Election News

City Council

The Friona City Council Election has been cancelled. Three positions were on the ballot and only three individuals applied. Incumbents Alan Monroe and Bruce Fleming will remain on the Council for another term each and Jeff Stowers will replace Nancy Davis at the May council meeting to begin his first term. Nancy chose not to seek re-election.

Parmer County Hospital District

The Parmer County Hospital District Election has been cancelled. Two positions on the Board of Directors was on the ballot and only two individuals applied. Incumbents Danny Kendrick and Ricky Barnett will remain on the Board to serve another term each.

Friona Independent School District

The FISD Board of Trustees Election will be held on May 4th. Two positions on the Board are available and three individuals have applied. Darrin Gilley, Jeri Lynn White, and Cindy Moreno will be listed in that order on the ballot. Darrin currently serves on the Board and current Board President Becky Riethmayer is retiring. The proposed school bond will also be on the ballot.

Celebrate

Three events on same day!!!

March 2nd is **Texas Independence Day**. It is the celebration of the adoption of the Texas Declaration of Independence on March 2, 1836. With this document, signed by 59 delegates, Mexican Texas officially declared independence from Mexico and created the Republic of Texas.

Also, March 2nd is also Sam Houston Day because it is the day Sam Houston, famed Texas war hero, president, and governor, was born.

Plus, March 2nd is also Flag Day in Texas. It is clearly the most patriotic day of the year to be a Texan!

Texas Flag & Pledge

The Texas Flag Code assigns the following symbolism to the colors of the Texas flag: blue stands for loyalty, white for purity, and red for bravery. The code also states that the single (lone) star "represents ALL of Texas and stands for our unity as one for God, State, and Country." The "Lone Star" is still seen today as a symbol of Texas's independent spirit, and gave rise to the state's official nickname "The Lone Star State."

The pledge of allegiance to the Texas state flag is "Honor the Texas flag; I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one state under God, one and indivisible."

Sam Houston: Texas Game-Changer

No single name is more revered in Texas than that of Sam Houston. Not because that name has been given to countless schools, libraries, and public spaces, and to our biggest city. No. Sam Houston is revered by Texans because the man deserves it. He led the battle of San Jacinto, which won the Texas War of Independence. Then he became the first president of the fledgling Republic of Texas. Then,

three years after his first term ended, he came back for a second, out of sheer love and duty. When the Lone Star Nation became a U.S. state, the people elected him senator. Then they elected him governor. And let's not forget that before Sam Houston became Texas's most famous Texan, he'd already started the first primary school in Tennessee (though he'd received little formal education of his own), been a congressman and governor for Tennessee, fought against the mistreatment of Indians before Congress, and taken a bullet in the War of 1812. The challenges Houston faced in life would certainly have been more than enough to take down almost any man. 











Friona ISD 2019 Bond Election

Frequently Asked Questions

What is a "bond"?

- A school district general obligation bond (a "school bond") is similar to a home mortgage. It is a contract to repay borrowed money over time at a fixed interest rate. Interest paid on the bond is tax exempt for the bond holder. School bonds are approved by voters and sold by a school district to lenders/ underwriters to raise funds to pay for the costs of construction, acquisitions, renovations and equipment.

How are the bonds repaid?

- School bonds are paid with property taxes. A school district has two components to its total tax rate: the Maintenance and Operations ("M&O") tax rate and the Interest and Sinking Fund ("I&S") tax rate. A school district levies an annual I&S tax rate against the taxable property in the district to make its bond payments. The I&S tax rate can only be levied for the repayment of bonds that have been issued following voter approval. School bonds can only be used for the reasons permitted by law, and as approved by the district's voters; typically, renovation, construction and equipment of school facilities, the purchase of land or sites for school facilities, or for the purchase of school buses.

How much is the bond?

The proposed bond measure before the District's voters is \$19 million. If the bond measure is approved, Friona ISD also intends to utilize approximately \$2 million from the County Permanent School Fund, subject to distribution from the Parmer County Commissioners Court, and \$500,000 from the District's operations account.

Do the tax limitation agreements between the District and wind farms affect the District's property valuations for bond repayment?

- The tax limitation agreements in place for the wind farms only apply to the District's M&O tax. If the bond measure is approved by the voters and bonds are issued, the District's I&S tax rate will be imposed upon the actual appraised value of the wind farms' taxable property.

Is there a tax exemption for homeowners who are at least 65 or disabled?

-For taxpayers who are over the age of 65 or disabled, home property taxes will not increase if an "Over 65" or "disabled" homestead exemption has been granted. This tax freeze is on the homestead only, and may be increased if major renovations to the property occur after the exemption is granted. For more information on these exemptions, call your County Appraisal District.

What is the term/payback period of the bonds?

- Depending on the projects being financed with the bond issue, a school district bond may have a term of between 20 and 35 years (but may not exceed 40 years). The anticipated term of the District's proposed bonds is 20 years.

What will the interest rate

- The interest rate will depend on market conditions, and a rate will not be determined until the bonds are sold, which would occur only if the bond measure is approved by the voters. Texas school district bond issues are secured by a pledge of I&S taxes and also qualify for the State Permanent School Fund Guarantee. This Guarantee allows school bonds to receive a higher rating; meaning bonds will likely be priced at the lowest available interest rate at the time of issuance.

What does the District want to accomplish if the bonds are issued?

- The list of proposed bond projects includes, but may not be limited to, the follow-

New Primary School: To be connected to the west side of the existing Elementary School. This proposed facility includes new academic classrooms, library/ storm shelter, primary school offices, other spaces, new playground/equipment, and relocating existing play equipment. Abatement and demolition of existing Primary School.

Elementary School: Renovation and security improvements to school's main entrance, expansion of cafeteria and kitchen renovation for an additional serving line and re-working existing playground.

Junior High School: Renovation and security improve-

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ments to school's main entrance, relocation of football practice field to old Primary School site.

High School: Construction of New Band Hall/Storm Shelter, renovation of existing Band Hall to Choir Room and connecting corridor/offices.

High School, Junior High, Elementary Schools: Fire alarms/extension of existing fire alarms, new windows, renovation of certain restrooms and parking lots for accessibility.

Early Childhood Center: New Playground.

*This list is not exhaustive. Projects may not be constructed in the order listed, and are subject to change as District needs are assessed and refined.

Why a bond now?

- In 2016, Friona Independent School District commissioned a facilities study and assessment. The results of that study recommended replacement of several facilities. However, budget constraints meant prioritizing the most important projects; those that addressed education as well as safety and security. After studying existing campus safety and security, educational opportunities, facility structural condition and feasibility of building renewal, the citizens' committee determined that moving the Primary

School and adjoining it to the west side of the existing Elementary School campus, and constructing secure entrances to the other academic campuses were the most economical and preferred options to address the operational and safety needs identified by the facilities study.

What was the process used by the Board when deciding to order the bond election?

- The District sought the input from a group of approximately 12 FISD citizens who met regularly for almost a year. The Committee's charge was to review the results of the facility assessment report, study master-plan options and formalize a recommendation to the School Board that would address the District's facility needs. The Citizen's Committee also reviewed information from the District's financial advisor and ultimately recommended an \$18-\$20 million bond measure to the FISD Board of Trustees on February 11, 2019.

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

From the Friona Star Archives

March 3, 2016

A 1959 Friona fire truck returned home over the weekend. The fire truck was up for auction in Altus, Oklahoma. It was owned by an individual collector who is deceased and his family was holding an auction. Holly and Danny Campbell attended the auction and after some spirited bidding they bought the fire truck. It has a 5-speed manual shift, a 500 gallon water tank, and lots of memories. It was delivered to the Friona fire department in November, 1959. The Campbell's counted at least 13 family members that have been on the Friona Fire Department and three are still currently firemen. Plans are for the fire truck to be on display at the community center for Tuesday's Chamber of Commerce banquet

February 25, 2010

Friona's Manuel Diaz, cowboy pen rider, and Craig Hitchcock, assistant manager, at Paco Feed Yard, Inc.; Bill Sterling, head cowboy at West Plains Feedyard, Inc.; and Elton Turley, assistant manager at Caprock Industries, were among those selected for the program based on employer recommendation, management potential and interest, and compliance with the University's academic admission standards. "The largest concentration of fed cattle in the nation is right here in the Texas Panhandle," Dr. Jerry Miller, dean of the T. Boone Pickens College of Business, said. "We have a responsibility to prepare local residents for management positions in our major industry." WTAMU administrators and faculty designed the 30-credit-hour, 2-1/2 year program which includes courses in English, speech, accounting, entrepreneurial studies, global economics, management, marketing, finance, computer information systems and commodity strategies. "The program will challenge our faculty as well as the students," Miller said. "Unlike most classes,

this is a very homogeneous group, and we can target all of our coursework to the cattle feeding industry." The students meet at Hereford High School once a week from 4-10 p.m. Tuesday evenings for English 101 and CIS 105, taught by WTAMU faculty members, Kathleen Ebell and Dr. Teri Giddens, respectively. "Some of the students are already in managerial positions and would like to improve their skills. and others are seeking promotions," Ebell said. "They

are all very motivated, and I try to relate the material to the cattle feeding industry. If they're learning as much about English as I am about cattle feeding, it will be a very successful semester." Miller is planning to offer similar courses in Dumas beginning fall 1996. Funding for the program is provided by a legislative initiative for agriculture/business awarded to West Texas A&M University, participating feedyards and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

Make Better Brain Health a Top Priority

Working on a jigsaw puzzle, learning a new language and playing strategy games are a few ways to strengthen your memory -- as long as they are new and challenging tasks. Research has also found correlations between higher levels of formal education and a better cognitive reserve -- so sign up for a class!

Another way to promote brain health is taking care of your mental health. Managing stress and anxiety is not only important for overall health and wellbeing, but studies have found a link between depression and increased risk of cognitive decline. Take care of yourself and seek medical treatment if you have symp-

Being social may also support brain health. That's right. Add "hang out with friends" and "have fun" to your list of healthy habits. Better yet, take on several of these lifestyle changes for maximum impact. For example, enroll in a dance class with a friend.

Alzheimer's researchers are now looking into whether a "cocktail" of these interventions can protect cognitive function. The Alzheimer's Association's U.S. Study to Protect Brain Health Through Lifestyle Intervention to Reduce Risk (U.S. POINTER) is a two-year clinical trial that hopes to answer this question, and is the first such study to be conducted of a large group of Americans

While there's currently no certain way to prevent Alzheimer's and other dementias, there is much to be gained by living a healthy lifestyle and adopting brain health habits that you enjoy, so that you stick with them for the long haul.

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Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have risen 8.0 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.14/g yesterday, according to Gas-Buddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has increased 6.1 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.39/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 12.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 15.8 cents per gallon higher than a month ago. The national

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


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Serving Locally—Pride of Place

As we complete our plan, WT 125 - From the Panhandle to the World, I have reflected on how a regional university serves its home. WT does not wish to be like any institution in Texas or anywhere else. We are the Panhandle.

WT is the only general academic institution in the Panhandle, and it provides over 70% of the schoolteachers and administrators in the top 26 counties (the Panhandle) with at least one degree. There are 23,635 WT alumni, representing 40% of the Panhandle population, who live in the Panhandle and earned at least a bachelor's degree. These graduates serve fami-

lies, communities and various enterprises. We serve most who educate many.

In the last two-and-one-

half years, WT, through The Texas A&M University System, has invested over \$200 million in new facilities in Randall and Potter counties. Most of those resources leave Canyon, Texas, every day headed to Amarillo and other Panhandle communities—paychecks and property taxes in tow. The WT payroll, student spending and visitors contribute nearly half-a-billion dollars to the Panhandle economy annually. WT serves through economic prosperity and will grow if correctly nur-

In January WT initiated a doctor of education degree tailored to the needs of smaller rural school systems like those of the Panhandle. The inaugural class of 29 students is twice what was expected. WT serves through locally responsive education.

WT's Paul and Virginia Engler College of Business, widely recognized for excellence, enrolls over 2,700 students. Two of three students are online, but all faculty must teach at least one course on campus and live in our region. Serving locally through excellent business programs produces worldwide impact.

WT's Sybil B. Harrington College of Fine Arts and Humanities provides a cultural foundation for the entire Texas Panhandle by training performers and artists for the Amarillo Symphony, the Lone Star Ballet and the TEXAS outdoor musical. The college enables other organizations



and communities in the Panhandle to transmit culture and values. Over half the professionals who preserve and enhance Panhandle community culture are WT graduates. This is the highest public service a university can provide. It is learning's purpose.

The Harrington Academic Hall WTAMU Amarillo Center houses communication disorders, special education, licensed professional counseling, graduate social work, school psychology and instructional technology programs for upper-level and graduate classes. The WT Amarillo Center is also home to the Speech and Hearing Clinic, the Center for Learning Disabilities, the Small Business Development Center and the Panhandle Area Health Education Center. WT's nursing program plans to move its home to the WT Amarillo Center filling the facility to capacity to better serve our region.

Lastly, a \$200 million capital campaign that will easily be the largest such effort in the history of the Texas Panhandle is in the early planning

round primal cut. It is found on the rear leg and rump of a beef. It is then divided into the retail cuts: the top round, bottom round, and the knuckle. This part of the beef is exercised regularly so it is a tough cut. However, since it is farther back on the animal it is a lean cut as well. If not cooked properly, the meat will be tough and chewy.

The bottom round and eye of round are also known as the outside round and rump roast. The top round is often called the inside round. Both of these cuts are ideal for roast beef sandwiches. It is best to cook them to medium rare and then thinly sliced. The knuckle or sirloin tip is a very tough piece of meat. It is best to braise this cut like you would for any

The top round is often cut into round steaks as well. These are familiar cuts that are often tenderized. They are used to make chicken fried steak and swiss steak, as well as our recipes this week.

Smothered Steak by Sharon White

4-6 round steak, preferably tenderized 4 medium sized potatoes, peeled and sliced

to make gravy

1 ½ cups cheddar cheese

Heat a medium skillet with vegetable oil. Mix the flour with the salt and pepper. Then lightly coat each steak with the flour. Then brown the steak until browned on both sides. After the steak is browned, remove it from the skillet and place on the bottom of a 9x13" dish. While browning the steak, peel and slice the potatoes. Layer the potatoes on top of the steak being sure to make just one layer. Then use the skillet to make a cream gravy. Add flour to the skillet to make a roux. When the oil and flour mixture are brown, add the milk. Stir the milk until it begins to boil and thicken. Then add the can of cream of mushroom soup. Pour the gravy over the potatoes and steak. Finally, sprinkle the grated cheddar cheese on the top. Cover the dish with aluminum foil and bake at 3250 F for 1 1/2 hours or until the meat and potatoes are fork tender. You may want to remove the foil for the last five minutes of cooking to brown top of the dish.

Bills Aim to Bring High-Speed Internet to Rural Texas

AUSTIN, Texas - State lawmakers have filed bills to help bring high-speed internet to rural Texas.

Senator Charles Perry (R-Lubbock) and Reps. Charles "Doc" Anderson (R-Waco) and Four Price (R-Amarillo) have sponsored bills that seek to improve broadband access in areas of Texas that are currently underserved. Broadband refers to highspeed internet access that is always on and is faster than a dial-up connection. It includes technologies like Digital Subscriber Line (DSL) and cable modem.

While broadband access is a problem in many places, the sparseness of rural communities often creates an extra barrier for consumer access. In many parts of rural Texas, residents often pay higher prices for lower quality service, if they can get broadband at all.

AARP Texas, a nonprofit and nonpartisan advocacy association for older persons, and Glasshouse Policy, a Texas-based nonprofit, support the measures, which were filed this week. The bills are: Senate Bills 1103 and 1104 by Senator Perry, House Bills 2422 and 2423 by Representative Anderson, and House Bill 1960 by Representative Price.

"These broadband-access proposals offer a solution to a real problem facing many rural Texans," said AARP Texas Director Bob Jackson. "Access to broadband can help older Americans live independently in their homes and communities. It also combats social isolation and improves well-being by supporting services like distance learning and telehealth."

SB 1103 and HB 2423 create a broadband office within the Public Utility Commission of Texas that would provide grants to public or private entities for projects that stimulate the installation and maintenance of broadband in rural areas. The bills also authorize the PUC to set statewide goals for broadband deployment, coordinate various local and state governmental efforts, act as an information clearinghouse on the issues, and be empowered to seek federal funding.

SB 1104 and HB 2422 would encourage deployment of broadband conduit, such as fiber-optic cables, on state-owned land and in state buildings. Meanwhile, HB 1960 creates a 15-member Broadband Council to advise the Legislature on steps needed to improve access in rural areas.

Commissioners approve school fund distribution plan

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, February 25th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

The Minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Approval was given for payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Commission ers also reviewed the Treasurer's Report and approved the calculated payroll and disbursement for all county employees and elected officials.

The Court discussed the County's policy on the disposition of the body of deceased paupers. Since detailed written policy could not be found, the Court approved a written contract with Hansard Family Funeral Home of Friona, Texas. The policy involves direct cremation only and allows for a predetermined amount to be paid for each occurrence.

Next, the Commissioners revisited the Permanent School Fund Distribution Plan. This involves funds from oil leases that are held by the Court and distributed to the four school districts in Parmer County. Since the Texas Attorney General has required a more detailed census of school enrollment in the county, the Commissioners approved a formula that involves resident students that live in a school district in Parmer County and scholastics that are age 5-21 who are enrolled and have a Parmer County home address. Details of the formula have been sent to all four school districts.

In other business, the Court approved a request to place a water line under a county road that was located in Precinct 2. A request from Friona ISD for a little over \$17,000 of Permanent School Fund money to be used for added security measures was approved. Also, 20 hours of continuing education hours was approved for the Parmer County District Clerk. The discussion regarding the selling of a one (1) acre parcel of land in the northeast part of the county was postponed until the next meeting.

The Court gave approval to the Parmer County Sheriff's Office to apply for a 100% grant from the State of Texas for the purchase of rifle resistant body armor. The Court also approved the 2018 Racial Profiling Report. The next scheduled Commissioner's Court meeting is at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, March 11th.



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

State Capital Highlights

Caucus names legislative priorities for public education

AUSTIN — The Texas House Democratic Caucus on Feb. 21 announced its "Texas Kids First" educationfunding package that would include all-day pre-kindergarten, teacher raises and retirement and property tax

"We hope to work with our colleagues to incorporate some of these ideas into their bills," said Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, caucus

Caucus member Rep. Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, a former Austin Independent School District board president, said Texas rates 42nd in the nation in per-student funding. She said Texas public school students are funded \$2,300 per year below the national average.

The proposed funding package is embodied in several bills that caucus members have filed or are in the process of filing, and would add some \$14.5 billion more in baseline budget estimates. Items to be covered include:

- Teacher pay and benefits

- Incentives for educating low-income students, children speaking little or no English, and special-needs pupils;

- Funding for the hiring of more counselors;

- Using money from the Rainy Day Fund for retired

- A monthly state contribution of \$100 toward teachers' health care premiums; and

- A one-time \$500 teacher reimbursement for out-ofpocket school supply pur-

The caucus also proposes to achieve property tax relief by doubling homeowners' exemptions from \$25,000 to \$50,000, an amount they suggest would give most homeowners a break of up to \$325. **Defendants settle**

with state

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Feb. 19 announced that Xerox Corporation and several of its former subsidiaries, including Conduent Inc., agreed to a \$235.9 million settlement with the State of Texas.

The settlement resolves a lawsuit brought by Paxton's office under the Texas Medicaid Fraud Prevention Act and other grounds regarding the processing of prior-authorization requests by dentists to deliver orthodontic services to Medicaid patients. Xerox and its companies, Paxton said, were responsible for reviewing and approving or denying requests by Medicaid providers to deliver orthodontic services between January 2004 and March 2012.

Paxton's office determined that employees of Xerox, Conduent and related companies rubber-stamped orthodontic prior-authorization requests without assuring the required review of each request by qualified clinical personnel. As a result, expensive, taxpayer-funded orthodontic work was performed on thousands of children who either didn't meet the Medicaid standard for braces or didn't require treatment. The Medicaid program does not pay for braces for cosmetic purposes. Under Texas law, only those requests that meet strict Medicaid program requirements are allowable.

Oil & gas boom to continue

Commissioners Ryan Sitton, Christi Craddick and Wayne Christian of the Texas Railroad Commission on Feb. 20 told the state Senate Committee on Natural Resources & Economic Development that discoveries of massive energy reserves in West Texas would enhance the state's

booming energy industry. Christian said the reserve found in the Wolfcamp Shale and Bone Spring Formation in West Texas is estimated to contain more than 46 billion

barrels of oil and 281 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, enough to support decades of production at current levels.

Craddick told the panel that in 2017, the Legislature set a target for the Railroad Commission to plug 1,900 "orphan" wells in the 2018-2019 biennium. She estimated that the commission would cap more than 3,000 such wells by the end of 2019.

Sitton said the demand for the Railroad Commission to plug non-producing wells is also going to increase as the industry grows, and for that, the agency is requesting \$39.1 million in 2020-2021 to support the well-plugging program.

Governor

nominates justice Gov. Abbott on Feb. 21 nominated Houston attorney Justin B. "Brett" Busby to be Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas, Place 8, for a term to expire Dec. 31,2020.

Busby, if confirmed by the Texas Senate, would succeed Justice Philip W. "Phil" Johnson of Amarillo, who retired from office effective Dec. 31,

Busby served as a justice on the Texas 14th Court of Appeals from 2012 to 2018.

House honors former speaker

Former Texas House Speaker James A. "Jimmy" Turman died Feb. 13. He was 91. His body lay in honor in the hall of the Texas House of Representatives on Feb. 22.

Turman represented Fannin County from 1955 through 1963 and served as speaker during the 57th Texas Legislature in 1961-63.

Abbott extends declaration

Gov. Greg Abbott on Feb. 14 extended the State Disaster Declaration for Texas counties affected by Hurricane Harvey.
