Its Foster Grandparents Program pays he minimum wage to certain older Americans needing inancial assistance who are eeking an opportunity to ive their attention and af-
fection to young people. Foser Grandparents spend time with children in hospitals, by working with children from broken homes, and by assist ing in other ways young people who, through no fault of he ir own, come from famil-
equate attention.
We all know that young chil dren need love, encouragement, and the attention and wisdom of older people, and that older Americans want to keep a sense of their usefulness. Here is a program that to the benefit of both.
