Immediately following this service, there will be a dedicatory service at Memorial Park and the unveiling of the memorial marker for those whose lives were lost in the flood.



Ice cream, punch, and cookies were served with the birthday cake.





Work of SANYO
Is Explained By
Julian Rodriguez

Julian Rodriguez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Santiago Rodriguez of Sanderson, is executive director of the San Antonio Youth Organization, which services about 12,000 youths yearly through remedial education, job training, counseling, placement, recreation, and career and college planning. He is also a graduate of Sanderson High School and received his higher education at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

SANYO became a 10-yearold operation last week and Rodriguez said he was proud of the positive role that has been played in the areas of youth development and juvenile delinquency, two of the prime areas of operation of the organization. The organization has a \$4-million budget, and in service to the 12,000 San Antonio youngsters, Rodriguez stated that there was still more to do for juveniles. Most of the funding is by the U.S. Department of Labor through the City of San Antonio.

SANYO's Manpower Out-of-School Program, servicing some 600 school dropouts from September through May each school year, gets \$75,-000 of the budget, according to Rodriguez. Training areas under the school dropout setup include clerical, automotive, electrical, carpentry, radio and television, and nursing assistance. A special feature of the out-of-school program is a \$1,000 scholarship awarded annually to one of its participants.

Another job-oriented project, the Manpower In-School Program, has been expanded in recent summers to handle approximately 5,000 students, helping them find jobs to work 30 to 40 hours weekly.

Federal funds for the mass summer-student hiring project amount to \$2.4 million this year, Rodriguez said.

SANYO officials also take pride in its Juvenile Halfway House Program, started just three years ago. Rehabilitation services are provided delingquent males between 16 and 21. The residential program operates out of the original SANYO facility at 1000 Harriman Place.

SANYO, founded April 6, 1965, by Roman Catholic priest John W. Yanta, now occupies offices, class rooms, and shops of the sprawling old La Salle High School on the South Side of San Antonio.

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
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
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
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TYPICAL CROSS SECTION OF CHANNEL IMPROVEMENT

Immediately Above Railroad Bridge No. 516.23

The improvement of the channel in Sanderson Canyon for a distance of 1,800 feet is the first scheduled work to be accomplished on the Sanderson Canyon Watershed Flood Control Project, according to the Watershed Workplan book published by the Soil Conservation Service. The project is expected to be accomplished in one year and is the only phase of the project expected to be completed in the first vear of construction, according to the work plan.

The proposed cost of the channel improvement work was estimated to be \$9,868 when the plan was devised in November of 1969, but is expected to be much higher at the presently inflated costs.

The planned channel improvement will not significantly change the regimen of Sanderson Canyon. Channel improvement will consist of a trainer dike, excavation, and modification of exit and approach sections to Southern Pacific Company railroad bridge number 516.23. An apurtenance to channel improvement will be a 90-foot prestressed concrete bridge extension.

Alteration of the exit and approach reaches to the rail-road bridge will extend approximately 1,000 feet upstream and 800 feet down-

stream from the bridge. The depth of excavation will range from 0.5 to 3.0 feet. The material through which the channel will be excavated consists of moderately well graded gravel containing scattered cobbles and boulders. The present channel contains extensive gravel bars and the lowest portion is armor-plated. The planned channel improvement will have a 200-foot bottom, 3:1 side slopes, and a slightly depressed center to prevent low flows from mean-

The dike will be set on the edge of the channel excavation and have side slopes of 3:1 with a 12-foot top. Material to be excavated from the channel is suitable for use as a mass fill for the dike. Sufficient quantities of coursegrained material are available to interface rock riprap.

Rock riprap is planned for the inside and outside curves of channel improvement upstream from the railroad bridge. Riprap for the inside curve is planned to extend approximately 70 feet upstream from the bridge. The outside curve will have riprap for approximately 370 feet upstream from the bridge.

The planned dike will be built to prevent floodwaters from leaving the improved channel and flowing eastward along Downie Street in Sanderson. The dike will be constructed approximately three feet above the natural ground and will extend about 600 feet upstream from the bridge in the east side of the improved channel.

The 90-foot bridge extension to be added to the present twelve 10x9-foot box culverts will be three 30-foot spans of prestressed concrete.

Two side inlets enter the segment of planned channel improvement above the planned dike. Inlet structures will be reinforced concrete drops or chutes.

Excavation of channel material not used in construction of the trainer dike will be disposed of by placement or spoiling within the rights-of-way.

The present railroad bridge and the planned 90-foot extension have a skewness of 17 degrees. This small angle of skewness will create some turbulence in the upstream entrance to the bridge. The planned rock riprap and armor-plated channel bottom will tolerate this turbulence. However, the sponsors have been made aware of the possible maintenance problem in this portion of channel improvement.

The 100-year frequency flood will be contained within the section of channel improvement, according to the work plan book, the source of all of the above information concerning the channel improvement project.
