Parmer County to purchase new voting machines

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, July 8th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May and the Treasurer's Report was also approved.

Commissioners approved the purchase of ten new voting machines at a cost of \$33,409.07 per year for three years. The machines are approximately the size of a laptop computer. You will vote electronically and a ballot with your vote will be printed out on a card. If you make a mistake, you will be able to cancel your ballot and vote again. The voting machines will not be connected to the internet. The machines will be ready to use in the upcoming November election.

The Court approved a resolution to renew and extend the County's election to participate in tax abatement and the County's tax abatement guidelines and criteria pursuant to Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code.

Consideration of the Parmer County Historical Commission having a plaque dedication in honor of the Courthouse being listed in the National Registry of Historic Places was postponed. The company that had been making the plagues for the PCHC in the past went out of business and a new source for the markers has not been determined.

Consideration of maintenance funding to the Parmer County Soil & Water

Conservation District #140 for the Running Water Draw dams #2 (Bovina) and #3 (Lazbuddie) was tabled. Commissioners wanted to have more information on how the money was being spent before approving any future expenditures. Maintenance funding is a cooperative effort between landowners, Parmer County, and the Conservation District.

In response to the Texas Legislature requiring more transparency and public involvement in governmental meetings, Commissioners approved adding "public comment" as an agenda item for each session of the Court. The Commissioners also approved rules of procedure, conduct, and decorum that would govern the new agenda item.

Approval was given for the use of the Courthouse lawn for Border Town Days to be held on July 27, 2019.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that the 4th of July week had been relatively quiet and that he was currently housing 19 inmates at the Law Enforcement Center.

In other news, the FM 145 Bridge Project is underway, the first stage of highway repair from Bovina to Farwell is moving along, the second stage is still in the bidding process, and the second half of the Bovina to Friona highway renovation is expected to begin next year. Also, BNSF is in the process of putting in a third rail line along Highway 60.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioners Court reserves the right to go into Executive session at any time. Go to parmercounty.org to find meeting agendas. Information in this article is only a summary. Any questions concerning specific actions should be directed to the court.

A Friona Star Interview

with Joy Morton • Teacher/Instructor/Guru

Joy Morton taught in the Friona school system for 42 years. She started in the Fall of 1962 and retired in the Spring of 2004. After a short retirement, she started teaching again at the Hereford campus of Amarillo College. She began this second career in the Fall of 2005 and is still teaching there today.

Summer Drama Workshop is turning 50 this year. What have been the benefits of the program over the years to the participants, the community, and to you as an instructor of fine arts?

According to numerous past participant Summer Drama has presented them an opportunity to connect with "out of towners" and make new and lasting friendships. John and Kathryn Gurley frequently host the high school cast members for after rehearsal gettogethers. All of the workshop participants are able to showcase their talents while having tons of fun.

One of the benefits for the community is the opportunity to witness what the participants have learned in two weeks. Numerous participants have returned to Friona to help with the program, and often their children come to visit other relatives so they can be a part of the workshop. The community of Friona has always supported summer activities and thus has created a wonderful legacy of giving.

Being a "Charles in charge" and/or directing not only provided me with

an opportunity to connect with the participants but also throughout the years to construct tons of props and practice my directing skills.

Every profession, sport, or even activity has a basic set of fundamentals or skills associated with it. What are some of those skills that **Summer Drama Workshop** instructors teach the kids to help them grow and excel as performers?

Students who participate in Summer Drama Workshops are taught the three basic tools of acting: body, voice, and mind. During the course of the workshop the students use these skills at each rehearsal. Ultimately each performer grows and excels.

If you could pick one comedy and one drama to produce, which ones would you choose and why?

For me to select one drama and one comedy to direct would be impossible. There are too many fantastic shows that have been published. I will plead the 5th on this question.

In sports, marching band, etc. there always seems to be that one special year where everything fell together. Did you have a year when your One Act Play had the right students, the right style of play, and the right set of circumstances where everything seemed to work out almost like magic?





Boll Weevil's Beware.....A boll weevil trap stands guard

over a good-looking cotton field south of Friona. The green traps are part of the South Plains region's Boll Weevil Eradication program.

The boll weevil trap is the first line of defense against the cotton boll weevil, a destructive insect that has caused billions of dollars in damages to the US cotton industry since entering from Mexico more than one hundred years ago. The main role of the boll weevil trap is detecting weevil populations in the area. All traps are checked on a weekly basis by Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation program personnel.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have risen 2.0 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.45 per gallon according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 1.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, but are 20.3 cents per gallon lower than a year

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.16 while the most expensive is \$3.25 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$2.06 while the most expensive is \$5.09 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 2.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.75 per gallon. The national average is down 0.3 cents per gallon from a month ago, and 10.9 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"For the second straight week, the national average price of gasoline has moved higher, following energy

market moves from the last few weeks as Iran remains a concern pushing oil higher as well as OPEC extending producing cuts and recent drawdowns in U.S. oil inventories," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "Nearly all motorists have seen the rise with an exception in some areas of the West Coast. Look for another week of gradual increases in gasoline prices, but without a another round of clearly defined upside in oil prices, we may see this current upward trend begin to slowly fade away in the next few weeks."

Xcel Energy plans Texas refund, opens new wind farm

Lower natural gas prices, more wind, driving down costs of area's power generation

Xcel Energy customers in Texas will receive a onetime, \$16

million refund in October related to several months of lower costs for natural gas used to fuel area power plants - savings that are expected to continue with the addition of the new Hale Wind Project near Plainview, which started commercial operations today.

"Historically low costs for natural gas and the addition of more wind energy are significantly reducing monthly fuel charges on customer bills, which in turn help to stabilize customer bills now and in the foreseeable future," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy

Xcel Energy filed the refund proposal today at the Public Utility Commission of Texas. If approved, residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt-hours a month would receive a one-time credit of \$14.53. The refund will be based on the amount of electricity a customer uses in September, and could be spread over two months depending upon a customer's billing cycle. Texas customers also received a fuel-cost refund in January that amounted to \$11.76 on a typical residen-

tial bill. In addition to the onetime refund, Xcel Energy has also reduced the fuel cost factor on customer bills to better reflect current and anticipated costs for natural gas, which is the fuel source for about 50 percent of the region's electricity supply. The lower factors will reduce residential bills by close to

5 percent starting July 1. These savings, combined with expected savings from the new Hale Wind Project, will mostly offset future base rate increases that will be necessary to recover the costs of the wind farm and a significant investment in the region's power grid over the past several years.

"Our investments in the regional grid require a large amount of capital spending, but they are the types of investments that make electricity more economical to produce and deliver to our customers," Hudson said. "The efficiencies gained from adding wind resources and improving the grid, combined with low natural gas prices, have driven residential bills down by more than 4 percent in four years, even before the latest savings are figured in."

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



Alonzo Strickland



Psalm 129—A Cry of God's People

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
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

Lieutenant governor names members to redistricting panel

AUSTIN - Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick on June 28 released the names of his appointees to the Texas Legislature's 2021 Redistricting Committee.

Patrick, who presides over the 31-member state Senate, named Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, as chair of the committee, and Sen. Juan "Chuy' Hinojosa, D-McAllen, as vice chair. He also named 13 more Senate members to the committee, including Sens. Carol Alvarado, D-Houston; Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston; Dawn Buckingham, R-Lakeway; Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels; Pete Flores, R-Pleasanton; Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills; Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola; Eddie Lucio Jr., D-Brownsville; Jose Menendez, D-San Antonio; Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville; Angela Paxton, R-McKinney; Charles Perry, R-Lubbock; Kirk Watson, D-Austin; Royce West, D-Dallas; and John Whitmire, D-Houston.

In January, Texas House Speaker Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton, named 15 members to the House Redistricting Committee, with jurisdiction that includes preparations for the redistricting process. Those members include: Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, chair; Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, vice chair; and Reps. Sheryl Cole, D-Austin; Matt Krause, R-Fort Worth; Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio; Jeff Leach, R-Plano; Ben Leman, R-Brenham; Ina Minjarez, D-San Antonio; Joe Moody, D-El Paso; Chris Paddie, R-Marshall; "Four" Price, R-Amarillo; Toni Rose, D-Dallas; Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston; Armando Walle, D-Houston; and James White, R-

Patrick and Bonnen have not set a date or dates for the committees to meet jointly or separately.

New census will be key

When the redistricting work begins, committee members will use population figures from the yet-to-be conducted 2020 decennial U.S. Census to redraw the boundaries of U.S. congressional districts and Texas House and Senate districts.

Article III, Section 28, of the Texas Constitution requires the Legislature to complete the redistricting job at its first regular session after publication of the federal decennial census.

If the Legislature fails to adopt a redistricting plan by the end of the 2021 legislative session, a Legislative Redistricting Board consisting of the lieutenant governor, comptroller, House speaker, attorney general and land commissioner, shall convene within 90 days of adjournment and adopt a plan within 60 days.

In addition to redrawing Texas House, Texas Senate and U.S. congressional districts, the Legislature also is required to review the 15 State Board of Education

districts for any necessary redrawing of district boundaries.

SCOTUS ruling in play

As Texas' bipartisan 2021 Redistricting Committee goes about its work, a U.S. Supreme Court ruling released June 25 is sure to stimulate discussion during the process.

In the ruling, Chief Justice John Roberts, in writing the majority opinion, remarked that federal courts are unable to decide cases of partisan gerrymander-

"We conclude that partisan gerrymandering claims present political questions beyond the reach of the federal courts. Federal judges have no license to reallocate political power between two major political parties, with no plausible grant of authority in the Constitution, and no legal standards to limit and direct their decisions," Roberts wrote.

So, with the U.S. Supreme Court and lower federal courts no longer the court of last resort for plaintiffs with voting rights appeals based on allegations of partisan gerrymandering, the weight of the job of the redistricting committee increases.

Solicitor general testifies

In other news related to redistricting and voting, Texas Solicitor General Kyle Hawkins on June 25 testified in Washington, D.C., before the U.S. House Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights and Civil Liberties.

The panel heard testimony on continuing constitutional problems with the U.S. Voting Rights Act since the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark 2013 ruling in a case alleging racial gerrymandering. The high court's ruling in the case, Shelby County (Alabama) v. Holder, struck down a provision in the act that required Texas and certain other states to seek preclearance from the U.S. Justice Department or a federal court before making changes to voting laws.

In concluding his testimony, Hawkins said, "As Congress revisits the Voting Rights Act, it must adhere to the constitutional principles the Supreme Court articulated in Shelby County that limit the power of the federal government to impede on fundamental principles of federalism and disturb the coequal sovereignty of the states."

4-ingredient strawberry ice cream

1-pound fresh strawberries

2 tablespoons sweetened condensed milk 1 1/2 cups heavy cream

Rinse and pat dry the strawberries and remove the stems. Cut them into quarters. Slice bananas into ½-inch thick slices. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper, arrange strawberries and banana pieces flat on the tray in a single layer, preferably with some distance between each piece (for easy removal), and freeze overnight till solid. (If you have a very powerful blender, you can skip this step and freeze in a bowl). When frozen (at least 6 hours), place the frozen banana slices and strawberries pieces in a food processor or blender. If the slices stick together, break them apart by hand first, so the processor can run more easily. Always be careful not to overfill the processor. Drizzle with sweetened condensed milk, cream, and process until a thick creamy paste is formed, around 2-4 minutes. (I recommend starting with less condensed milk, giving it a taste, and adding more as needed. The amount of condensed milk needed really depends on your taste and how sweet your fruits are.) Scrape down the sides with a spatula as needed. If using a strong blender, use the tamper to constantly stir and press down the slices. Do this recipe in 2-3 rounds so as not to overwork the blender. Gradually increase the blending speed, but try to keep the blending within 2 minutes, also to protect the blender. (I have tried both methods, but I prefer the food processor.) Stir in some fresh chopped strawberries and transfer to a freezer-safe container. Freeze for another 4 hours. Serve immediately, or scoop into a closed container and keep in your freezer. When ready to serve, allow ice cream to defrost at room temperature for easy scooping.

Time-saving tip: Buy frozen strawberries and bananas and skip the freez-



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



Amanda Emert, a Texas Tech


graduate student, will talk on playa amphibian research and may offer macroinvertebrate samples for viewing.
