Polling Saturday In 3 Elections

Terrell County voters will be able to vote in two elections Saturday, and residents in the local water district will have an opportunity to cast a third ballot.

In the water district election there are two announced candidates for two places on the board of directors, both for a three-year term: Weldon Cox, seeking re-election, and Tommy Corbett.

In the county school board election, there is one candidate announced from precinct 1 - Mike Fielding, one candidate announced from precinct **8** - Mrs. Barry Pendleton, and one candidate announced for the at-large post - Mrs. A.N. Farley.

The only contested race is the one for board of trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District. There are three candidates for two posts, each a threeyear term: W.E. TenEyck, reelection, and Alex Escamilla and Charles Stegall.

Voting will be at the courthouse for all of the elections for Sanderson residents, and for the convenience of voters in the area of Dryden, at the Dryden Methodist Church; in the area of the Herman Couch ranch, a polling box will be there; and those more convenient to the El Paso Natural Gas Plant may vote there in both the county school board and the independent school district trustee races.
