Monday's meeting of the FISD Board of Trustees marked the last such meeting for retiring School Board President Becky Riethmayer. Vice President Andy Montana presented her with a plaque and gift from the Board in appreciation for her years of service. Becky expressed how much she appreciated their hard work and commitment to quality education. She also thanked the community of Friona for allowing her the opportunity to represent them.

# City Council hears from local students

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Wednesday, April 10th at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Council heard a presentation from members of the Friona Junior High Student Council concerning cross walks and traffic signage. It was deemed that more research was needed before any action could be taken. The Council thanked the students for their presentation and their interest in the community.

During the public comments period, new Atmos Energy representative Mike Gonzalez introduced himself to the Council. Next, Mayor Ricky White issued a "National Library Week" proclamation and presented certificates to the Friona Public Library and Friends of the Library.

Ricky Barnett, head of the Bond Steering Committee, made a presentation to the Council regarding the upcoming bond election on May 4th. He discussed details of the proposed construction project for each school campus and what effects the bond passage would have on the taxpayers.

Next, approval was given to establish a Visitor Impact Commission which included defining the scope of the work to be done and outlining membership guidelines for the Commission.

Debra (Cooper) Campbell gave a report to the Council concerning a block grant available to purchase fire, ambulance, and service trucks. The grant will pay up to \$500,000 for the purchase of new vehicles only. The cost to the City would only be a \$5000 buy in. Debra told the Council that the Friona Volunteer Fire Department needed to replace Engine 1, and that they also needed a new attack truck. A quote for \$450,000 had been obtained for the new equipment. A survey would have to be performed before the grant could be submitted to make sure that Friona would meet the middle-to-low income wage requirements.

The Council gave approval authorizing the grant application.

The Council heard from Noemi Perez concerning the utility bill for the Walnut Park Apartments (formerly Cottonwood). Noemi is the new manager of the property that is owned by KN Properties. Discussion centered around the new water meter that was installed and a possible software glitch concerning the billing. Both parties agreed to proceed with average monthly billing using prior water usage during the past year until the software problem could be resolved.

In other business, the Council approved the Accounts Payable and Financial Statement for March 2019. The Council also approved the 1st quarter (January thru March 2019) financial statement and the Minutes of the March 11, 2019 meeting. Also, approval was given to the annual review of the City's investment policy and the Council heard a report from the Friona Police Department.

All meetings are open to the public. The City Council reserves the right to go into Executive session at any time. Go to cityoffriona.com to find the agendas and minutes from previous meetings. 

# Mayor's Minutes

Greetings!!!

The City of Friona will recognize the week of April 7th - 13th as "National Library" week. This is an annual celebration highlighting the valuable role libraries, librarians and library workers play in transforming lives and strengthening our communities. Libraries are at the heart of our cities, towns, and schools providing critical resources, programs and expertise. They also provide a public space where all community members, regardless of age, culture or income level, can come together to connect and learn. National Library week is an exciting opportunity for library supporters and libraries of all types to raise awareness of their value and impact in their community. We want to recognize and say thank you to the Friona Public Library and the Friends of the Library for their great service to this community.

The Friona Volunteer Fire department will be applying for a grant through the Texas Community Development Block Grant Program. The application is asking for \$500,000.00 to replace two fire trucks. The deadline for this application is set for May 23, 2019. We want to thank Debra (Cooper) Campbell for the work she has done fulfilling the requirements for this application.

On March 11, 2019 the city council heard a presentation from Leander Davila, regarding Hotel Occupancy Taxes and their use, such as making improvements to the community center which serves as a local hub for tourism. The city council has directed the city manager to create a commission to help define how Hotel Occupancy Tax revenue should be spent and make those recommendations to the city council.

Chief Jimenez and the officers responded to 171 calls in March. There were 133 stops, 79 warnings, 54 citations and 12 arrests. (1 driving while intoxicated, 1 - possession of marijuana, 5 - no driver's license, 4 - warrants and 1 - manufacture with intent to sell)

Judge Campbell had 51 new cases filed in March. There were 153 cases that were disposed. Total fines collected were \$15,656.32, with \$4,259.12 remitted to the state.

Friona Volunteer Fire Department responded to 10 calls in March. On March 3rd, there were two car accidents. Six firefighters and 2 trucks responded to both accidents. On March 4th, 6 firefighters and 4 trucks responded to a fire alarm which ended in a false alarm. Four firefighters and 3 trucks responded to a car accident on March 8th. On March 12th, 6 firefighters and 1 truck responded to a car accident. On March 21st, 5 firefighters and 2 trucks re-

sponded to a car accident. Five firefighters and 1 truck responded to a grass fire on March 22nd. On March 23rd, 8 firefighters and 4 trucks responded to a house fire. Four firefighters and 1 truck responded to a dumpster fire and on March 30th, seven firefighters and 3 trucks responded to a car accident.

Emergency Medical Service responded to 43 calls in March. There were 15 calls for 911, 18 calls for transfers and 10 calls ended in a "no transport". Ambulance billing equaled \$49,691.40 and collected \$18,584.69.

Accounts Payable for the month of March totaled \$152,627.37. The revenues and expenses compared to the cities budget are doing very well. All bills are paid and the city continues to be in good standings.

Friona Public Library was open 20 days in March with 710 patron visits an average of 39 visits per day. There were 711 items circulated with 58 new items added.



# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

#### From the Friona Star Archives

Technology at Friona High School has taken a giant leap forward in recent months with the designing and printing of a 3-D finger. Almost a year ago, Bryant Masse, FHS ISS instructor, was firing a pistol when it misfired and severed his left middle finger below the second joint leaving him with just a nub. During a conversation with his friend, Coach David Towner, Digital & Interactive Media instructor, not too long after the accident, Towner mentioned, "Wouldn't it be cool if we could print you a new finger?" Fortunately, for Towner and Masse, FISD Superintendent Pam Ray had approved the purchase of a 3-D printer and it would be delivered in June.When the current school year started the students in Towner's class were learning the Google Sketchup and to draw in 3-D. Towner

gave them the task to design a prosthetic finger. Masse, Towner, and the students studied a number of YouTube videos to get a grasp of what would be needed to make the new digit work. Masse also pointed out that one man had used bicycle parts to build a prosthetic finger. The students creating the first renditions were Manuel Castaneda, Jr., Samuel Chihuahua, Erika Grado, Fabian Ledezma-Gonzalez, Verenice Mendoza, Raul Silva and Taylor Stallings. After many trials and errors, the class members submitted their renditions of the new finger. Towner combined the students renditions and used the best of the designs.It wasn't until the second semester began that actual measurements were taken and fabrication began. Students Bryan Arzate, Austin Mercado and Jason Kelley were assigned to do the measurements. The measurements were made with a caliper. Every step of building the finger had to be measured and re-measured before being printed. Measurements were taken for every socket, top and bottom, and length from tip to base and the linkage length. "We saw a nub and started measuring it," stated Kelley. The finger was printed in red PLA (polyactic acid) plastic and Black Ninja Flex. The PLA material takes the place of what would be bones in a normal finger. The Ninja Flex material would take the place of softer structures in a finger (fat and muscles). It would also give a softer touch to anyone who would come in contact with it giving a more realistic touch. Both colors where cho-

sen to represent the Friona

lor Stallings. The first finger

long. Adjustments were made and a finger of suitable length was printed and trying to make sure the knuckles would line up with the rest on the hand. The next issue to conquer was getting the finger to move and flex. Inside the finger is an elastic band which pulls the finger straight and fishing line allows it to bend when the finger moves. The fishing line was attached to a plastic stick that stretches along the back if the hand and is attached to a piece of yarn tied around Masse's wrist to insure movement. The piece of yarn is to be replaced with a bracelet of Masse's choosing.Masse's muscles in his hand had begun to atrophy so the new finger will medically help ease the atrophy. He expects to have a year of building the muscles and endurance.

# **Easter Eggs**

Holiday traditions often evolve over time to what we know and practice today. Easter is no exception. The egg has long been a symbol of new life. Christians use the egg to symbolize Christ's resurrection and emergence from the tomb.

Having fresh eggs was a luxury for many during the early years of Christianity so the egg became a precious symbol. It was required of early Christians to give up meat, eggs, and dairy during Lent. This meant that Easter was the first time in many weeks that eggs could be enjoyed.

The first known coloring of eggs was in Mesopotamia where they colored the eggs red to symbolize the blood of Christ. English villages brought gifts of eggs to their manorial lords every holiday. Eggs were also given as an offering on Good Friday. The first written account of colored eggs was from Edward I in 1290 Britain. He bought 450 eggs to be "colored and distributed among the royal entourage." At a later date, the Vatican sent Henry VIII an egg enclosed in a silver case as a seasonal present. During the late 19th and 20th centuries, children became a focus for holidays and colored eggs gained in popularity.

There are many ways to decorate eggs. Just look at Pinterest. But the easiest method is the traditional dipping of eggs in food coloring. I am especially fond of using a white crayon on the egg and then dipping it into the dye to leave a design on the egg. You can buy kits or create the dye mixture yourself. Below are a few ideas that might come in handy if you decide to color eggs for Easter this year.

#### **Hard Boiled Eggs**

Place eggs in a large saucepan. Cover them with cool water by 1 inch. Slowly bring water to a boil over medium heat; when the water has reached a boil, cover and remove from heat.

Let sit 12 minutes.

Transfer eggs to a colander; place under cool running water to stop the cooking. Eggs can be peeled and served immediately.

#### Hard Boiled Egg Facts from www.countryliving.com:

- Hard boiled eggs left in the shell will last up to a week in the refrigerator.
- · Peeled eggs need to be eaten the same day. · It is not recommended to
- freeze hard boiled eggs. Hard boiled eggs left at room temperature will only last about two hours. Then

they need to be discarded.

- If the outside temperature is 90oF, the eggs should be discarded after one hour.
- If you color hard boiled eggs and plan on eating them, be sure to store them properly in the refrigerator.
- When eating colored eggs, only use dyes that are meant to be eaten such as food grade dyes or food coloring
- meant for cake decorating.
- · Toss out any cracked eggs. If the dye reaches the inside of the egg when you peel the shell, discard the egg.
- Use the float test to see if the egg is spoiled. Drop the raw egg in a pot of water. If it sinks, it is good to cook and eat. If it floats, throw it

#### **Coloring Hard Boiled Eggs**

- 1 tsp. vinegar
- · Food coloring used for cake decorating
- ½ c. water at room temperature.
- Hard boiled eggs

In a bowl, add the vinegar and food coloring of your choice and mix gently. Add the water

and stir to combine. Using a spoon gently place the hard-boiled egg in the mixture. Move the egg around in the mixture to coat the egg. The longer the egg stays in the mixture, the darker the color of the egg. Do this for each color of egg you desire. Place the egg on a plate or back in the egg carton to dry before handling.

## **Naturally Dyed Easter Eggs**

## Per cup of water use the following:

- 1 cup chopped purple cabbage = blue on white eggs, green on brown eggs
- 1 cup red onion skins = lavender or red eggs • 1 cup yellow onion skins = orange on white
- eggs, rusty red on brown eggs
- 1 cup shredded beets = pink on white eggs, maroon on brown eggs
- 2 tablespoons ground turmeric = yellow
- 1 bag Red Zinger tea = lavender eggs

Add one tablespoon white vinegar to every cup of strained dye liquid.

For every dozen eggs, plan on using at least four cups of dye liquid.

## **Ingredients**

- Hard-boiled eggs, room temperature (white or brown eggs, preferably not super-fresh)
- · cup chopped purple cabbage per cup of wa-
- 1 cup red onion skins per cup of water 1 cup yellow onion skins per cup of water
- 1 cup shredded beets per cup of water • 2 tablespoons ground turmeric per cup of
- 1 bag Red Zinger tea per cup of water
- White distilled vinegar (1 tablespoon per
- cup of strained dye)
- · Liquid neutral oil, such as vegetable or grapeseed

## **Equipment**

- · Saucepan with lid
- White dish
- · Fine-mesh strainer
- · A second saucepan or bowl
- · Baking dish or other container
- Paper towels

## Instructions

- 1. Gather your ingredients: You can make separate batches of different colors or one large batch of a single color. Follow the ratios given above for each ingredient to make more or less dye.
- 2. Add water to a saucepan: Pour the amount of water you need for the dye you're making into a saucepan.
- 3. Start making the dye: Add the dye matter (purple cabbage, onion skins, etc.) and bring the water to a boil.
- 4. Adjust the heat: Turn the heat down to low and simmer, covered, for 15 to 30 minutes.
- **5. Check the color:** The dye is ready when it reaches a hue

a few shades darker than you want for your egg. Drip a little dye onto a white dish to check the color. When the dye is as dark as you like, remove the pan from the heat and let the dye cool to room temperature. **6. Strain the dye:** Pour the

- cooled dye through a finemesh strainer into another saucepan (or into a bowl then back into the original pan if that's all you have).
- **7. Add vinegar:** Stir the vinegar into the dye — use 1 tablespoon of vinegar per cup of strained liquid.
- 8. Pour the dye over the eggs: Arrange the room-temperature eggs in single layer in a baking dish or other con-

tainer and carefully pour the cooled dye over them. Make sure the eggs are completely submerged. If you want your eggs to be more vibrant and less pastel, give the eggs multiple soaks in the dye, being sure to dry them between stints in the dye.

9. Put the eggs in the fridge: Transfer the eggs in the dye to the refrigerator and chill until the desired color is reached.

10. Dry and oil the eggs: Carefully dry the eggs, and then massage in a little oil to each one. Polish with a paper towel. Store the eggs in the refrigerator until it is time to eat (or hide) them.

# **State Capital Highlights**

#### Top officeholders join together in push for funding solution

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dennis Bonnen on April 10 released a joint statement promoting a twofold method for the 86th Texas Legislature to curb property tax increases across the state.

"Texans are fed up with skyrocketing property taxes. At the beginning of the legislative session, the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker laid out an agenda for property tax relief through the passage of Senate Bill 2 and House Bill 2 to limit property tax growth," the state's top officeholders said.

SB 2 and HB 2, the notyet-approved property tax reform bills, would reduce the revenue growth increment used for determination of the rollback tax rate from 8.0 percent to 2.5 percent for taxing units other than small taxing units unless the voters in a small taxing unit election decide to opt-in to the proposed new voter-approved tax rate procedure. The goal of both pieces of legislation is to reduce tax revenues for local taxing units and increase costs to the state through revised formulas for education funding.

Abbott, Patrick and Bonnen also pushed lawmakers to pass legislation that would allow Texans to vote to offset local property tax revenue by increasing local sales taxes by a penny.

"We are introducing a sales tax proposal to buy down property tax rates for all Texas homeowners and businesses, once Senate Bill 2 or House Bill 2 is agreed to and passed by both chambers," they said in the joint statement. "If the one-cent increase in the sales tax passes, it will result in billions of dollars in revenue to help drive down property taxes in the short and long term."

Senate and House members of both political parties have expressed reluctance to cede local control in their districts to tax revenue-generating proposals coming from Austin. Another dimension is that a club-like Senate tradition requires at least threefifths, or 19, of the body's 31 members to agree to bring a measure to the floor for debate.

Patrick, who presides over the Senate, reportedly last week was entertaining the possibility of breaking with precedent by allowing the tax reform proposal to come to the floor with only 16 votes. There could be enough agreement among the body's Republican members to fall in line with Patrick's wishes.

As the possibility of property tax caps and a sales tax tradeoff simmers in the Senate, passage is harder to predict in the majority-Republican but not-so-collegial House. Differences in the House and Senate versions of the tax reform bill would have to be reconciled in a conference committee before returning to the full bodies for final approval.

#### **Budget bill to conference**

Lawmakers' constitutionally mandated job is to pass a state budget. As always, it's a messy process to do that.

House Bill 1, the state budget bill for fiscal years 2020 and 2021, was referred to a House-Senate conference committee on April 11 after the House refused to concur with Senate amendments to the bill.

Speaker Bonnen named as conferees House Appropriations Committee Chair John Zerwas, R-Richmond, and Reps. Greg Bonnen, R-Friendswood; Sarah Davis, R-West University Place; Oscar Longoria, D-Mission; and Armando Walle, D-Houston.

Senate conferees likely will be named by Lt. Gov. Patrick this week.

#### Sales tax holiday is set

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on April 11 reminded Texans they may purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies. The sales tax holiday is scheduled for April 27-29.

"While we can't know in advance when the next flood, tornado or hurricane may strike, we can make sure our families, homes and businesses have the supplies they need to face these and other emergencies," Hegar said.

Items covered by the tax holiday include, for example:

- Household batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75;
- Hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and
- Portable generators priced at less than \$3,000.

#### Tax revenue is distributed

Comptroller Hegar on April 10 announced his agency would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$705.3 million in local sales tax allocations for April.

The amount is 8.4 percent more than distributed for the month of April 2018. The allocations are based on sales made in February by businesses that report tax month-

# **Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook**

Texas gas prices have risen 6.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.55, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 24.6 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, and stand 7.2 cents per gallon higher

than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.27 today while the most expensive is \$3.29 per gallon. The lowest price in the state today is \$2.27 while the highest is \$3.29 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.82 while the most expensive is \$5.29 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 7.4 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$2.83 per gallon. The national average is up 28.7 cents per gallon from a month ago, and stands 12.2 cents per gallon higher than a year ago. "The national average gas

price has now risen for the ninth straight week, adding 57 cents a gallon in that time and now costing Americans about \$200 million more per day than it did to start the year. The effect of rising prices isn't about to let up as a spate of refinery outages on the West Coast and in California has given way to a tightening of summer blended gasoline in advance of the summer driving season set to kick in in the weeks ahead," said Dan McTeague, senior petroleum analyst with GasBuddy. "Even with early signs of markets reaching their heights for California-spec fuel, the damage has been done and gas prices are still playing catch up to the highs of April. With California pump prices now firmly over \$4 a gallon, the march to \$4.15 may be attained in the weeks ahead before any relief, while the rest of the nation faces the prospect of \$3 a gallon by month's end."

## April Is National Garden Month

# **Incorporating Native Plants In Landscapes Can Help Save Water**

April is National Garden Month! Incorporating native plants in your landscape can provide color and

save water at the same time. "Native plants have adapted to withstand the Panhandle-South Plains climate. Not only are they accustomed to our dry, hot weather -- but native plants are an important component of our regional ecol-

ogy. They can help support pollinators and other wildlife," says Education/Outreach Coordinator Katherine Drury with High Plains Underground Water Conservation District in Lubbock. She is also a Texas Master Gardener.

"HPWD would like to share some favorite native plants that are beautiful and have low water requirements," she said.

American Basketflower is a striking Texas native. This beautiful purple wildflower often blooms along roadways in spring. "Basket flower" refers to the strawcolored bracts beneath the flower head. Although it resembles a thistle, it lacks

their prickly characteristics. Blackfoot Daisy can be found growing during the driest and hottest of years. Local horticulture experts reportedly found a mound of Blackfoot Daisies during the 2011 drought. These little flowers grow in low mounds and are perfect for

flower beds. Chocolate Daisy is native to the southwestern United States and Mexico. Not only is it a beautiful, drought-tolerant perennial, but it actually smells like chocolate!

Prairie Coneflower can be found across Texas. It is a quick and aggressive grower that is easily started from seed. If you are growing these in your garden, allow the plants to go to seed after flowering ceases in Autumn. You can then collect the seeds or mow down the stalks.

Tahoka Daisy is native to the Texas South Plains. It was first discovered in 1898 at Tahoka Lake. The Tahoka Daisy, also called Prairie Aster, is an annual wildflower that prefers sand or gravel soils in full sun.

"These are just a few of the native plants available for local landscapes. Homeowners should consider using plants that flourish in high temperatures and low rainfall conditions," says Drury.

Created in 1951 by local residents and the Texas Legislature, the High Plains Water District works to conserve, preserve, protect, and prevent the waste of underground water within its 16-county service area. HPWD is the first groundwater conservation district created in Texas.
