# **Mayor's Minutes** by Ricky White

Leander Davila, City Manager, attended a seminar hosted by the Amarillo Area Foundation that focused on how to write and apply for grant money. The City will be exploring grant options to fund projects in 2019. Some projects being discussed include: A) Grants related to police technology to help fund upgrades to the police dispatching console and emergency warning system. B) Grants related to renovations to the community center to replace the roof and AC/heating unit. C) Grants related to the purchase of trees for the cemetery. D)Grants related to fund a new fire truck. E) A grant through the Texas Parks and Wildlife Service for upgrades to the Friona swimming pool. F) Grants related to recycling services. There is grant money out there waiting for people to apply. The key is knowing where to look and filling out the extensive grant application.

The City worked with TXDOT for the installment of two traffic beacons on Main Street to help in slowing traffic down. The lights will be flashing from 7:15 AM to 8:00 AM and 3:30 PM to 4:00 PM. These lights will coincide with the lights on Highway 60. The speed limit will be 20 MPH during the designated times. We want to thank TXDOT for installing the traffic beacons at no charge to the City or School Administration.

The City will review bids for the seal coat project in February which will make improvements to 25 city blocks which include Grand, 10th Street, Ninth Place, Ashland, Woodland, Prospect, and James Avenue. The City spends approximately \$100,000.00 per year preserving and protecting our streets.

Chief Jimenez and the police officers responded to 142 calls in December. There were 103 stops, 58 warnings, 45 citations and 7 arrests. (2-public intoxication, 1-driving while intoxicated,1-warrant, 1-no drivers license and 2-driving while license invalid with previous conviction). The officers drove a total of 2435 miles patrolling and protecting our city.

Volunteer Fire Department responded to seven emergency calls in December. On December 1st, five firefighters and two trucks assisted EMS on a call. Also on the 1st, eight firefighters and three trucks responded to a car/house accident. On December 10th, three firefighters and one truck responded to a dumpster fire.

There were two calls on December 13th, crosstie fire (BNSF) and a car accident. On December 14th, there were two calls, smoke alarm alert and a car accident. On December 25th, eight firefighters and two trucks responded to a car fire. The volunteer firefighters are very valuable to our community. We thank them often for the great job they do.

**Emergency Medical Service responded** to 45 calls in December. There were 13-911 calls, 22- transfers and 10 calls ended in a "no transport". Ambulance billing equaled \$53,887.23 and the City collected \$5,312.99.

Judge Campbell had 47 new cases in December. There were 26 cases settled with 4 guilty pleas. Total fines collected \$6,002.70. The City kept \$4,446.70 and \$1,556.00 was remitted to the state.

Accounts Payable totaled \$133,505.57 for the month of December. All bills were paid and the city is in good standings.

Friona Public Library had a total of 574 patrons visits in December, an average of 33 per day and was open for 18 days. There were 623 items circulated and 11 new items added to inventory.

# **County Commissioners conduct first 2019 meeting**

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, January 14th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

The Court approved the purchase of a new pickup for Sergio Mendez at the Extension Office. Three bids were received and the contract for \$29,177.61 went to Stevens 5-Star of Hereford. The pickup is a 2019 GMC Crew Cab, 4x4, 3/4-ton diesel. The bid included the trade-in of the 7-year old vehicle currently being used.

The Minutes from the pre-

vious meeting were read and approved. Approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Commissioners also reviewed the Treasurer's Report and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

Richard Villarreal was approved as the new Veteran's Service Officer. Richard lives in Bovina and is a 25-year U.S. Army veteran (retired).

The Court approved the 2019 Holiday schedule. The courthouse will be open all day on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and will then be closed for the rest of the week. The courthouse will be open until noon on

Christmas Eve and then will be closed for the rest of the week. The courthouse will be closed on New Year's Day only. The full holiday schedule can be found on the website.

The Court selected members for the 2019 Salary Grievance Committee. These 9 members, plus 2 alternates, are selected from the Grand Jury Pool and will serve on the committee for one year. A bond for the Deputy Clerk in the Parmer County District Clerk's Office was also approved.



#### From the Friona Star Archives

#### January 15, 2015

The Friona volunteer fire department has a new tanker truck. It is a 2007 Freightliner. They bought the truck chassis in Clovis and the tank was installed at 4-Way Pump. Light bars and other accessories were provided by the Parmer County Sheriff's office. They traded in the tractor from an old semi-tanker truck. The cost of approximately \$30,000 was paid by the fire department from funds earned by the annual sale of raffle tickets to give away a 4-wheeler during Maize Days. Fire Chief Jim Taylor, shown with the new tanker, said the department was proud to be able to purchase the truck with fire department funds and sends thanks to everyone for their continued support of the fire department.

### January 18, 1997

Tory Lynn Snyder, 24, of Friona, remains in critical condition at Northwest Texas

Hospital in Amarillo as a result of an apparent January 11 robbery at Friona's west Allsup's store. Snyder suffered massive head injuries during the robbery. He was transported to NWTH by Friona EMS ambulance where he underwent a four and one half hour operation. Officials said that he suffered at least three blows to the head with a blunt instrument. Snyder was discovered in a store aisle by two customers about 4:35 a.m. Saturday. An undetermined amount of money was taken during the robbery. Two other local men who entered the store around 4:15 a.m. to make purchases, reported to police seeing at least one Hispanic male customer in the store. Both men, who were in the store at separate times, came forward to give police a description of the man they observed. Local police, in conjunction with the Clovis Police Department, have released two composite drawings of a possible suspect or suspects. Police Chief Randy Genies reported last Wednesday that due to the nature and severity of his injuries, police have been unable to question Snyder. The composite drawings appear elsewhere in this issue. If you have any information regarding suspects, please call the Friona Police Department at 806-247-2711, or Parmer County Crimestoppers at 800-774-TIPS, or 481-9178. Parmer County Crimestoppers will pay a reward of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person or persons responsible. Snyder moved to Friona from Lubbock and lives with his grandmother, Cora Snyder. He had been employed at Allsup's for about one year. At press time, his condition was reported as slightly improved. Although doctors stated he remains in critical condition, they were able to remove him from a respirator. A love fund has been established at Friona State Bank to assist the Snyder family with expenses during this lengthy recovery period. Donations for the Tory Lynn Snyder Love Fund may be made at Friona State Bank.

#### January 23,1988

According to a survey of Parmer County gins on Monday, a total of 48,392 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County as of Monday, January 18. Ginners indicate that if they could get a week of good weather they could be all but through with ginning the 1987 crop. The large snows received in December slowed the ginning process, although most of the crop had been harvested and was in the form of modules. Muddy fields made it difficult to pick up the modules for a time. The latest survey indicates that the 1987 yield in Parmer County is virtually certain to top the 50,000- bale mark, which is the most bales produced in Parmer County in a number of years. One ginner said that most of the growers had produced two bales of cotton per acre, and all of his customers had made at least 800 pounds of lint per acre. The ginner at Lazbuddie commented that farmers in that area had missed most of the bad weather for the past three years and had made good crops each of those years. " The farmers are good farmers and know how to raise the crop. But the 'man upstairs' made the difference," the ginner said, in regard to the past year's crop. After some cotton farmers got somewhat of a late start with their crop, the weather cooperated in late fall with a beautiful "Indian Summer" and a late first freeze, which was the key to the good yields. Also helping matters has been a better than average price for the cotton. So, the cotton farmers are thanking their lucky stars for this unusual set of circumstances a good growing year combined with good crop prices.

### **Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook**

Gasoline prices in Texas have risen 1.1 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$1.92/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has increased 0.5 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.24/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 34.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 13.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 14.1 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 28.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"With oil prices back over \$50 per barrel, it looks like gas prices in more areas may soon bottom out and start to tick higher. While it doesn't seem that prices will rise very far, it looks more and more like the lowest price of the year may now be behind us," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "The national average briefly hit \$2.22 per gallon last week, but will likely move up slightly or stabilize this week. Gas prices in the Great Lakes saw a noticeable jump last week and tend to see among the earliest trend changes in the country, which may be a harbinger of what's to come for the rest of us."






Sometimes we have an idea of what people are really like

### Local FSA office will reopen temporarily

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced that many Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices will reopen temporarily in the coming days to perform certain limited services for farmers and ranchers. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has recalled about 2,500 FSA employees to open offices on Thursday, January 17 and Friday, January 18, in addition to Tuesday, January 22, during normal business hours. The offices will be closed for the federal Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday on Monday, January 21.

In almost half of FSA locations, FSA staff will be available to assist agricultural producers with existing farm loans and to ensure the agency provides 1099 tax documents to borrowers by the Internal Revenue Service's deadline. Staff members will be available to help producers with specific services, including: (1) Processing payments made on or before December 31, 2018. (2) Continuing expiring financing statements. (3) Opening mail to identify priority items.

While staff are available in person during this three-day window, most available services can be handled over the phone. Producers can begin contacting staff on January 17th. Additionally, farmers who have loan deadlines during the lapse in funding do not need to make payments until the government shutdown ends. Reopened FSA offices will only be able to provide the specifically identified services while open during this limited time.

While January 15, 2019 had been the original deadline for producers to apply for MFP, farmers have been unable to apply since December 28, 2018, when FSA offices closed because of the lapse in federal funding. Secretary Perdue has extended the MFP application deadline for a period of time equal to the number of business days FSA offices end up being closed, once the government shutdown ends. These announced days of limited staff availability during the shutdown will not constitute days open in calculating the extension. Producers who already applied for MFP and certified their 2018 production by December 28, 2018 should have already received their payments.

# Psalm 108 Praising and Trusting God

Praising God and Trusting God are two recurring themes that run through the book of Psalms, and these two important areas are closely linked. If one doesn't fully trust God, they won't praise Him wholeheartedly, and one's lack of praise is often a sign of a lack of trust in God. Psalm 108 blends these two important aspects of a believers life into an encouraging Psalm.

The first five verses lead into a time of intentional praise of God. Notice that intentional Praise is the volitional effort of decided actions that seek to praise God. Intentional praise is not waiting for a feeling, or focusing on self, but having a heart that is for God's exaltation over the nations and His glory to be over the earth. From there he transitions into a focus of trusting in God. The first aspect of trusting God's rule was with things at home. A survey of a variety of Israeli locations brings a reminder that God's people belong to Him and are who they are because of God's promises. Next, though, the Psalmist finishes the Psalm with a declaration of trust in God over all who oppose Him. The cry of "vain is the salvation of man," v12, echoes through the annals of history, and floods over onto us today calling all people to put all their trust in the Lord, who alone saves and satisfies in this life and in eternity.





### F.G. Crofford, 94, of Amarillo died Saturday, January 5, 2019 in Amarillo.

F. G Crofford was born in Clarendon, Texas on August 24, 1924, to Floyd and Gracie Crofford. He grew up on a farm milking cows, and like a lot of boys, knew there had to be a better way. He graduated from Lelia Lake High School in May 1942. After graduating, he played basketball at Clarendon College until he started his military service at the age of 19. Six months after entering the Army in April 1944, he found himself in the 102nd Infantry Division in General George Patton's Third Army. He was a radio technician. He was wounded in The Battle of The Bulge in late 1944 and early 1945, and again in a push from the Rhine to the Elbe River in Germany. For those two injuries, he was awarded the Purple Heart Cluster. He was honorably discharged in April 1946. It was shortly after he returned home to Clarendon that April, that he met his soonto-be bride, Bonnie Drake. They married on June 8, 1946 in Clarendon, Texas. He then finished his education at Clarendon College, and got his bachelor of science degree in physical education and later a master's degree from West Texas State University. He and Bonnie lived in Colorado for a short time so he could help his dad on the dairy farm. While there,



he played some semi-pro baseball. Then they headed back to Texas. His first job was in 1951, at Sunray, Texas, coaching boy's football and basketball. While at Sunray, on November 25, 1952, he and Bonnie welcomed twin girls, Karen and Sharon. He coached and taught in Sunray, White Face, Pettit, Claude, Friona, Gruver, and Spearman. He retired in 1985 from coaching/teaching career with 32 years in the school business and 721 wins in basketball. He guided the Claude girls to the 1962 state championship-one of five trips to the state tournament. He then worked for Horace Mann Insurance for 10 years. F.G. was a pioneer in bringing girls' basketball to the Texas Panhandle. He was the first president of the Texas High School Girl's Coaches Association in 1964-65, was an All-Star Coach for the North for the T.H.S.G.C.A. in 1978, received a distinguished service award in 1984 for his outstanding service and his unselfish devotion to interscholastic league athletics, was awarded the Special Achievement Award from the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in 1985, was inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame in 1990, and was chosen as an honor coach for the Texas Girl's Association in 1998 for his outstanding contributions to girls' basketball.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Floyd and Gracie Crofford, and a little sister Bobbie.





# A lot of spilled milk

According to a report by the Parmer County Sheriff's Office, on Monday, January 14th at approximately 9:30 p.m. a Ruan milk transport truck was traveling west on State Highway 86 after loading product from some of the nearby dairies. The driver apparently encountered a number of cattle on the roadway approximately 2.5 miles east of Hub on SH 86. The truck hit some cattle causing it to swerve to the right and crash onto its side flipping over and rupturing the tank. Just under 8,000 gallons of milk was dumped onto the roadway and into the ditch. A total of ten head of cattle were hit and killed. A short time later, a white SUV with four occupants came upon the scene. It was believed

that the SUV hit one of the dead animals causing the vehicle to flip and crash near the transport truck.

According to Sheriff Randy Geries, no one was seriously injured and all parties refused medical treatment. TxDOT was called and they had to pour sand on about 100 yards of roadway since the milk coated the road and caused it to be slick. TxDOT was also going to bring in equipment to try to clean up the spill due to spoilage of the raw milk. When I think of a roast, memories of Sunday sue and will need to be cooked low and slow. lunch with potatoes, carrots, and roast gravy come to mind. a method of cooking. Roasting is a dry method of cooking. When roasting, the meat is cooked with little or no extra liquid. Sometimes the temperature is increased for short periods of time to brown the outside of the meat, but then the meat is cooked at a low temperature for an extended period of time.

Another way of preparing tough cuts of meat is through braising. Braising is a wet method of cooking. This method browns the meat and then adds liquid and aromatics. To finish cooking, you cover the dish and then cook on a low temperature for a long time.

I think most people are familiar with a Sunday pot roast, so I tried to find a couple of different ways to prepare a chuck roast. Both of these recipes are good when you want to come home to a dish that has been cooking all day and is ready to eat for supper.

# Siesta Roast N' Beans

Cross the Border Cookbook by Janel Franklin and Sue Vaughn

Place in a large pan	
Place on top of roast	2 cups pinto beans, uncooked
	1 can green chilies, chopped
	1 can tomatoes
	1 onion, chopped
	1 can tomato sauce

Cover entire contents with water. Place in 250° F oven covered with lid. Cook at least 12 hours. (May cook longer). Season with salt and pepper. Serve with salad, cornbread, and a dessert for a complete meal.

### **Slow Cooker French Dip Sandwiches**

### Ingredients

- 2 cans, 21 ounces condensed French Onion Soup
- 1 can, 10.5 ounces Beef Consommé
- 3-4 pounds beef chuck roast
- 8 sandwich rolls
- 8 slices provolone cheese

### Instructions

- 1. Place the roast in a slow cooker. Pour the soup and consommé over the top.
- 2. Cover and cook on low for 8 hours or high for 4 hours.
- 3. Remove 3 cups of the juice from the slow cooker with a measuring cup or ladle and add to a small sauce pan. Turn heat to medium and bring to a boil. Reduce to a hard simmer and let cook until reduced by half,

about 10 minutes.


- 4. Transfer the beef to a pie plate and shred with a fork.
- 5. Place the sandwich rolls in a 9x13 pan and spoon meat into each roll. Top with provolone cheese. Cover with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 5 minutes or until the cheese is melted.
- 6. Serve immediately with the sauce on the side for dipping.
- PLEASE NOTE: All slow cookers are different, and some take longer/shorter than others. If your meat is not easily shredding after cooking, keep cooking it! It will get tender and easy to shred if it cooks long enough. If you double this recipe or use a larger roast, you will need to add cooking time as well.


# Why this Sunday's total lunar eclipse is called the 'super blood wolf moon'



The moon will turn red over the United States on Sunday night during the last total lunar eclipse of the decade. A total lunar eclipse occurs during a full moon when the moon passes directly through the Earth's shadow, causing it to turn rusty orange or dark red in color. The lunar eclipse will be visible across all of North America and South America, and partially visible in Europe and Africa, on the night of Jan. 20 into the early hours of Jan. 21. This will be the first total lunar eclipse visible in its entirety across the U.S. since Dec. 21, 2010.

The best viewing conditions are expected across a swath of the central and southwestern U.S where it will be mainly cloud-free. "It's going to be very cold with temperatures in the single digits and teens in parts of the Midwest and Plains," AccuWeather Meteorologist Mike Doll said, so people will need to bundle up when heading outside to look at the moon.

Folks planning to see the moon turn red will need to stay up late on Sunday night as the eclipse will not reach its peak until just before midnight. The first phase of the eclipse, known as the penumbral phase, will begin at 9:36 p.m. EST. However, the moon may not become noticeably darker until the partial phase of the eclipse begins at 10:34 p.m. EST. The most-anticipat-





ed part of the eclipse, totality, will begin just before midnight and last for around an hour as the moon passes through Earth's innermost shadow. This is when the moon will turn rusty orange or red in color. The total eclipse is set to end around 12:43 a.m. EST, after which, the moon will gradually regain its normal color. Those that miss this eclipse will need to wait until May 26, 2021 for the next opportunity to witness a total lunar eclipse.

Sunday night's total lunar eclipse will appear similar to those in the past, but has been given the unofficial nickname of the 'super blood wolf moon.' "Although it's a bit of a silly sounding name, it does have a basis in some real phenomena," said Caleb Scharf, director of astrobiology at Columbia University. The term blood moon has emerged in recent years due to the color the moon turns during the height of a total lunar eclipse. "Blood Moon' is not a term used in astronomy. It's more

of a popular phrase, perhaps because it sounds so dramatic. It simply refers to a 'total lunar eclipse," according to the Old Farmer's Almanac website. This eclipse also falls during the first supermoon of 2019 when the moon appears slightly larger than normal. Preceding the terms 'supermoon' and 'blood moon,' a Full Wolf Moon is simply the name bestowed upon January's full moon. "In Native American and early Colonial times, the full moon for January was called the Full Wolf Moon. It appeared when wolves howled in hunger outside the villages," the Old Farmer's Almanac reported. These three terms have been combined to form a longwinded nickname for the upcoming lunar eclipse. No special equipment or glasses are needed to view the lunar eclipse, but people may want to bundle up when stepping outside on the chilly January night. "A pair of basic binoculars would be fun - you'll definitely get more out of the experience," Scharf said.

Stargazers staying awake after the eclipse is over will also be able to see an astronomical event known as a conjunction. Venus and Jupiter will appear side-by-side in the southeastern sky between 5 a.m. local time and sunrise. These planets will be hard to miss, as they are the brightest planets in the night sky.
