Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will award several \$2,000 scholarships in May to eligible applicants of immediate families of active members and active employees of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative. Since the program began back in 1998, DSEC has awarded \$360,000 in scholarships to members across the cooperative's sys-

Applicants may be either traditional high school graduates or students wishing to continue their education after an extended absence. Applicants must be of good character as evidenced by at least three letters of recommendation from three different sources. Selection will be based on grade point average, community activities, service work and recommendations. Secondary criteria will include a written essay, SAT/ACT scores and academic honors.

Applications may be obtained from area high schools, extension offices of Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Oldham counties, or Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative's office in Hereford, or on the website www.deafsmith. coop. City Council authorizes bond payments

The Friona City Council met in special called session on Wednesday, February 13th at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

No one addressed the council during the public hearing portion of the meeting. The first action taken was the approval of the Minutes of the January 14th regular city council meeting.

Next, the Council approved the calling of a city officer's election and notice of election to be held on Saturday, May 4th, 2019 and authorized the mayor to sign a joint election agreement with the Friona Independent School District.

Chief Jimenez gave the Friona Police Department report regarding budget, expenses, personnel, and upcoming activities. He informed the Council that Officer John Torres would graduate from the police academy in Amarillo on March 7th. The Chief also presented the final statistics in the annual racial profiling report. The Council then voted to approve the 2018 Friona Police Department Racial Profiling Report.

The Council approved the transfer of \$352,151.57 from the interest & sinking account to the pool bank account in order to make two bond payments. A payment of \$123,037.82 was made to First Financial and a payment of \$229,113.75 was made to the Bank of New York. Both payments were due on February 15, 2019.


The accounts payable and financial statement for January 2019 were presented. After discussion, the Council

voted to approve both items. City Manger Lee Davila presented information to the Council concerning Hotel Occupancy taxes and their possible and appropriate usage by the city. Further discussions will be held on the subject at a later date.

The Council approved a request by Jorge Nabor for a variance that will encroach one foot from the property line at 505 Main. Mr. Nabor presented signatures from affected property owners giving their permission for the variance.

The next council meeting is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Monday, March 11th.





State Capital Highlights

Senate panel focuses on funding of public education

AUSTIN — When Texas legislatures meet every two years, lawmakers' singular, must-do assignment is to produce a state budget.

Toward that goal, the Senate Finance Committee held meetings on Feb. 11, 12 and 13 to work on Article III of Senate Bill 1. That article focuses on the public and higher education parts of the state budget for fiscal years 2020 and 2021.

The meetings, replete with acronym-spattered expert testimony from the Texas Education Agency, the Teacher Retirement System and others, dealt with funding areas within public education. Lumped together, public education funding almost certainly will require more than half of the state's general revenue. The ballpark estimate of total general revenue is \$112 billion.

Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, said SB 1 includes:

1.) \$2.4 billion to fund enrollment growth for public education, based on an estimated 65,000 additional students per year;

2.) \$3.7 billion in additional funding for teacher pay raises;

- 3.) \$2.3 billion to reduce reliance on recapture under the so-called "Robin Hood" sys-
- 4.) \$8 million, an increase of \$3 million, for Pathways in Technology Early College High School, a partnership between technology-based companies and public education; and
- 5.) \$230 million to maintain current health insurance premiums and benefits for our retired teachers through TRS-Care.

Nelson also mentioned SB 500, the supplemental appropriations bill, which as presently written includes \$100 million for school safety, more than \$600 million to address Hurricane Harvey-related expenses for public education and \$300 million to address the Teachers Retirement System pension.

"As a former teacher," Nelson said, "I want to ensure that our schools have the resources necessary to properly educate our students and prepare them for success. Education is the great equalizer, and we need to make sure all Texas students have access to a quality education," Nelson added.

Panel OKs mental health bill

Senate Bill 10, legislation to create the Texas Mental Health Care Consortium, was unanimously approved by the Senate Health & Human Services

Committee on Feb. 12. Next stop for the bill will be consideration by the full Senate.

Authored by Sen. Jane Nelson, the bill would leverage the expertise of Texas' medical schools to bolster mental health resources for Texas children and adolescents. The Senate budget, as outlined in SB 1, would allocate \$100 million in new funding for SB 10.

Gov. Abbott declared the legislation an emergency item in his State of the State address. All 31 senators are signed on as co-authors of SB 10.

"Texas has been making strong progress on mental health with innovative programs that expand access to care. This bill will help better identify children and adolescents with mental health challenges and connect them with the treatment they need before they become a danger to themselves and others. Under this legislation we can also better address our workforce needs and support mental health research," Nelson said.

- In addition to creating the consortium, SB 10 would:
- 1.) Establish mental health "hubs" at health-related institutions consisting of psychiatrists, social workers, referral specialists and other mental health professionals;
- 2.) Establish the Child Psychiatry Access Network, allowing pediatricians and primary care providers to consult with mental health experts on treatment options for their patients;
- 3.) Establish a program allowing youth to be screened for mental health conditions through telemedicine.

SB 10 also would:

- 4.) Increase residency opportunities for psychiatry students in community settings;
- 5.) Expand and coordinate mental health research at our health-related institutions; and
- 6.) Direct that judges be educated about mental health resources in their communities.



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have risen 6.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.03/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has increased 3.0 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.31/g, according to GasBuddy.

Prices Monday were 24.9 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 9.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national average has increased 6.8 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 19.6 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"Gas prices have advanced to their highest level in nearly two months mainly following as oil prices move higher. Gasoline demand remains seasonally weak, but last week's report from the Energy Information Administration showed refinery utilization plunging, meaning less gasoline is flowing out of refiners," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "In addition, bullish data and optimism on a U.S.-China trade deal helped propel markets last week, as well as turmoil in Venezuela making a strong case for an larger absence of heavy crudes the market depends on. But while gas prices are nearly guaranteed to be higher in May than today, it is looking more likely that the rise in prices this year may be more muted than we've seen in years past when prices launched 35-75 cents during the spring."














Don Harrington Discovery Center awarded a copy of the Sun, Earth, Universe exhibition

Potatoes

Potato, potahto ...whichever way you say it, potatoes are a versatile and nutritious dish to add to any meal. We can once again thank the Spanish Conquistadors for bringing the potato from Peru to Europe when they conquered South America. The earliest trace of the potato was in the Peruvian Andes around 6000 BC. The potato grew on the banks of Lake Titicaca in the mountains. The Andean farmers soon discovered that the plant grew well in high altitudes. The Inca Indians also grew potatoes from around 1000 AD - 1400 AD. One potato dish called chuño was a main food item for the Inca's.

It is commonly believed that Sir Walter Raleigh introduced the potato to Ireland in 1589 when he planted them on 40,000 acres near Cork. The potatoes were then carried through out Europe by sailors. It took some time for the crop to catch on since farmers first believed that potatoes were a distrustful crop. However, potatoes soon became a staple food since they contain most of the vitamins needed for sustenance. They became especially important to those living in poverty. From 1845-1849 the potato blight hit Europe and was particularly devastating for Ireland where much of the

population depended on the potato for food. During the blight, around half of Ireland's population emigrated to Canada, Australia, or the United States.

Potatoes continue to be a staple for much of the world. They are the fourth largest crop following rice, wheat, and maize. Their popularity is growing in the Asian regions as well. One third of the world's potatoes are grown and harvested in China and India.

In the United States, potatoes are found in about 200 different varieties. These varieties fall into three types: Starchy, Waxy, and All-Purpose.

Potatoes have recently been less favored because of their starch content, but remember they are also an excellent source of vitamin C, a good source of potassium, a good source of vitamin B6, and are fat, sodium, and cholesterol-free. The skin of the potato is a good source of fiber.

Here are just two of the many ways to enjoy a potato with your next meal.

Potatoes Au Gratin

Ingredients

1/4 cup unsalted butter, (60g, 2 ounces) 1 tablespoon minced garlic, (8g)

1/2 cup finely chopped yellow onion, (72g)

1/4 cup all-purpose flour, (30g, 1 ounce) 2 cups whole milk, (480 ml)

3/4 teaspoon kosher salt, (4g)

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1/8 teaspoon nutmeg 2 pounds yukon gold potatoes, (908g) peeled

and cut into 1/8-inch thick slices

1 cup shredded gruyere cheese, (117g, 4 ounces)

1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese, (117g, 4 ounces)

2 teaspoon chopped chives, (1g)

Instructions

Set the oven rack to the middle position and preheat oven to 400°F. Melt butter in a large sauté pan over medium-low heat. Add garlic and onions, sauté until fragrant, 2 minutes. Add flour, whisk to combine, stir and cook for 2 minutes. Gradually whisk in milk and cook until thickened over medium heat, 2 to 3 minutes. Turn off heat and whisk in salt, pepper, nutmeg, 1/2 cup gruyere, and 1/2 cup sharp cheddar cheese. Grease the bottom and sides

of an 8 by 8 by 2-inch casserole dish. Layer half of the potatoes, in overlapping rows in the dish. Spread half of the cheese sauce over the potatoes. Sprinkle 1/4 cup gruyere and 1/4 cup cheddar over the sauce. Layer the remaining potatoes, followed by cheese sauce, and sprinkle with the remaining gruyere and cheddar cheese. Cover potatoes au gratin with foil and place on a baking sheet. Bake for 30 minutes, remove the foil and bake until potatoes are tender, and cheese is browned and bubbly, 20 to 25 minutes. Garnish potatoes with chives.

Key Tips for Making Potatoes Au Gratin

Yukon Gold are great for this recipe, but russet potatoes will work as well.

Peel and slice the potatoes into 1/8-inch thick pieces for even cooking.

Overlap half the potatoes to create a base, spread the sauce, cheese, and repeat.

Infuse more flavor by adding gruyere and cheddar cheese into the sauce and sprinkling extra between the layers.

Cover the baking dish with foil to help gen-

Finish cooking the potatoes uncovered to create a melty, golden cheese crust.

Roasted Potatoes with Parmesan Cheese by Diana Rattray www.thespruceeats.com

These savory potatoes are easy to prepare and roast, and a combination of Parmesan cheese, olive oil, and garlic. The thyme helps flavor the potatoes but feel free

to change up the seasonings. Use some oregano and basil or add more garlic. See the tips and variations for more ideas.

The potatoes come out

crisp on the outside and tender on the inside. For even browning and crisping, turn the potatoes about every 15 minutes.

Bottom of Form

Ingredients

2 1/2 pounds potatoes (about 6 to 8 medium red or gold potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch cubes)

4 tablespoons olive oil

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder (or garlic salt) 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon thyme (dried leaf)

1 cup Parmesan cheese (grated)

Steps to Make It

1. Preheat the oven to 400 F (200 C/Gas 6).
2. Line a large rimmed baking sheet (jelly roll pan or half sheet pan) or roasting pan with foil. Lightly oil the foil.

3. In a plastic food storage bag or large bowl combine the cubed potatoes with the olive oil, seasonings, thyme, and Parmesan. Toss to coat thoroughly.

4. Spread the potatoes out in a single layer in the prepared baking pan and roast in the preheated oven for 55 to 60 minutes, until nicely browned, turning 3 or 4 times with a spatula throughout the roasting time.

Parmesan Roasted Potatoes With Parsley: Omit the thyme and toss the potatoes with 2 tablespoons of fresh chopped parsley when they come out of the oven.

Garlicky Parmesan Roasted Potatoes: Add 4 cloves of finely minced fresh garlic to the potatoes with the olive oil.

Italian Herb Parmesan Roasted Potatoes: Add 1/2 teaspoon of dried leaf oregano and 1/2 teaspoon of dried leaf basil along with the thyme.

Replace part or all of the olive oil with melted duck fat or canola oil.
