas Water Quality Board.

Rod E. Gorman, an assistant attorney general, told the pollution subcommittee that TWQB Executive Director Hugh Yantis is blocking enforcement of anti-pollution laws.

Gorman claimed very few major polluters are referred by the TWQB to the attorney general's office.

Phil Maxwell, director of the AG's environmental protection division, urged emergency legislation to strengthen the Attorney General's role in enforcing pollution laws.

The proposed bill would allow the attorney general to "enforce on his own initiative" such laws as the Texas Clean Air Act and the Texas Water Quality Act and any other laws or regulations "affecting the quality of the environment or the use of natural resources."

CAR DEALERS OFFER CUSTOMER AID — Texas Automobile Dealers Association has formed an in-house panel to attempt to satisfy customer gripes against 1,500 Texas new car dealers.

The seven-member Automotive Consumer Action Panel (AutoCAP) can levy up to \$1,000 in fines against an erring dealer and require his expulsion from TADA. Executive Director for TADA Gene Fondren says about 90 per cent of consumer complaints can be resolved, however, by adequate communication between consumer and car dealer.

SCHOOL FINANCE — The Governor's Office of Education plans to recommend to the Legislature a system of financing Texas public schools that "focuses on the student and his needs" says Dr. Richard Hooker, chief of the office.

Hooker told an educational study panel that school funding in Texas is now calculated on a classroom-teacher unit, based on average daily attendance in public schools. The result, he said, is probably the most complicated formula in the United States for measuring school needs.

Hooker said his office plans to propose a calculation based on a "full-time pupil equivalent."

TEXAS GETS FEDERAL DOLLARS — Texas will get \$73 million from the U.S. Treasury in revenue-sharing funds for the quarter of fiscal 1975. Governor Briscoe said the state will receive about \$24.5 million of the total and the rest will be channeled to city and county

governments for their use on local projects.

COURTS SPEAK — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals set a November 17 hearing in a case challenging constitutionality of the new state death penalty law.

Attorneys for former House Speaker Gus Mutscher and two aides are asking the Criminal Appeals court to take another look at its opinion approving their conviction for conspiracy to accept a bribe.

Former gubernatorial candidate Frances Farenthold's attorneys are seeking Governor Briscoe's income tax returns in connection with her suit alleging the Governor received illegal campaign contributions.

AG OPINIONS — A county, under proper circumstances, can contribute to construction of a swimming pool by an independent school district on school-owned land in the county, Atty Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

Texas Aeronautics Commission is not prohibited from assisting financially in development of a municipal airport on land leased for at least 20 years.

A single corporation may own and operate two separate cemeteries if all requirements are met.

Bonds issued by Guadalupe Leased Housing Corporation do not qualify to secure the deposit of state funds.

PAY WAITING — About 60,000 former Army Reservists and National Guardsmen have \$1.1 million coming to them if they will come forward.

The money was earned in drills and training during October 1-December 31, 1972.

Army officials would like to mail the money before Christmas, but only a few more than 1,000 have made the required application. Amount due ranges from \$16 to \$240.

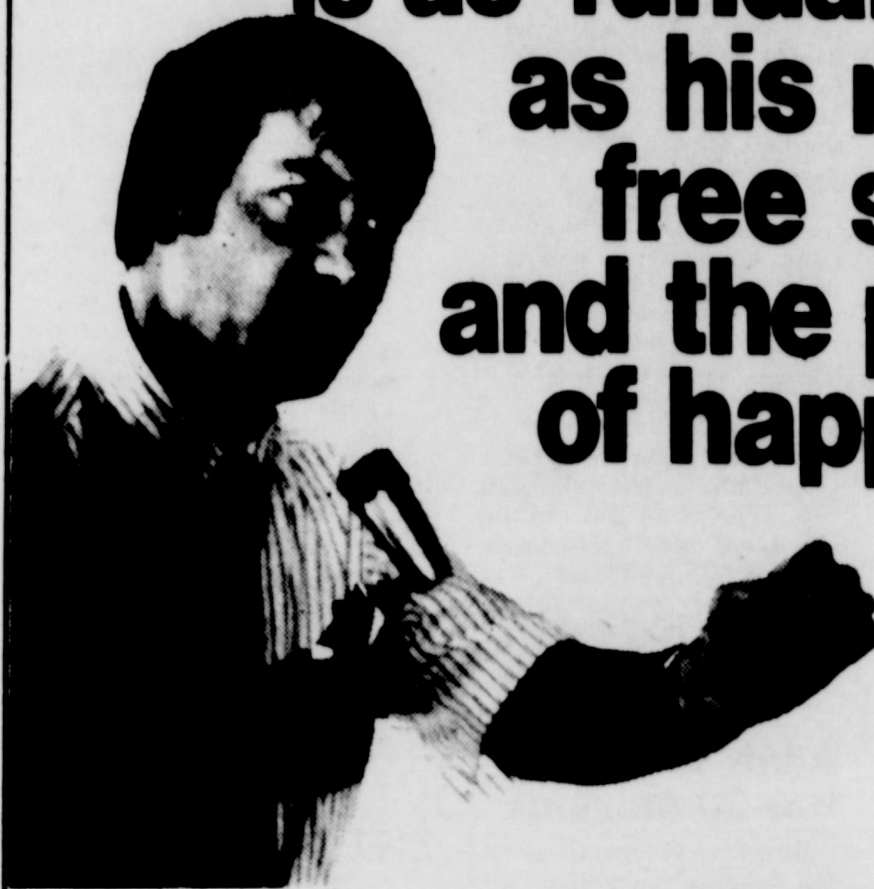
