

It Depends on How You Look At It!

This fact - It depends on how you look at it - was expressed in diametrically opposed views last Thursday night at the meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners and the directors of the local water board. It just proves that we were always right in that people have different opinions without either one being wrong!

It seems to us that either could make the system work as well as the other, but it takes some effort and some money - either way!

The current system - for whatever the reason - of precinct 1 vehicles and workers working only in precinct 1; and workers and vehicles of the other three precincts working in all three precincts, seems on the face of it, to not be quite right. The statement above would have been as accurate and without meaning to imply anything if it had been stated: workers and vehicles of precincts 2, 3, and 4 working in all three precincts, and workers and vehicles of precinct 1 working only in precinct 1. It just had to be stated with one of the separations being mentioned first - no implication, no hidden-meaning effort, no between-the-lines statements.

The only differences-as we see it-in the two proposals, would be that the water district has one man employed to "operate" the utility. The commissioners could do the same thing for the sanitation work and keeping up the equipment; and the other is that since it's a deficit operation everywhere that we have read about or heard about, the county is already in the tax levying and collecting business and it would be less expensive, less trouble, less everything, to let that office continue that chore and pay for the deficit of operation with taxes.

This is not an unusual thing - we can't pay for all of the government services we receive on a person-to-person degree. Take education, for example: how could we individually pay for what our children receive in the way of benefits, or if we could, how far would education go?

Another consideration is taxing some to pay for something they don't get! OK, let's go along with that for this consideration: Mobil Oil Co. is the largest single tax payer in the county and school district - and how are we going to see that they get that much back in services from the school and county? And the A.D. Brown Estate is the largest taxpayer by individuals - and how can the county and schools give them that proportion of services?

Sometimes our tongues work before our brains ever get motivated!

The basic human concepts force us to see that some people have some things that they are not individually able

Dam Easements In

County Judge Charles Stavley stated Tuesday morning that all of the easements and related documents for all of the sites for flood control dams involved in the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Flood Control Project, with the exception of those for flood control dam sites on property belonging to Mr. and Mrs. W.G. Downie and the Lee McCue Estate had been secured.

This, along with the initiation of condemnations proceedings against the two pieces of land for which no easements have been secured, permits initiation of plans toward the beginning of construction of dam sites on the flood control project, according to Judge Stavley.

Commissioners Meet To Plan Condemnation Suits

There was a called meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners Court Tuesday for the purpose of officially initiating condemnation proceedings on two tracts of land involved in the Sanderson Watershed Flood Control Project - one site on land belonging to Mr. and Mrs. W.G. Downie, and one site on land belonging to the Lee McCue Estate.

Present at the meeting were Judge Stavley, Commissioners W.W. Sudduth and Graham Childress, County Attorney Jack Hayre, Audry Baker, Soil Conservation Service supervisor from Pecos, and Larry Seymour, local SCS representative.

Another meeting of the commissioners is planned for Friday to formulate an offer to Mr. and Mrs. Downie for permission to construct the dam proposed for the site on their property - a step necessary in the condemnation proceeding. Judge Stavley stated that if the offer was acceptable and agreement was reached on the property involved, that this was tantamount to an easement; and that a refusal of the offer, or lack of agreement would justify further action on the part of the court to secure the right for the use of the property for the construction of a dam.

The action against the McCue property is "friendly" in that the heirs of the estate are minor children who are unable to negotiate a legal contract, according to information received, and the suit is the only means of acquiring access to the property.

Water Dist. Directors Hear Visitor Talk

The Terrell County Commissioners Court invited the directors and manager of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1 to meet with them Thursday night of last week. Present were County Judge Charles Stavley, and Commissioners W.W. Sudduth, Austin Chriesman, David Mitchell, and Graham Childress; Don Allen, manager of the water district, and the following directors: Greene Cooke, Weldon Cox, Gene Thompson, and Jimmy Caroline.

The purpose of the meeting was to hear Mr. Cooper, manager of the water utility in Ozona, who also has charge of sanitation pick-up and disposal. Mr. Cooper explained how the two departments worked together in Ozona, quoted costs of water and sanitation fees, and said that the utility had the power to cut off water service to those who failed to pay the sanitation fee, but failed to answer directly several times that water service was cut off if sanitation fees were not paid. There was a long and at times heated discussion of the possibility of implementing such a plan in Sanderson.

Commissioners contended that they had no way to force payment of the sanitation fee and that the service operated at a deficit and that if the service were taken over by the water district, they would have a means of forcing local residents to pay for the sanitation pick-up by threatening to cut off the water service if the sanitation fee were not paid. The water district directors contended that since both the water district and the commissioners court were government entities, each had the power to tax to make up a deficit in the operation of the facility and that the county was already set up for and levying and collecting taxes.

There were no decisions reached at the meeting, but individual water district directors contacted indicated that they felt that the commissioners court was as able as the water district to take care of the needs adequately and were already set up for the physical and financial operation of the service.

Renditions Due At School Tax Office

Ernest E. Harkins Jr., tax assessor-collector for the Terrell County Independent School District, asked The Times to relay his plea for the return of all rendition blanks to his office as soon as possible. Mailed renditions that are not returned cause the office of tax assessor to place their own values on taxable property.

Harkins said that his office mailed renditions to certain business people in Sanderson in an effort to acquire a proper and correct inventory of taxable property and the value the business man places on that property.

It is understood that the tax office of the school district plans to mail blanks to every known taxpayer in Terrell County next year so that the proper inventory of taxable property and the proper value placed on that property.

An understanding of the need for properly-filed renditions will be undertaken by the tax office so that there will be the greatest effort to properly execute the duties of the office of tax assessor-collector.

In the past, rendition blanks were not mailed to tax payers unless they asked for them specifically.

Figures Show Collections For Local Sanitation

Figures from the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District show that approximately 93% of the people billed for sanitation service in Sanderson are paying for that service. Figures of "less than 50%" had been used in conversations and individual expressions of opinions about the transfer of responsibility of the service from the commissioners court to the water district.

There are 591 meters in Sanderson for water service, and 190 of this number are not billed for sanitation service. It was explained that this 190 includes water meters at churches, at the cemetery, separate meters for special water use by certain residents, such as watering yards, horse lots, etc. Also included in this figure are those county employees employed in the sanitation project, the railroad water meters, Del Rio railroad employees who have private water connections, but no trash needs, and some who for one reason or another

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Amoco and Seco To Drill Holes

Amoco Production Co. will drill the No. 1-B Pakenham Ranch Co., Ltd., a 9,500-foot wildcat in Terrell County, 10 miles southwest of Sheffield, 3-1/4 miles east of the depleted one-well University Block 34 Atoka gas field, 3-1/4 miles northwest of the Brown-Bassett, North (Fusselman and Atoka gas field and 3-5/8 miles southwest of an undesignated Devonian gas discovery.

Location is 2,432 feet from the south and 3,859 feet from the west lines of Mrs. Ann McClung No. 2, Abst. 894, and in Block 219.

Seco Production Co. of Midland will drill the No. 1-7 Allison as a 1-1/4 mile south and slightly east outpost to the six-well Allison (detrital gas) field of Terrell County, nine miles south of Sheffield and 7/8-mile north of reported Devonian discovery which is testing for dual completion in the Pennsylvanian.

continued from front page have asked to not be billed for the service.

Of the 401 water customers that are billed, there is a collection that averages about \$1,100 per month - it was reported Thursday night that collections last year were \$13,300.00 for sanitation. Businesses pay amounts ranging up to \$15.00 per month for this service, and by calculated estimates there are approximately 375 residents and businesses paying for the sanitation service, which is 64% of the total number of meters.

It was also stated that some residents do not pay every month for the sanitation service, but pay maybe every two or three months for the total amount in arrears, thus making monthly receipts difficult to calculate exactly.

If the estimated 375 paying is close to an accurate figure that was given to The Times,

this is better than 90% collections of those being billed and the possibility of getting more paying customers from the group of 190 listed above would have to be ascertained after each was contacted by the commissioner in whose precinct each lives to determine their reasons for not wanting to be billed for the service.



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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—A utilities regulatory bill finally surfaced in the Senate but immediately ran into stiff criticism after early indications it might pass promptly.

The bill (SB 42) remained on high center while sponsors tried to satisfy complaints with amendments.

A Texas Coalition for Utility Regulation spokesman termed the Senate bill "a monopoly's dream and a consumer's nightmare."

Some charged it would mean an automatic rate increase for most utilities because of provisions of the rating formula. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby termed this concern a "misapprehension."

The bill would set up a three-member appointed Public Utility Commission with jurisdiction over intrastate telephone rates.

Cities would retain jurisdiction over electric and gas rates. The Utilities Commission would have jurisdiction over electric rates outside city limits, while the Railroad Commission would have jurisdiction over gas rates outside municipal boundaries.

Appeals from electric rate decisions by cities would go to the Utilities Commission. Appeals in gas rate cases would go to the Railroad Commission.

SPEED BILL KILLED
The Senate sent the so-called "no-pain" speed bill to a painful end.

Senators voted down 10-19 the House-passed measure which sought to limit fines for speeding violations under 70 mph to \$25 (including court costs). The original bill also would have prevented 55-70 mph speeding violations from being entered in drivers' records for insurance premium enhancement and license suspension purposes.

The legislature earlier extended the present 55 mph speed limit to conform with federal energy-saving requirements. Enforcement apparently will be "monitored" by the federal government.

SUPERINTENDENTS AXED
Thirty-nine county school superintendents would receive no more state aid under a bill passed by the Senate and returned to the House.

The measure (HB 226) would take away state support for superintendents in Jasper, Newton, Sabine, Anderson, Atascosa, Austin, Bexar, Brazos, Burleson, Camp, Crosby, Delta, Donley, Eastland, Gonzales, Gregg, Hardin, Harrison, Hunt, Jack, Jones, Karnes, LaSalle, Leon, Liberty, Medina, Orange, Red River, Robertson, Rusk, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Starr, Tarrant, Tyler, Upshur, Walker, Waller and Washington Counties.

COURTS SPEAK
Third Court of Civil Appeals held a lawsuit claiming Secretary of State Mark White Jr. helped dissolve a corporation in an improper manner can be tried in Travis County.

A Nueces County man should be released from custody for contempt, since he had a right not to answer a question put to him at a deposition taking, the Texas Supreme Court held.

A Dallas County black won a new trial on rape charges. The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the case, on grounds the trial judge would not allow the de-

fendant's attorneys to question prospective jurors about racial prejudice.

AG OPINIONS
Alien children are entitled to attend public schools in their home district, regardless of whether they are legally or illegally within the U.S., Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill held:

There is no difference in rights reinstated by a pardon or a restoration to citizenship. But a restoration to citizenship might not satisfy a requirement that a pardon and a proof of innocence are necessary for an award of

compensation to a wrongfully-convicted person.

The federal election campaign act amendments supercede Texas Election Code expense reporting requirements for candidates for federal office.

Preliminary and tentative suggestions in a school board committee report are excepted from disclosure under the Open Records Act, as are charges against identifiable individuals.

WINNERS NAMED

Winners of the Governor's 1974 Industrial Expansion Awards were named by Texas Industrial Commission for civic and economic contributions to their communities.

Winners were Mooney Aircraft Corp. of Kerrville, Amoco Chemical Corp. of Alvin, Timex Corp. of Abilene, G&H Casting Corp. of Slaton, Inca Metal Products Corp. of Lewisville and Mr. Fine of Athens.

The award winners will be honored in ceremonies during May. Fourteen other companies were selected for special citation.
