Regardless of how you look tit, there is a lot of water in ake Amistad -- and all you an see is what's on top! We made our second trip to he lake last week and it was ost enjoyable. We hesitated o say much about the first because it had been 28 ears since we had been on a ishing trip and we were fearul of being thought wacky for talking about pretty blue waer, completely calm lake irror-smooth, no wind, very little direct sunlight all day, ood fishing, beautiful scenry of blue bonnets in bloom, itaya and ocotilla blooming all over the place, a recollecon of the ability to throw a fishing lure in the general direction desired, and also a recollection of some real fishing language like: hook, line, inker, pole, rod, reel, treble ook, lunker, minnow, troll, boat, motor, swivel, and lots more fishing words like heck. shucks, darn it, fiddle-sticks, etc. We even recognized a catfish, were able to distinguish between a black bass and white bass, and identified crappie. We remembered lots of fishing words, too, like popper, hell-bender, plastic orms, spinner reel, planeout; and some other words that e never did find out what they meant: *&¢"), and \$##@, and *\$\$ % # \$+, and ? / x * & %. The second trip - Friday of last week - was different in

that the lake was not quite so calm, but not at all rough, at least not for the boat, motor, and host that we had. The pretty blue-bonnets and ocotilla blooms were gone, too, but in their place were many many columbine blooms on the walls of the canyons, and small purple flowers very heavily covering the ground in so many places. We coninued to use many of the ishing words we recalled from previous years and some of the new ones we learned on the earlier trip so that we could classified some kind of a fisherman when the conversation turned in that direction after we got back to town. We also recalled the use of a baitcasting reel, the conventional old-xyle kind to you non-fishmen, but we honestly did not have to recall the use of certain words most applicable and appropriate when you get a back-lash. Not one in an all-day fishing effort!

One thing we learned on this tip that you can catch sun perch on plastic worms, and we also learned that it takes a lot of skill to do it. Not just anybody can! If you want to try and prove your fishing ability, set that as your goal!

Isaac Newton knew what he was talking a bout when he said: "Any novice can catch a fish if you use the proper bait, but it takes a real craftsman and artist to catch a sun perch on a plastic worm!" Gas Discovery In Devonian

Hytech Energy Corp., Midland, No. 1 Frank Rashap, in 3-176-TCRR, Terrell County previously reported Devonian gas discovery and Pennsylvanian prospect, 11 miles south of Sheffield and three miles southeast of the Allison (Detrital) field, flowed an unreported time from the Pennsylvanian, making gas at the rate of 175,000 to 347,000 cubic feet daily.

Flow was through an unreported choke and perforations at 10,336-427 feet. Testing continued.

A calculated, absolute open flow potential of 950,000 cubic feet of gas was reported Feb. 28, through Devonian perforations at 11,143-212 feet.

It is the No. 1-C Pakenham Ranch Co., Ltd. Location is 599 feet from the south and 1,026 feet from the west lines of 3-173-TMRR.

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truth of it the rest of our life.

Another thing that we learn-' ed last weekend: in reading the report of the Soil Conservation Service in preparation for the implementation of the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Flood Control Project, it was estimated that Sanderson Canyon is now approximately 250 feet more shallow than it was at one time. The washing in of silt, gravel, etc., from the mountains and slopes on the watershed have filled in that much of the canyon and its slopes. This was determined by the deposits found in the canyon.

Since there has been this much deposited in the canyon and on its slopes, this means that there has been an erosion of this much gravel, soil, and silt from the mountains and slopes in the watershed. All of which means that the canyons used to be much deeper and the mountains much higher than they presently are!

This is interesting to us, since it means that there has been a drastic change in the appearance of the topography in this area, much of which is due to soil erosion, winds, rains, etc.

We received word Monday that the little advertisementlike things we use for the Cancer Drive, Heart Fund, March of Dimes, etc., are considered advertising by the Postal Department and even though they are published "as a public service", we have to pay an additional amount in postage because we have printed them.

We get pretty upset sometimes about some of the laws we have - and yet we advocate very strongly the need for people to try to abide by the laws. We are paying for a lot of government, and it seems that we are coming pretty close to getting all the government that we are paying for!

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

AUSTIN - Legislators are moving slowly toward adoption of a scaled-toincome school finance bill, their No. 1 priority item in closing weeks of their 1975

The House, on the third day of trying, finally reached narrow agreement on a \$721 million version of education finance overhaul.

Under terms of the bill, now before the Senate, school teachers would draw a starting pay of \$8,000 a year.

House Speaker Bill Clayton, who engineered the House bill after representatives seemed bent on running the cost up to nearly \$2 billion, termed the product a "responsible compromise."

However, it far exceeded the \$500 million to \$600 million then expected to be available for additional school spending.

Comptroller Bob Bullock was expected to send in a revised revenue forceast any day which could make it possible to spend as much on schools as contemplated by the House without additional taxation.

Test votes in both the House and in Senate subcommittee have gone against Gov. Dolph Briscoe's socalled weighted-pupil approach to distributing state school aid.

Indications are the bill finally agreed on in conference committee will follow pretty closely present formulas for state education spending, and critics claim there isn't enough money to do an adequate



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
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

LIBRARY POLICIES

The following are policies adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Terrell County Pub lic Library:

1. The library shall be open 2-6 p.m. on week days; 9-12 a.m. Saturdays; 10-10:45 a.m. Wednesday; 7-9 p.m. Thursdays.

2. The library shall be closed on the following holidays: Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's, July 4.

3. At the present time no sick leave nor vacation will be authorized for the librarian and staff.

4. The librarian will be paid \$90 a month.

5. In formulating a policy on book selection the Library Board subscribes to "The Library Bill of Rights", adopted June 18, 1948, and amended February 2, 1961, and June 27, 1967, by the American Library Association Council.

6. A fine of 2¢ per day, not to exceed \$1.00 per book, shall be charged for overdue books. When one keeps a library book overdue one week, his library privileges will be withdrawn until the book is returned and paid for.

7. Schools are free to use the library during regular hours or when a librarian accompanies the group.

8. No resident will be denied the use of the library, but he or she must secure a library card. A non-resident may use a local resident's card.

9. Due to the lack of space, the library will not be available for meetins for any organization other than libraryconnected organizations.

10. The librarian and the board will willingly accept gifts and memorials, provided the gifts are given freely with no stipulations.

11. The Library Board shall work with the Friends of the Public Library.

12. Travel expenses (not to exceed 10¢ a mile plus \$25 per day, provided the conference involves an overnight trip) for trustees and staff to attend library conferences, workshops, and professional meetings shall be paid from the budget.

13. The library will be a member of the Texas Library Association, with dues paid from the budget.

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
