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Viet Nam may just be a troublesome word to most Friona residents; a present-day communist "pressure point" which they would like to ignore, and perhaps it will go away. However, it is a very real situation for some local people.

Billy G. Zachary, an Aviation Electronics Technician Second Class member of the United States Navy, has been participating in the air strike operations against communist Viet Cong and North Vietnamese military targets while serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Midway.

....

Zachary, the son of Mrs. Arthur Stokes of Friona, has been on the Midway, operating in the South China Sea off the coast of Viet Nam with the U.S. Seventh Fleet.

On Sunday, April 25, Zachary wrote the following letter which was made available for publication. It makes you stop and remember that freedom is a very expensive luxury, especially when you realize that Americans, even Frionans, are this moment risking their lives so that free people may remain free.

Zachary's letter was as follows:

. . . . "Last night Capt. O'Brian of USS Midway in his talk to the men of Midway brought up a rather interesting point.

"In reference to the steel strike that is to begin on May 1, 1965 he brought out the fact that while some people are asking for a shorter work week (less than forty hours per week) and an increase of ten to twenty per cent in their pay, they are not only hurting the economy of the United States, but in turn they are probably doing as much to lower the moral of the American Service men as any one thing in the history of the nation.

"Perhaps not all people feel about it the way I do, but as he said, the people over here doing the fighting, right or wrong, would appreciate a cut to a thirty-two hour day and almost any kind of a raise. People everywhere know there aren't thirty hours in a day. I realize this, but after about the first seventy-two hours straight they start to seem like a day each. ....



"I know nothing about the Steel Industry, but I know that we are on the verge of a war and any slow-down in the production of metal will be felt in all phases of American life and in a hurry. This may be the main idea behind calling a strike at this particular time, I don't really know, I just feel that this is a pretty low way of forcing your demands on the American nation.

"If you really want to get in on some strikes that may in the future help you and all the rest of the people in the world, then how about backing up or helping all the people of the world who want to stay free. Has it been so long since the world was at war that the people have forgotten the hardships that go along with this type of a conflict.

....

"If some people are only thinking of the fast easy money that was made during WW II. maybe you should remember that we won that war and it never reached the soil of the United States. I feel that if this turns into a war between two of the world's major powers, it will not only reach the soil of most of the nations of the world, but will destroy enough of the people and producing soil for such a period that it will take several decades at the very least and perhaps centuries for mankind to again reach its present state of living.

"All of this wasn't said directly by the captain and a lot of it is just my point of view. I can't back all of this up with proof, but it seems that all anyone has to do is stop and think, using a little common sense.

"Right now I figure the American economy could use a boost, especially when bombs cost approximately fifty cents per pound, one round of twenty MM ammo is two dollars and five cents, one can of Napalm costs two hundred and seventy five dollars and rockets cost one thousand and fifty dollars per pod. This runs into a large sum of money when you try to imagine the amount that we are using each day in the war for free-





#### Dear Bill:

We are beginning our third year of water management studies in the Parmer County area on April 1, 1965.

Computations from the past two years' records show a consistent amount of water recovered per return system. In 1963 the systems observed averaged 79 acre-feet recovered per system and in 1964 averaged 80 acre - feet per system. Weir loss records were comparable in 1963 and 1964.

Beneficial chemicals recovered with the irrigation tail water were also comparable over the two-year period.

An actual count of the recovery systems in Parmer County is not known, but we believe there are nearly 200 in use, and additional new ones being installed every day.

Most of them are restricted to particular communities at particular times, and for the most part, the rest of the Texans won't even be aware of them, in spite of enthusiastic efforts of local publicists to spread the word. At Munday, for example, on June 18 (which will be Friday) there will be an annual Vegetable Festival celebration. On May 7 Panola County will observe a Queen Pageant, and on April 24 the German settlement of Boerne will observe Saengerfest. Down in the valley, Raymondville will take a day off on April 15 for an Onion Fiesta. . . and there are a total of 287 other local celebrations on the crowded calendar.

One which isn't but ought to be, is Canadian's own "Rodeo Week" which will happen on the half a dozen days preceding a somewhat more widely recognized holiday, the Fourth of July, or Independence Day.

The Texas Calendar of Events is published by the State Highway Department in an effort, to help Texans. . . and tourists. . keep track of what's happening where across this broad state. It covers the period from April 1 through September.

> **Bond Sales** For Quarter Hit \$28.067

Savings Bond sales for the first three months of 1965 in Parmer county totaled \$28,067. Of this amount \$2,786 were purchased during March according to a report released by Frank A. Spring, chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1965 amounted to \$39,286,192, which represents 26% of the state goal of \$152.8 million. The county figure represents 28 per cent of the 1965 goal.

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
