## It Depends on



### Now You Look At It!

State Comptroller Bob Bullock, in a news release received last week, acknowledged the inequities of the valuations placed on real property over the state. His words concerning the proposed constitution were: "The backers of the constitution keep telling us that taxing on a basis of true market value is a good thing - and it is - but property owners have a right to know what this means in plain English. What would this re-evaluation mean to the average property owner? It means that on a statewide average, their houses and lots could increase more than 60 per cent on the tax rolls. It would then be up to local taxing authorities, such as our cities, counties, and school districts, to reduce their tax rates and/or assessment ratios or property taxes would go skyhigh." He concludes the news release with: "I think most homeowners believe that all real property should be taxed in an equal and uniform manner. However, it's been my experience that they are referring to the "other fella's" property because they believe theirs is already over valued and over taxed."

We would agree with practically all of what Mr. Bullock says, except his logic that a re-evaluation up to the market value on all property would run taxes skyhigh. His inference is just that in voicing opposition to the new constitution (another opinion shared by us), but the true picture is that with any re-evaluation, there is the ever-present possibility that the rate, and/or tax assessment ratio would be adjusted to fit the financial needs of the taxing organization.

What people should be worried and concerned about is the inequalities in valuations and rendered property, rather than total valuations.

If I am supposed to render all my business property, inventory, equipment, etc., then is it unfair to think that every one else should do the same? And use the same basis for their valuations? This has been, is, and will be my only argument -- inequality is unfair!

It seems so foolish to quibble - or have to - about organizations and individuals in places of responsibility and example condoning raffles. If they are illegal, then our churches, civic clubs, veterans' organizations that support law and order, schools, etc., and the members thereof, should say "no". We cannot say by our example that we will violate those laws with which we do not agree and justify our actions.

And we cannot convince the young people that our actions in law violation are justified.

## Eagles Lose To Grandfalls 33-18

The Eagles played their last home game of the season on Friday night against the Grandfalls-Royalty Cowboys. The Cowboys won the game 33-18.

SanderSON's scoring was as follows:

In the first quarter, Kendall Billings, Eagle fullback, ran 42 yards for a touchdown and then converted an extra point on a place kick.

In the second period, Billings kicked a field goal with the ball snapped from the 5-yard line to gain another three points, a total of 10 at the half buzzer. Another field goal was attempted in the second period, but it was no good.

In the third period, both of the teams were scoreless.

SanderSON's final tally was a 32-yard run by Frankie Flores and a pass from Marvin Davis, the quarterback, to Clay Mitchell, end, was good for two extra points.

When the final Eagle touchdown was made, Grandfalls had only 26 points on the board and there were more than five minutes left in the final frame, but a fumble by the Eagles gave the ball to Grandfalls deep in home territory and they were able to capitalize on the turnover.

Grandfalls scoring was:

In the first period a break through the middle by Dennis Andrews for a 1-yard touchdown, the PAT effort failed. A second touchdown was marked in the first period on a plunge through the middle by the quarterback Johnny Santiago for five yards and the score. The point-after try again was no good. The half ended 12-10 in favor of Grandfalls.

In the final frame, Santiago sneaked through for one yard and the score and the extra-point kick was good. Santiago threw a pass to Alvie Carrell for a 33-yard touchdown play and the extra-point kick was again good. The final Cowboy TD was a 29-yard run by the quarterback, Santiago, and another successful conversion by place kick of the extra point to bring the total to 33.

Fans enjoyed the competition displayed on the gridiron throughout all of the game, and particularly through the third period, but the strength of the Cowboys prevailed in the waning minutes of the game.

Extensive and numerous penalties occurred against both of the teams, with illegal shift or motion and backfield in motion being the most common infraction, but there were

some 15-yard assessments against both of the teams.

The Eagles will play in Imperial Friday night and will go to Dell City on November 14 for their final scheduled game of district play.

The two teams played an even ball game that was also reflected in the statistics. SanderSON had 25 first downs to 27 for Grandfalls, but trailed in total yards 301 to 393. SanderSON had 301 yards rushing and zero passing, while Grandfalls had 358 yards rushing and 35 yards in the air. SanderSON had a pass intercepted which proved costly by setting up a touchdown drive by the Cowboys. Both teams lost a fumble. The Cowboys were penalized 10 times for 80 yards, and the Eagles miscued seven times for 32 yards.

The dads or representatives of the dads were introduced with the players, manager, and photographer prior to the game. Recognition of the dads is an annual event of the Eagle team. A picture of the players was also presented to the dads as they were introduced. The pictures were a gift from the "El Aguila" - SanderSON High School Annual - staff.

The agenda follows:

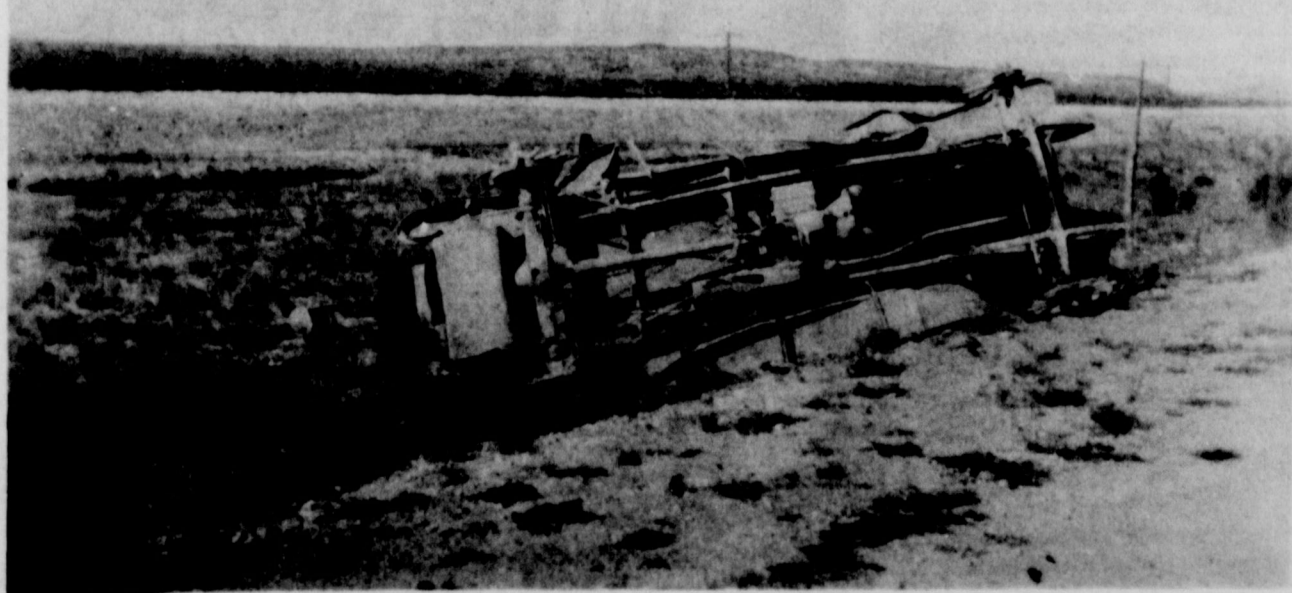

- Consider approving J.P. monthly report.

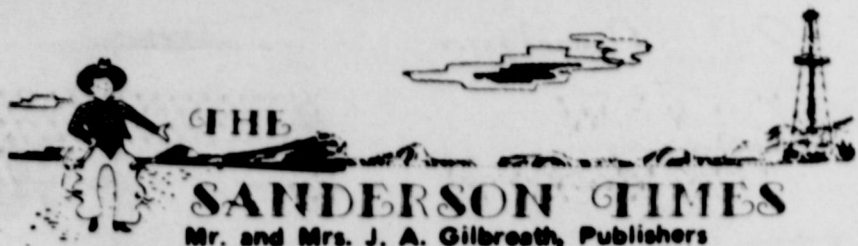
The meeting will be at 9:00 a.m. Monday in the county court room at the court house.

## ARMISTICE PROGRAM PLANNED AT SCHOOL

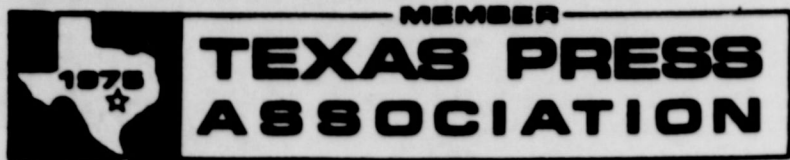

**H. B. Davis Killed In Burning Auto**

H.B. Davis, about 58, of San Antonio, a passenger conductor on the Southern Pacific Railroad - AMTRAK - was killed in a flaming wreck on the highway between Dryden and Sheffield Saturday. The man's watch registered 3:15.

Local officers investigated the accident, and Peace Justice W.G. Shoemaker was present at the site of the accident for his inquest and ruled death by accident.

It was stated that the vehicle appeared to have continued in a straight line on a slight curve, overturned at least two times, and caught fire. The body was in the back of the interior of the vehicle and burned beyond recognition.

The accident occurred about 18 miles north of Dryden.

The body was returned to San Antonio for burial.

Davis was well-known here, having worked into Sanderson from San Antonio for several years.

**C. V. Turner, 66, Former Resident, Killed Near Marfa**

Cecil Vernon "Beke" Turner, 66, of Alpine died as the result of a fall from a horse about noon Sunday on a ranch 20 miles east of Marfa.

Services and burial were in Alpine Tuesday.

He was born June 15, 1909, in Sanderson, moved to Alpine in 1928, worked on ranches in that area until 1935, and later worked for the Texas Highway Dept., and an Alpine oil company. He was married to Shirley Hardy April 13, 1935.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters; three sons; his mother, Mrs. J.M. Turner, of Alpine; a brother, James M. Turner, of Texas City, and 12 grandchildren. W.R. "Son" Turner, deceased, was also a brother.

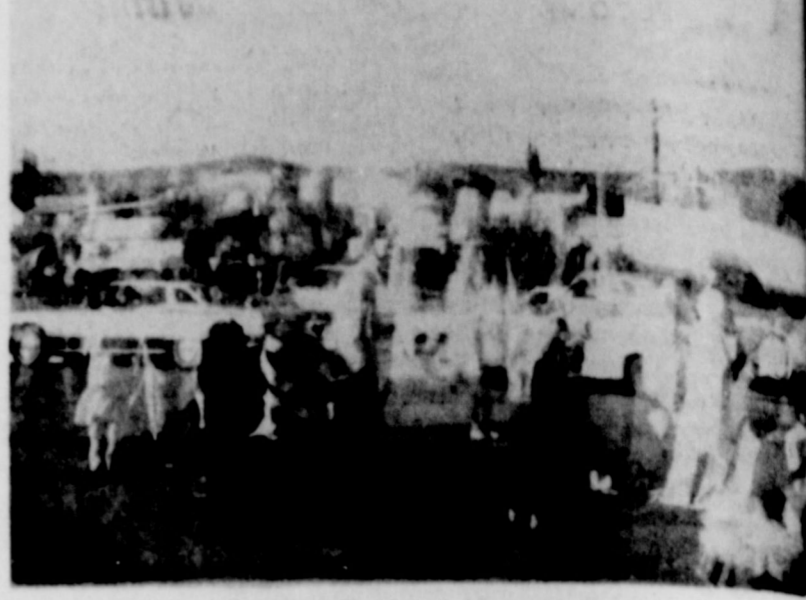

### MOD Activity It Outlined

The National Foundation March of Dimes supports a nationwide network of medical service and research programs through funds made available by the generosity of a concerned citizenry interested in providing a better quality of life for future generations. These programs are aimed at finding the causes and cures of birth defects, and in counseling parents on the types of birth defects, whether they were genetically caused and how they can be treated and prevented in the future.

In Texas, the March of Dimes supports three types of research programs and eight medical service programs. A portion of each chapter's March of Dimes campaign income is channeled into research to stimulate researchers to study the causes and cures of birth defects, and into medical service programs to provide diagnosis and treat-

ment centers. The three types of research programs in Texas are: basic research, clinical research, and starter grants for young scientists. In Texas, there are 11 scientists engaged in research funded by the March of Dimes representing an investment of \$293,576.00.

In addition to these research projects, an additional \$174,338.00 has been invested in medical service programs in an effort to initiate creative programs that otherwise might not be available to a community.

Texas March of Dimes chapters have also invested \$500,000.00 in local community projects that range from buying needed intensive care equipment for medical institutions to provide youth education seminars, professional medical training and health career scholarships to provide free pre-natal care.

March of Dimes contributors support all these programs and much more as they also make possible funds to develop edu-

cational materials on drug abuse and venereal disease and its relationship to birth defects sickle cell anemia, Cooley's anemia, and Tay-Sachs literature; films for school and library use; pre-natal care and rubella immunization information, and free family medical records.

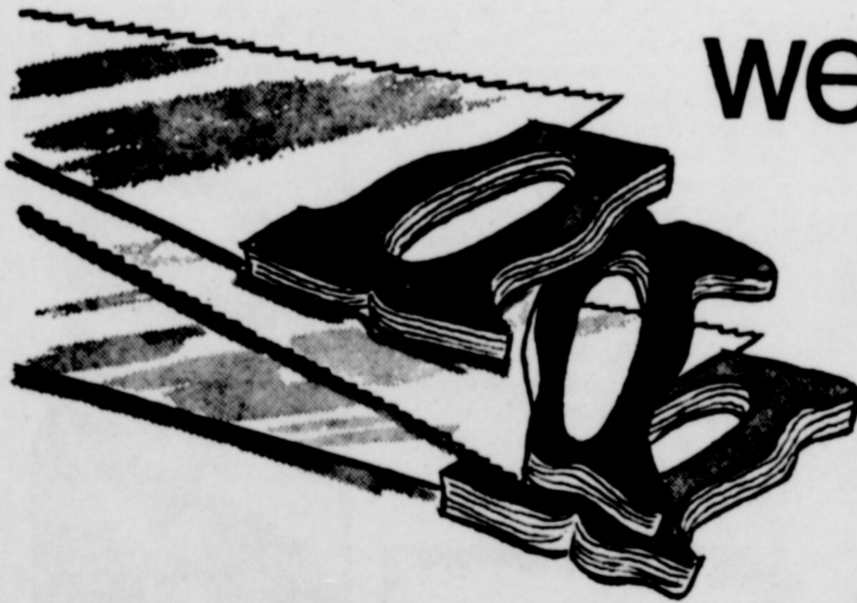

**Report of BOB KRUEGER U.S. Representative**

Last week the House voted overwhelmingly, 397 to 18, to override the President's veto of the School Breakfast and Lunch Program. I was one of only 18 voting against this bill, and several of my friends in Congress jokingly asked me, "What's the matter, Bob, don't you care about hungry children?" And they knew, of course I did. But sometimes, even when one knows a bill

will pass overwhelmingly, he should call attention to what the bill really does.

If the bill had made money available only to children from families with genuine financial need, I would have strongly supported it. But it does not. It gives government subsidies for meals to children from families who earn as much as \$10,000.00. Most people who earn that much are able to afford to feed their own children.

The people whom I represent still hold to that notion that Lincoln expressed so well: that government should not do for people what they can do better for themselves. Government lunches do not taste as good as the lunches that mothers prepare. And they cost more. Most Americans are willing to support programs providing food for those in need. But they know that it costs more to pay taxes to the government and then, after a good deal of paperwork has been done, and employees have been paid, to get the government subsidy for food. They would rather have bought the food for their children in

the first place, if they could afford it; and to leave the subsidies to those who genuinely need it.

Most people want less government, not more, and they want their money to be directed where there is genuine need, not where there is simply an opportunity to spend the money. The school lunch program which the Congress passed had a number of good features that I would readily have supported, including food for needy children and for expectant mothers who run the risk of undernourishment. Had the funds been directed to these sources, they would have been well spent, and well within the existing budget rather than exceeding them by one quarter billion dollars as this bill did.

A principal in one of the small rural schools in our district pointed out that his program requires his school to offer breakfasts as well as lunches. This means, he continued, that instead of getting a good country breakfast at home, many students have to catch the school bus for as long as 1-1/2 hours before they can have breakfast. And the breakfast they then receive tastes worse than what they would have had at home, two hours earlier.

My philosophy professor used to remind us, "The road to hell is paved with good intentions". I suppose the road to some pretty bad breakfasts is well paved with good Congressional intentions as well.

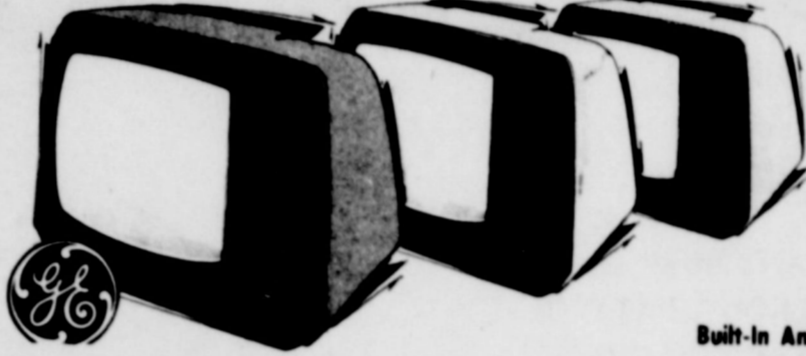
