thought - If one person pays on a $100 \%$ valuation base, then any other base for any other taxpayer is unequal,
and requires action by the and requires action by the board of equalization who sits
for the soul purpose of "determining, fixing and equal zizing mining, fixing and equalizing able property situated in the said county, school district,
or government subdivision".

It was a great act initiated by Rep. Susan Gurley McBee permit voting precincts of less than 100 in counties of less
than 100,000 population. It than 100,000 population. It will make lots of things easier it will climinate some hard feelings that have existed be cause of the requirements of the law and consequential ac tion by those responsible for holding elections. It can also prevent some confusion by the
establishing of voting re-establishing of voting pre-
cincts that will stand for al most any election for some time to come.
We commend her and her action, and we hope that Sen Pete Snelson will have as much success in getting the
