Working people who face a long-term severe disability should apply promptly for social security benefits to avoid loss of payments they may be entitled to, according to social security officials here. Social security pays monthly

"Back payments can only be made up to 12 m

not delay their applicatould even if they are not sure they will qualify for payments. About one of every 12 workers getting social security disability payments misses out on some payments because he applied too late."
Disabled workers who have not applied any social benefits should as soon as possible, according to the spokesman.' "Or, they can ask a friend or relative to make the call," he said. Social security disability benefits are paid to over 2 million disabled workers and over $1-1 / 2$ million dependents. The average payment is $\$ 205$ a month. Disabled peo to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more also are eligible for Medicare health insurThe

## Redesigned Cancer Drugs May Increase Effectiveness

Many cancer drugs exist that can kill or arrest the spread of cancerous cells. But none
of these drugs can be of these drugs can be
considered a satisfactory considered a sa
cure for cancer.

The main drawbacks of most of the drugs presently used in chemotherapy (treatment with chemicals) are threefold: they kill many normal cells, and they are ineffective against resting cancer cells. In addition, cancer cells. In addition, the cancerous cells even-
tually develop a resistance tually develop a resistance to the drugs.

While there is no cancer drug without undesired toxicity, some drugs could be redesigned to exist in a harmless storage form that could be distributed throughout be distributed throughout the body, says Dr.
Joseph Nagyvary, a proJoseph Nagyvary, a pro-
fessor of nucleotide chemistry in the Department of Biochemistry and Biophysics, The Texas Agricultural Ex periment Station and Texas A\&M University

These redesigned drugs would be able to easily pass through the walls of all cells and become active mainly when in the presence of abnormal, growing tissue," Nagyvary stated.
"Notice I say abnormal. The approach my group is investigating is ex pected to work on not only cancerous tissue but also it is being studied for problems of allergy, psoriasis and brain tissue At present, problems with all of these involve some of the most resistant cells of the body
"Biological studies on allergy, effect on the brain and on psoriasis will be performed in collabor ation with Dr. A. Szentivanyi (Tampa, Florida) and Dr. W. Klemm (Texas A\&M University)
"Texans will be pleased to know that while the initial research of the team I head was sup ported by the Experimen Station and Texas A\&M our present research is strongly supported by federal grants.
"Our involvement in development of new drugs, which was begun in 1968, has received the attention and financia support of the Nationa Institutes of Health Results and projects deReloped here at Texa veloped here at rexas A\&M have been recog
nized and adopted by nized and adopted by
some prominent research institutions
"Drugs can do their thing-good or bad-only thing good where they are in tissues where the same absorbed. The same drug can be invigorating or intoxicating, depending on the site and manner of its administration. Mowadays on regulatin
livery (logistics) of drugs to selected tissues
Some of the best drugs, such as aspirin and peni cillin, were the result of accidental discoveries, but the modern scientist likes to rely on rational ap proaches. There are several obvious areas for achieving a better utili achion of drugs. The TAMU group is TAMU group is zeroing in on better penetration of tissues by a certain class of drugs called nucleotide anti-metabolites.
"These compounds were unable to penetrate celular membranes because of their electric charge which, on the other hand, is required for biological activity. The rationale activity. The rationale underlying our strategy was suggested by the behavior of organophosphate insecticides which are neutral molecules and possess superior penetraion."
Logically, Nagyvary and his colleagues transformed one of the important cellular agents, so called AMP, into a neutral phosphate. It is known phosphate. It is known hat CAMP not only regulates the growth and shape of cells, it is also
involved in deseases such involved in deseases such
as psoriasis, asthma, diaas psoriasis, asthma, dia-
betes, hypoglycemia and betes, hypogly
even in aging.
ven in aging.
Yet, when injected, cAMP does little good for reasons of poor absorption through cell walls. But after modification in neutral form, it exhibits some of the desired activities and it seems activities and it seems even to stimulate the nervous system, which is the toughest target to penetrate.
Other advantages of using the neutral organophosphate form of drugs, according to Nagyvary, are that it can be considered a good storage form, from which the active agent is released only slowly with a longer period of action and less oxicity. The application of the same principle to cancer drugs will lead to the development lead to the develop in the better efficiency in the treat ment of resistant tumors, which otherwise do not respond to chemotherapy. Nagyvary emphasizes that his group does only the initial part of drug development, including chemical design, studies
anisms of action, and simple small animal stud ies. Research hospitals take care of the further applications to human diseases. Nagyvary feels much credit should go to much credit should go to
those responsible for those responsible for advocating the new line of research activity. He

These findings of the TAES team were pre sented on May 19 at Buffalo, New York, before the Sixteenth Annua Medicinal Chemistry Sym posium.

In 1968, Nagyvary's students initiated biolog ical testing of an anti leukemic agent which was further developed and modified in Japan and is on its way to becoming the best single agen against human leukemia

There are new hori zons, which bring new excitement and chal lenges, such as the stimulation of the brain and lation of the brain and the rejuvenation of cell and organs. Research of such fundamental interes and wide scope is bound to benefit plant, animal and human health.
