

Tournament History

HK "Pudge" Kendrick was a founding member of the Friona Country Club in 1962, and a two-time club champion. When Pudge passed away in April 2009, Larry Johnston approached his son Danny about starting a golf tournament in Pudge's honor, to continue his legacy at the Friona Country Club. This year marks the 11th year for the tournament. The Pudge Kendrick Me-

morial was the last event ever held at Friona Country Club, in June 2014. There were 69 teams over two tee times during that tournament. Dee King, the current owner of the course, closed the facility after we finished that Sunday.

The next year the tournament moved to the John Pitman Golf Course in Hereford, at the urging, and with the help of Mike Mauldin and Rick Hanna. Mike is the President of First Financial Bank in Hereford, and Rick is their City Manager. Past winners of the tournament, held in Hereford, include Jay Stevens/ Nathan Sullivan (124) in 2015, Aaron White/Thomas Maldonado (119) in 2016, Aaron White/Phillip Kahlich (119) in 2017, and Phillip Shelton/ Darren Renwick (121) in 2018.

Wheat Harvest winding down

The 2019 wheat crop is nearing completion with approximately 97% of the acres having been harvested. The USDA released its July Crop Production report last week and stated that wheat production for Texas was forecasted at 77 million bushels which was up 38% from last year. Yield per acre was expected to average 35 bushels, up 3 bushels from 2018. The record of 37 bushels per acre was set in 2007. Harvested acreage was 2.2 million which was up 26% from 2018.

Crop quality was good in the Panhandle and Low Plains with test weights over 60 lbs. per bushel, yields up to 100 bushels per acre and protein just under 12%. Hail damage was widespread but not severe.

Darrin Gilley, assistant manager at Friona Wheat Growers, said the elevator had received 510,592 bushels of wheat and 303,173 bushels of barley. The test weight average was 61.43 lbs. per bushel and protein was 12.72%. Darrin also said that the harvest could have been bigger but that the price of wheat was too low when farmers were making the decision about whether to graze the wheat out or grow to harvest.

Mayor's Minutes

Greeting's!!!

The City of Friona and the School Administration are teaming up to approach the Texas Department of Public Safety (TXDOT) and are proposing to change/remove multiple speed changes inside the city limits on Highway 60 and on fifth street. There are eight different speed changes within less than a mile radius ranging from 60 mph entering the city to as low as 35 mph. The proposal would lower the speed limit to 45 mph entering the city limits, lower to 35 mph passing through the city. The other proposal is to lower the speed limit to 30 mph on fifth street. Fifth street abuts residential neighborhoods throughout its length. Many homes in these neighborhoods have children that walk to the High School. Being a residential neighborhood, a 30 mph speed zone would coincide with the consistency of a 30 mph speed compared to other residential areas. The city is waiting on a response back from TXDOT.

The City of Friona will be hosting the quarterly Texas Municipal League (TML) banquet on Thursday, July 18, beginning at 6:00 pm. The banquet will be at the Heritage Room at the Amarillo Civic Center. Attending the banquet are cities from the panhandle (consisting of 26 counties) that represent the TML Region. The city will be serving cheeseburg-

ers and french fries/onion rings. We felt this would be fitting with the cheeseburger cook-off on July 20. The guest speaker will be Jody Holland, a motivational speaker located in Amarillo, TX. Jody has spent 20 years studying the science of human connection and is using what he has learned to help organizations enhance their leadership effectiveness, grow sales, enhance customer experience, and grow influence.

Chief Jimenez and the officers responded to 284 calls in June. There were 198 stops, 138 warnings, 98 citations, and 8 arrests. (1-warrant, 1-driving while intoxicated, 3-no drivers license, 1-driving while license invalid and 2-reckless driving). The officers drove a total of 3,170 miles patrolling and protecting our

Friona Volunteer Fire Department responded to 7 calls in June. June 2nd - grass fire, 4th - vehicle accident, 5th - vehicle accident, 19th - vehicle accident, 20th - grass fire, 22nd - truck fire, and 23rd - gas smell from alley.

Emergency Medical Service responded to 35 calls in June. There were 18 transfers, 10 calls for 911, and 7 calls that ended in a "no transport". Total billing equaled \$17,348.64 and the city collected \$4,335.73.

Accounts Payable for June totaled \$444,004.90. This amount is much higher compared to past months. The city paid \$200,893.10 to Scott Wampler Construction. This payment closes out the city's water project. Also, the city spent \$106,000.00 for street seal coating project that was completed in June.

The city pool opened for 21 days in June and had a great month. The pool generated \$4,473.00. There were a total of 432 children enter the pool and 421 adults.

The city pumped a total of 19,387,100 gallons of water and sold 12,765,000 gallons. Billing equaled \$67,369.81 on 1434 accounts. There were a total of 30 disconnects for non-payment.

Friona Public Library had a total of 2,512 visits, this includes visits electronically. The Library was open for 20 days in June. There were an average of 126 patron visits, again includes electronic visits. There were 2,686 items circulated and 36 new items added. The summer reading club has been great with 185 children participating. The library hosted 3 different programs in the Jr. High Auditorium and a total of 635 children and adults attended. On June 21, the Library hosted the "Night Under the Stars" which was a success. Children participated in fun activities and looked at the moon and stars through a telescope.

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

Star Lites by Bill Ellis Thursday, July 24, 1969

Fantastic! That's the best word we can come up with to describe our nation's successful moon voyage of the past week.

Although the landing had been programmed for several months, and we, like most Americans probably were not as shocked as were residents of other places on the globe, it was still almost unbelievable.

The fact that you could sit at home and watch a television picture of the first step ever taken onto the moon was in itself quite a technological accomplishment.

In fact, as we have heard other people comment, we were about as impressed with the fact that they could sent television pictures and instant radio communication back to earth from the moon's surface as we were with the tremendous accomplishment of landing on the moon, making the maneu-

vers and blasting off again. And yet, we were not surprised that it would happen, either. From our early years in school when we studied about the moon and planets, we've thought it was a foregone conclusion that man would explore space.

Undoubtedly, Russia's launching of the first Sputnik in 1957 hastened the events of the past week to a great extent. Had that not happened, the first moon landing probably would not have happened until the 1970s.

It is a big prestige booster for the United States, and proves that if the country had lagged behind Russia at all in regard to science, that the situation has been reversed, and that the USA is once again the world's peer.

Accident claims the life of Friona woman

A Friona woman is dead after a crash involving a car and bus on US Highway 60. The accident occurred early Saturday morning on July 13th about 4.5 miles west of

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety report, a bus carrying 39 passengers was eastbound on US 60 in the outside lane. A Toyota Camry driven by Socorro Gallego, 48, of Friona, was westbound on US 60 in the turning lane approaching the crossover north of the entrance to the Cargill Meat Solutions plant.

At approximately 4:04 a.m. Gallego turned left, failed to yield the right of way, and continued south across the eastbound lanes in an attempt to enter the Cargill plant. The report states that the front of the bus then collided into the right passenger side of Gallego's vehicle. The bus came to rest in the eastbound lane of US 60 facing east. The Camry came to rest with the front left tire on the nearby railroad tracks facing southwest.

Parmer County Sheriff officers, Friona Volunteer Fire Department personnel, and the Friona & Bovina EMS responded to the accident. Gallego was transported to Parmer Medical Center in Friona where she was later pronounced deceased. Eight of the bus passengers had minor injuries. Four were treated on scene and four were transported to Parmer Medical Center where they were treated and released.

The crash remains under investigation by the Texas Highway Patrol.

Arrington Appointed Co-Chair of Ways and Means Committee Rural Task Force

WASHINGTON - On Tuesday, Congressman Jodey Arrington (TX-19) was appointed co-chair of the House Ways and Means Committee's Rural and Underserved Communities Heath Task Force, alongside Congressman Brad Wenstrup (OH-2), Congressman Danny Davis (IL-7), and Congresswoman Terri Sewell (AL-7). The task force will convene members and experts to discuss the challenges of delivering health care in rural and underserved areas, and explore holistic bipartisan policy options that could improve outcomes and care in these communities. The group plans to convene its first meeting on Thursday, July 25.

"Our nation depends on strong rural communities for its food supply and energy independence. Without access to basic health care, these small towns will not be able to support the next generation of farmers, ranchers, and energy producers. There is no question that our country is facing a serious crisis in ensuring that rural Americans have the same access to quality care and medical services as their urban and suburban counterparts, with over 90 rural hospitals closing their doors in the past three years, including two in my District in the last year alone," said Arrington.



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have risen 3.4 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.49 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 9.5 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, yet stand 16.2 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.16 while the most expensive is \$3.29 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country stands at \$2.01 while the most expensive is \$5.49 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 3.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.79 per gallon. The national average is up 11.4 cents per gallon from a month ago, yet stands 8.5 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"For the third straight week, the national average price of gasoline has risen, following higher oil prices due to global geopolitical tensions, declining oil inventories, and Hurricane Barry shutting down oil production in Gulf waters," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "With Barry in the rearview, we are unlikely to see major disruptions arise, and gas prices nationally will avoid seeing much of a price rise as a result. However, prices may continue to drift higher as oil prices last week re-took the critical \$60 per barrel barrier, and with U.S. oil inventories already in steep decline in recent weeks, we may see additional tightening. While the trend for most states will be rising prices again this week, there may be a brief respite in the weeks ahead as worries over global growth persist, leading the U.S. Federal Reserve to re-think cutting interest rates."

Comptroller Glenn Hegar Distributes \$764.3 Million in Monthly Sales Tax Revenue to Local Governments

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced this week that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$764.3 million in local sales tax allocations for July. The amount is 0.7 percent more than in July 2018. These allocations are based on sales

The City of Friona will receive \$29,332.18 which is down from the \$29,597.07 received last July. For 2019 year-to-date, Friona has received \$229,294.13 which is down from the \$232,687.41 received last year for the same time period.

Commodity Supplemental Food Program Eliminates Proof of Income Requirement

AMARILLO, TEXAS - July 11, 2019 -Earlier this week, the Texas Department of Agriculture implemented an update to Commodity Supplemental Food Program eligibility requirements, striking the need to provide income documenta-

As per [7 CFR 247.8]:

To apply for CSFP benefits, the applicant or caretaker of the applicant must provide the following information on the application: name, age, address, and household income.

Texas Department of Agriculture has revised our current CSFP handbook Section 4000 and directions to our Participant Application (Form 1504) to state: Applicants are required to provide income information; however, applicants are not required to provide proof of income. The applicant is now able to self-declare their income when certifying for the CSFP. This guidance is effective immediately.

"We're excited to see this change in policy," said Zack Wilson, executive director of High Plains Food Bank. "This change will allow us to provide supplemental food to additional low-income seniors in need by eliminating a little red tape in the process."

CSFP, the largest and most common

senior adult food program, provides supplemental groceries to low-income senior adults, ages 60 years and older. Each month, CSFP participants receive a 25-30 pound box of shelf-stable groceries, valued at \$60-\$70, and a 2-pound block of commodity cheese to supplement their diets. Contents include a rotating menu of items including canned fruits, vegetables, animal proteins, cereal, dry beans and rice, pasta, peanut butter, liquid milk, and dry milk on alternating months.

Any senior who meets the <u>USDA In-</u> come Eligibility Guidelines may apply in person at a scheduled CSFP Distribution and take home a senior food box the same day. For seniors appointing a representative to pick up a box on their behalf, an Application (English and Spanish) and Proxy Form may be filled out in advance and presented by their appointed representative (proxy), along with acceptable identification..

Texas receives infusion of funding for border region law enforcement

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on July 9 announced the receipt of \$15 million in federal funding meant to increase operational capabilities of federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement agencies.

The Operation Stonegarden Grant Program allocation is part of \$30 million approved by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency. The funds are meant to equip law enforcement "to confront the complex and dynamic challenges that exist along the Texas border," according to the governor's office news release.

Local jurisdictions to receive the grant funding include 50 law enforcement agencies operating in these 18 counties: Bee, Calhoun, Cameron, Dimmit, Duval, El Paso, Hidalgo, Jim Wells, Kinney, Kleberg, Nueces, Presidio, Refugio, Val Verde, Victoria, Webb, Willacy and Zapata.

Disaster funding is asked

Gov. Abbott on July 10 sent a letter to President Trump requesting a presidential disaster declaration for the Rio Grande Valley counties of Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy.

"The recent severe weather in the Rio Grande Valley has caused widespread damage, leaving many without the resources they need to recover from these storms," Abbott said. "Combined with state and local resources, this federal aid will allow those impacted to rebuild as quickly as possible."

Also urging the president to declare the Rio Grande Valley a federal disaster area in response to severe flooding and rain in recent weeks were: U.S. Reps. Vicente Gonzalez, D-McAllen; Filemon Vela, D-Brownsville; and Henry Cuellar, D-Laredo; and Texas' U.S. Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz.

Texas offers aid to Louisiana

Gov. Abbott on July 12 offered assistance to Louisiana in response to Tropical Storm Barry before the weather system made landfall.

Abbott said the state of Texas would deploy its search and rescue team to assist in response efforts and do all possible to prevent any loss of life. "Texans remember how the state of Louisiana came to our aid during Hurricane Harvey and now we are in turn lending our support as Louisianians face Tropical Storm Barry," Abbott said.

Abbott also said the state's emergency operations center would remain at an elevated level of readiness and all state resources would be prepared to respond to any severe weather that may occur in Texas as a result of Tropical Storm Barry or any other event.

'Texas Ready' call is issued

The Texas Department of State Health Services on July 8 urged Texans to get "Texas Ready" for natural and manmade disasters by being informed, making a plan and building a disaster preparation kit that contains what a household needs to survive for at least three days.

"Texas has more declared disasters than any other state, so we all have to be Texas Ready at all times," said Dr. John Hellerstedt, DSHS commissioner. "If you wait until you see a disaster coming, you've missed the opportunity to make the best preparations possible, so please don't delay." Details are available at www.texasready.org.

H. Ross Perot dies

Texas billionaire H. Ross Perot, a businessman and philanthropist who ran for president as a third-party candidate in 1992 and 1996, died at his home in Dallas on July 9. He was 89.

Perot was born and raised in Texarkana. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, served as a Naval officer until 1957, then worked in sales for IBM. Perot went on to found Electronic Data Systems in Dallas and Perot Systems in Plano. General Motors bought controlling interest in EDS in 1984.

As stated in his obituary at rossperot.com, Perot and his wife, Margot, established the Perot Foundation in 1969 with the goal of helping fund projects that would improve people's lives. Since then, the foundation has supported education programs, health care research, cultural and arts institutions, veterans' causes and programs to meet immediate human needs and reduce suffering.

I lean toward the "less is more" theory. I really like the burgers that Bill fixes with his simple marinade. This makes for a juicy and delicious burger. I have been known to add toppings such as swiss cheese, mushrooms, and even a slice of avocado from time to time. I have also included an interesting recipe from Alton Brown that fries the hamburger patty.

The history of the hamburger is a complicated and unclear journey. There is no actual proof to who invented or served the first hamburger. Most likely it arrived in the United States from Germany as the Hamburg Steak, named after the town, Hamburg, Germany. Along the way, the Hamburg Steak began being served on a bun probably for convenience and portability. It supposedly appeared on the first printed menu at New York City's Delmonico restaurant. It was possibly served at a World's Fair somewhere along the way. The only thing for sure is that it became a popular American food sometime in the late 1800's, and the hamburger has flourished ever since.

Bill's Simple Burger Marinade

½ cup Worcestershire sauce ½ soy sauce Salt and pepper to taste

Lay out the beef patties on a baking sheet. Liberally apply the marinade to both sides of the patty. Salt and pepper according to taste. Place the baking sheet in the refrigerator for 30 or more min-

utes to let the marinade soak into the patties. Then cook the patties as desired either on the stove or on the grill. Just a reminder that hamburger meat needs to reach an internal temperature of 1650 F.

My Own Private Cheeseburger

By Alton Brown

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

Ingredients

Note – This is a recipe to serve one person. 3 ounces (86-88 grams) ground beef* 1 1/4 ounces (36-40 grams) grated cheddar cheese** 1/4 teaspoon smoked paprika

Instructions

Get a nice big Dutch oven and add enough oil or shortening to be two inches deep. Install your fry/candy thermometer to the side of the pot and crank the heat to medium high. Your thermal destination is 320 degrees F. Turn on your broiler and position rack in top position. This is a perfect time to use your toaster oven if you have one. Meanwhile, weigh out the meat portions for however many burgers you want to make. Roll into balls and set aside. Do not refrigerate. Grate the cheese. If you want 4 burgers, obviously you need 5 ounces total. Six would be 7 1/2, eight would be 10 ounces. Toss this cheese with the spices until all the powder has stuck to the cheese. Place a thin layer of mayo on the bottom of the buns.

Place half the cheese mixture on top of this. Spread mustard on bun tops and place the rest of the cheese on this. You should have half the cheese on the bottoms (on mayo) and half on the tops (on mustard). Place these under the broiler so that the cheese will melt as you cook the burgers. When the oil hits 320 degrees F, place one of the meat balls on an upside-down sheet pan. Dip a wide metal grill spatula in the hot fat then use it to smash and spread the meat ball out into a

5 to 6-inch-wide disk. It will be irregular around the circumference and that's good as all those irregularities will become crunchy goodness. The meat will also shrink by a couple of inches.

Gently scrape the patty/wafer

off the pan with the spatula and

gently drop into the fat. Cook one

1 hamburger bun or (soft) Kaiser roll 4-5 dill pickle slices or "chips" Mayo and mustard Oil shortening for frying...yeah what I said...frying***

minute, no more, no less. You can cook up to three patties at a time, but watch the oil temp and don't let it drop to under 300 degrees F. Remove meat to a paper towel to drain briefly then place it on the bun bottom right away. Place the pickles on top, then the bun top. The goal: bread/mayo/cheese/ meat/cheese/pickles/mustard/ bread. Consume or wrap in foil and hold for up to half an hour.

Most look for a ground meat that's no more than 80 percent lean.

** I like to use a mixture of sharp and mild cheddar cheeses.

***Believe it or not, as long as you keep the oil between 300and 325-degrees F, this will be the most un-greasy burger you've

Dalton Kimberly "Kim" Caffey of Friona, Texas died at home at age 78 on Tuesday, July 9, 2019.





Local Universities, Broad Value

There are more than 4,000 postsecondary institutions of higher education in the United States. Of those, more than 400 are regional universities. Regional universities, West Texas A&M University for example, contribute to local economies, cultural and civic life in the communities they serve. Distinctive from national research universities, they typically offer fewer doctoral degrees and enroll more local students. Many serve a large number of firstgeneration students. When a university touches one student who is the first-in-family to attend college, impacts ripple out and transform the trajectory of a complete family and in turn, home communities, and eventually, regional economies. Alone, this characteristic provides significant value. Additionally, regional and comprehensive universities derive some aspects of their mission in response to native needs.

Representing one tenth of all institutions of higher education, regional campuses educate four in 10 students according to the Washington Post. Flagship universities - the ones we watch on TV educate less than one in five students

A campus located in the heart of a beef production region should offer programs responsive to industry needs, rural health, small communities and schools, enterprise related to place, and supportive technology and infrastructure. Being an educated human being: speaking and writing effectively, understanding simple arithmetic expressions, and possessing critical thinking and analytic skills, are all essential. Not a shred of reliable evidence demonstrates outcomes of



this last goal that are different at a world research university, or regional comprehensive university.

Birthed as teacher's colleges, such institutions continue to educate a significant number of educators who serve locally. For example, in the top 26 counties of Texas more than 70 percent of the primary and secondary educators, and leaders, have at least one degree from West Texas A&M University. An extrapolation of "normal" or teachers colleges, education, business, and health related disciplines represent the most popular areas of graduate study at regional universities according to Alisa Hicklin-Frya of the University of Oklahoma. Responsive service to a region should embrace distinctive-

ness, not eschew it. Regional institutions organized into a system of universities, that has a preeminent flagship, can magnify the strengths of each. The Texas A&M University System is one such example. The flagship, Texas A&M University, is a member of the Association of American Universities (AAU). AAU institutions are commonly regarded as the most effective research universities in the world. Texas A&M University serves in unison with dispersed regional universities fulfilling its land grant mission, and its AAU mandate. This model is different from many university systems that may have multiple flagships and places less emphasis on the regional focus of the smaller, and usually less predominant, vessels in the fleet.

Global impact and regional application of knowledge, insight and service through locally responsive institutions within "the system" are a onetwo punch. In an effective marriage, both the flagship and regional institution multiply the power of tax-dollar investments that fund public higher education. (Many leaders and pundits lament the evaporating contribution of state dollars. True, to be sure, but another time, another place.)

Any university has an economic impact according to the Brookings Institute. The simple rule - the bigger the university the bigger the impact - is in play. However, when collected into an effective organization, the impact of many regional institutions can be equal to or greater than the impact of a single research university. For example, even a moderate sized regional university, WT for example, contributes \$70 million in direct payroll benefit to the regional economy. The multiplied influence, growing through property, school and sales taxes, grows by 400 percent. In addition, every student spends thousands of dollars locally on food and daily needs, and when added to the costs of housing, the secondary spending quickly grows equaling a total economic impact of seven times the direct payroll. For example, the statewide impact of the University of Georgia System is pegged at \$16.8 billion.

Some states recognize the wisdom of investing in regional universities to provide high quality affordable educational opportunities. The West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission assesses every regional university in the state and catalogs the contribution made to the state economy. There are a dozen four-year institutions in the state. Nine of them are regional universities, but their impact and contribution to the state is matched with the major state institutions of West Virginia.

Higher education is a benefit to society. When universities are organized and prized for their contribution to the nexus of opportunity and aspiration that address the needs of the people of the state, and a particular region simultaneously, economic and social benefits abundantly accrue.


