Rep. Arrington holds **Town Hall Meeting**

Congressman Jodey Arrington (TX-19) conducted a Town Hall Meeting last Tuesday morning at the Senior Citizen's center. The event was attended by 55-60 people and included a time for attendees to ask questions.

In his opening remarks, Rep. Arrington thanked Mayor Ricky White for his hospitality at the recent Cheeseburger Festival. The congressman said he was still trying to digest all the cheeseburgers he ate during the visit.

Rep. Arrington told the group that freedom is the key ingredient to the success of the country.

He said that due to lower taxes and less regulations there are now one million more jobs available than there are workers to fill them. He also stressed

that the United States is a great nation in part because of the 1% of the population who choose to serve in the armed forces and protect our freedoms.

Questions from audience involved issues such a trade, immigration, and the recent mass shootings. Rep. Arrington said that both political parties need to do a better job in defending what they believe without disparaging the beliefs of their political opponents. He wished that Washington D.C. was more like West Texas and that we need more debate and less hate.

The congressman also stated that he has worked on legislation with Democrats in the past and will listen to any idea that might improve our country. He said that if you don't solve problems, you are not a leader.





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

New CLEAR Alert System Assists Law Enforcement in Locating Endangered, Missing Adults

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) joined Rep. Greg Bonnen at a press conference today to discuss the implementation of the CLEAR Alert, or the Coordinated Law Enforcement Adult Rescue Alert. This new alert system will assist law enforcement in locating and rescuing missing adults who may have been kidnapped, abducted or who are in immediate danger of injury or death, as well as aid in locating any potential suspects. Rep. Bonnen authored HB 1769, which created this new alert, and Sen. Larry Taylor sponsored this act in the Senate.

"I am proud to have sponsored this crucial legislation to close a gap in the statewide alert system," said Sen. Taylor. "CLEAR Alert gives victims another opportunity to be safely reunited with their families. This effort honors the lives of those we could not save and ensures the wellbeing of those we will."

Alison Steele and her husband, Lawrence Baitland, also attended today's press conference. Steele is the mother of 19-yearold murder victim Cayley Mandadi.

"Texans like Cayley Mandadi, who are too

old for an AMBER Alert and too young for a Silver Alert, are left stranded in the gap of our existing alert systems," said Rep. Bonnen. "The new CLEAR Alert will help us find and save those who previously did not qualify for this potentially life-saving action. I'm proud of Cayley's mom, Alison, Sen. Taylor and the Department of Public Safety for bringing this new alert system online to protect endangered Texans."

- A CLEAR Alert will be issued by DPS to the public, community partners, media and fellow law enforcement if an adult in Texas goes missing and meets specific criteria, including:
- The individual is between the ages of 18 and
- The adult is either in imminent danger of bodily injury or death, or the disappearance wasn't volun-
- The person's location is unknown; and
- The person has been missing for less than 72 hours.

"The CLEAR Alert is another tool for law enforcement to leverage in our efforts to help rescue adults who may be in danger and locate suspects when a

victim has been abducted," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Eyewitness information from the public has proven to be vital in locating missing persons, and we are confident the CLEAR Alert will help generate leads in these cases and save lives."

The name of the new CLEAR Alert in part honors recent victims of violence: Cayley Mandadi; D'Lisa Kelley; Erin Castro; Ashanti Billie; and the Rest.

"Our family and our team of supporters are honored and deeply moved by DPS' choice of an alert name that is meaningful on multiple levels — it authoritatively describes its own purpose, it fits the existing alert naming structure, and it honors multiple murder victims, including our daughter Cayley," Steele said. "We look forward to supporting law enforcement as we all work together to implement the CLEAR Alert system."

The system will be managed by DPS and will be issued in the same manner as the AMBER, Silver, Blue and Endangered Missing Persons alerts. The CLEAR Alert was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott in May and goes into effect on Sept. 1, 2019.

After approval of previous minutes the council will discuss a report from the Parmer County Appraisal District about the 2014 effective tax rate, discuss a proposed tax rate, and set dates for required public hearings if

Other items on the agenda include:

- -- consider an ordinance granting Atmos Energy franchise rights to do business in the city. This will be the second reading of the ordinance.
- -- award a bid for a cash dryland lease of a 72.253 acres tract east of the city sewer plant on CR 20.-- consider amending, renewing, or a new contract with Republic Services for solid
- -- discuss and approve July accounts payable and financial statement.
- -- authorize city manager to transfer certain escrow money from roof hail damage insurance to Prairie Acres checking account as
- -- authorize city manager to transfer escrow money when needed from the sewer escrow account for a lift-station grinder pump.
- -- hear departmental report from the police department regarding budget, expenses, personnel, and upcoming activities and events.
- -- authorize city manager to solicit bids to sell old computer equipment.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled Nearly \$2.9 Billion in July

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.86 billion in July,. This represented a 4.3 percent over July 2018.

"State sales tax revenue growth in July was moderate, with services and restaurant sectors leading the growth," Hegar said. "Tax receipts from the construction, wholesale and retail trade sectors also grew modestly, while receipts from the oil- and gas-mining sector remained about the same as a year ago."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in July 2019 was up 5.6 percent compared to the same

period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

In July 2019, Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes were \$483.6 million, up 10.6 percent from July 2018; (2) motor fuel taxes were \$311.1 million, down 0.6 percent from July 2018; (3) natural gas production taxes were \$129.0 million, up 11.3 percent from July 2018; and (4) oil production taxes were \$312.4 million, up 7.0 percent from July 2018.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 2.8 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.44 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 0.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and 19.2 cents per gallon lower than a


According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.15 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.97 while the most expensive is \$5.09 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 2.6 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.70 per gallon. The national average is down 5.6 cents per gallon from a month ago and 15.8 cents per gallon lower

"Gas prices have remained somewhat stable in the last week, falling in most communities across the country as oil prices remain under fire over renewed concerns of an economic slowdown in the U.S. as President Trump slapped China with new sanctions, driving the worry," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. "There's a growing threat that gas prices may plunge this fall-perhaps as much as 50 cents per gallon by Thanksgiving- as headwinds have killed off any demand growth and gasoline demand plummets after summer. It appears less and less likely that the trade spat between the world's two largest economies will cease any time soon, and that threat will likely stifle gas prices for the immediate future."



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Farmhouse to Your House

Psalm 133—Unity

Some families had an extra dose of division and dysfunction. For example, can you name this biblical family that saw one son murder his brother, that same murderous son attempted to overthrow his dad's power in a treacherous coup? Further, another son tried to overthrow his wiser brother after dad passed away and the wiser brother was on the throne. If you said David's family, you got it right.

David's family had a unity deficiency when you look at the scope of his life, but David was a very unifying King for the nation of Israel, bringing together a divided nation. With all this in mind, when David wrote, "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity," in Psalm 133, it carried tremendous truth and history in regards to his life. David was able to unify the country, while his family seemed to be ripping at the seams. What a sad irony!

In reality, the need for unity today is tremendous, but true and lasting unity is only able to be achieved within the people of God. In Psalm 133 David blessed unity, in John 17 Jesus prayed for unity, and in Ephesians 4 we are told to "maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Unity, although elusive, is only attainable when people are focused on and united in the Lord Jesus Christ. Texas Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 9-11

Whether you're in need of notebooks, rulers or running shoes, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on those and other items during the state's sales tax holiday on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 9-11.

The law exempts sales tax on qualified items - such as clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

"As Texas families begin the process of replacing their beach towels with lunch boxes, the sales tax holiday is the perfect opportunity to save some money on supplies families need before the school bell rings," Hegar said. "As a father of three, I know how these expenses can add up."

Shoppers this year will save an estimated \$102.2 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

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




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Back-to-School Health Check List

August marks back-to-school season, an ideal time for parents to help improve their children's health. Before schedules become packed with classes, homework and extracurricular activities, here's a back-to-school "health checklist" to help give children a better chance to succeed inside and outside the classroom:

Get a Comprehensive Eye Exam

About 80 percent of what children learn is through their eyes. With that in mind, a child's first comprehensive eye exam should occur before age 1, again at age 3 and before entering school.[1] If no vision issues are detected, school-aged children should have an exam at least once every two years. Also, a school's vision screening is not a substitute for a comprehensive eye exam, as screenings can miss conditions such as poor eye alignment, focusing issues and farsightedness.1

The inability to see clearly can affect a child's physical, emotional and social development, which in turn can affect academic and athletic performance. Children often don't complain if their vision isn't normal, so it's important to look for possible signs such as squinting while reading or watching television, difficulty hitting or catching a ball, or headaches when watching 3D movies.

Also, be aware of digital eye strain, which is caused by prolonged use of computers or smartphones. Help your child practice healthy vision habits by keeping computer screens at least 30 inches from their eyes, resting their eyes every 20 minutes and blinking frequently to avoid dry eyes.

Get a Dental Cleaning

Maintaining proper oral health matters more than just keeping a sparkling smile - it's also important for good overall health. This is especially true for children, as untreated dental problems may diminish attention, decrease self-esteem and limit a child's ability to learn at school.[2]

Tooth decay is largely preventable, yet it

ranks as the most common chronic disease among children. About 33 percent of young kids (ages 2 to 8) have cavities in their baby teeth, and 20 percent of kids in the same age group have cavities in their adult teeth.[3] With that in mind, parents should schedule regular dental exams every six months, especially at schools that require a back-to-school dental checkup.[4]

For parents with teenagers, it is important to recognize the risks of opioid addiction, especially after wisdom teeth removal. If you or a loved one is prescribed an opioid following a dental or other medical procedure, ask your health care professional if there are alternatives, including over-the-counter pain relievers such as a combination of acetaminophen and ibuprofen.

Get Recommended Immunizations

Many schools require that children are properly immunized before they enter the classroom to help to avoid serious diseases and prevent other students from contracting them. Children's vaccines are 90% to 99% effective and may help protect kids from diseases such as mumps, tetanus and chicken pox.[5] By helping reduce the risk of contracting potentially preventable diseases such as the flu, children may have fewer school absences.[6]

Parents should check with their doctor to determine what immunizations are appropriate based on age. Most shots are given by the time children are 2 years old, but some are administered into the teen years. If your child runs a low-grade fever or has swelling in the shot location after the immunization, these minor side effects typically last a couple days. Apply a cool, wet washcloth on the sore area to help ease discomfort, but check with your doctor about the appropriateness of over-the-counter pain medications.

Back-to-school season is an exciting time for many children and their parents. Consider these guidelines to help encourage your child's health and success throughout the school year.

El Paso and Dayton, Now What?

Americans have grieved over the senseless murders of 31 people recently gunned down in an El Paso, Texas Walmart and a Dayton, Ohio nightclub. People were out living the American dream, shopping and having a night of fun. They were just living their lives.

Their lives were taken from them by men armed with automatic assault rifles and the element of surprise. People were living their lives and minding their own business. They weren't prepared for someone with an assault weapon unleashing enough bullets to kill 22 people in El Paso and 9 people in Dayton.

taking a lunch requiring refrigeration, find out if they have access to a refrigerator at school and remind them to put their lunch in it as soon as they get to school," she said. "And be sure to clearly mark your child's name on the bag or container."

 Use cold packs to cool perishable items such as lunch meats, eggs, cheese, milk and

yogurt.

"These cold packs should also be used even in insulated lunch boxes or bags when there's perishable food inside," Dittmar said. "You can also freeze water or juice and use that to keep perishables cold, and the liquids should thaw by lunchtime."

While preparing foods in advance for school lunches is fine, Dittmar said it's best to pack them just before the child leaves for school.

"You can freeze some food for lunches, but it's not always a good idea to freeze all the ingredients," she said. "For example, it's usually not best to freeze complete sandwiches containing mayonnaise, lettuce, pickles or tomatoes or onions, as these don't usually taste particularly good when thawed. Keep these addons in a separate plastic bag or container so your child can put them on the sandwich just before eat-

ing it." — Use a thermos or other insulated container

to keep hot lunches at a warm temperature.

"If you put boiling water into the container and let it sit for a few minutes, then pour the water out and put in the hot food - like soup, stew or chili - this will help keep the contents warm until lunchtime," she said.

— Leave lunches in the refrigerator overnight if packing them the night before.

"To ensure the best results, store with the lid of the lunchbox or bag left open in the refrigerator so there's optimal air circulation to cool it down," she said.

Put individually disposable packaged wipes in the lunch box or bag and remind children to use them before and after eating. This also reinforces the importance of hand cleaning and washing before meals.

 Discard all used lunch packaging and bags, and clean lunch boxes after use. "Leftover food should

also be discarded after lunch too, along with all used food packaging and paper bags," she said. "Reusing packaging is a bad idea as it could contaminate other food and cause foodborne illness. And keeping unrefrigerated perishables in a lunch box or bag so you can eat them later means they'll probably be in the temperature danger zone for a while and could become a safety risk."

Abbott, Patrick react after 20 die in deadly shooting

AUSTIN — After a gunman was arrested in the killing of 20 people and wounding 26 others at a popular shopping venue in El Paso on Aug. 3, Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick offered thoughts and prayers.

Abbott ordered flags lowered in memory of those who lost their lives and said flags should remain at half-staff through sunset on Aug. 8.

The suspect, 21-year-old Patrick Crusius of Allen, Texas, surrendered after waves of first responders arrived on scene.

Crusius was charged with capital murder. He remains in custody in El Paso.

Lawmaker to take new post

Rep. John Zerwas, R-Richmond, last week announced his retirement from the state House of Representatives, effective Sept. 30.

Zerwas, a physician for more than 30 years and past president of the American Society of Anesthesiologists, was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 2007. He is the 29th most senior lawmaker in the 150-member lower chamber.

Zerwas currently serves as chair of the budget-writing House Appropriations Committee, and served in the same capacity in the 2017 Texas Legislature. He earlier served as chair of the House Committee on Higher Education.

On Aug. 1, the University of Texas System announced the appointment of Zerwas as executive vice chancellor for health affairs, effective Oct. 1.

Kevin Eltife, chairman of the UT System Board of Regents and a former state senator, said Zerwas "comes to the UT System with a very high regard among colleagues in the medical, business and legislative arenas."

More than two-thirds of the UT System's annual budget is dedicated to health care, education and research, and UT institutions produce almost two-thirds of the state's health professionals, according to the UT System news release.

Mitigation contracts issued

Eleven contracts totaling nearly \$14.6 million in the Texas Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust settlement have been issued, mainly to school districts, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality announced Aug. 1.

The settlement is a result of litigation over emissions-control defeat devices that were found to have been installed on vehicles manufactured by Volkswagen and its subsidiaries. Some 590,000 vehicles are affected, according to the TCEQ.

Entities that have applied for funds from the trust will use the money to replace aging diesel school buses, shuttle buses or transit buses with new models.

Alert system is launched

The Texas Department of Public Safety on July 30 announced the implementation of CLEAR Alert, the Coordinated Law Enforcement Adult Rescue Alert.

The new alert system is designed to assist law enforcement in locating and rescuing missing adults who may have been kidnapped, abducted or who are in immediate danger of injury or death, and to aid in locating potential suspects.

Rep. Greg Bonnen, R-Friendswood, authored HB 1769 creating the CLEAR Alert and Sen. Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood, sponsored the legislation in the Senate. It was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott in May and takes effect on Sept. 1.

The system, to be managed by the DPS, will be operated in the same manner as AMBER, Silver, Blue and Endangered Missing Persons

Revenue total is reported

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 2 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.86 billion in July, an amount 4.3 percent more than the amount reported for the month of July 2018.

"State sales tax revenue growth in July was moderate, with services and restaurant sectors leading the growth," Hegar said. "Tax receipts from the construction, wholesale and retail trade sectors also grew modestly, while receipts from the oil- and gas-mining sector remained about the same as a year ago."

Update: Measles cases

State health officials on July 29 confirmed that 21 cases of measles have been diagnosed in Texas so far this year.

The Department of State Health Services urged health care providers to consider measles when diagnosing patients because early identification, along with immunization, are keys to preventing the spread of measles.

A contagious respiratory illness, measles is a rash that begins as flat, red spots on the face and spreads down the neck and trunk to the rest of the body. Other symptoms include high fever over 101 degrees, cough, runny nose and red, watery eyes.

Cornyn Bill to Broaden GI Benefits for Veterans in STEM Fields Becomes Law

WASHINGTON- U.S. Senator John Cornvn (R-TX) released the following statement after President Trump signed his Veteran STEM Scholarship Improvement Act, a bill to help veterans take full advantage of the scholarship provided to veterans studying science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM fields), into law.

"With this new law, we're opening the door for veterans to pursue meaningful careers in increasingly high-demand STEM fields," said Sen. Cornyn. "I thank President Trump for his commitment to veterans, and I encourage veterans to take full advantage of the new opportunities this law offers."

The Nourse STEM Scholarship, created by the Harry W. Colmery Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2017 and supported by Sen. Cornvn. provides an additional nine months or \$30,000 of GI Bill eligibility to student veterans pursing a STEM degree. The law had mandated that eligible STEM programs exceed 128 required credit hours; however, most programs in the United States and the average STEM degree program in Texas require less than 128 credit hours. This new law reduces that requirement in the Nourse STEM Scholarship to reflect that STEM programs should exceed 120 required credit hours so that more veterans are able to take advantage of the scholarship.

Zucchini

Have you heard the one about never leaving your car windows rolled down during summer in a small town or it will be filled with free zucchini? I don't think anyone living in the big city would understand how true this can be during the end of the summer when the zucchini crop is at its peak. In Friona you might even be able to get some free zucchini at the bookstore.

Zucchini first originated in Mexico and northern parts of South America as far back as 7,000 years ago. Christopher Columbus brought zucchini seeds to Europe where cultivation began. The zucchini squash as we know it was developed in Italy. It's first name was green Italian squash. The name we use now, zucchini, was derived from the Italian word meaning small squash, "zucchino." Zucchini appeared in North America around the 1920's. It was probably first cultivated in California, although there is record of the vegetable being grown in 1928 in New York State.

Zucchini is a summer squash in the cucumber and melon family. It is harvested while still immature to take advantage of its tender skin and flesh. Botanically, zucchini is a fruit although it is treated as a vegetable when cooking. The zucchini grows well in temperate climates and can produce a significant yield. A great number of bees is required for its pollination, so farmers have been known to hand pollinate if enough bees are not available. Because of the large production numbers, the flowers of the squash plant are also harvested and served as a delicacy. The flowers are stuffed, battered, and deep fried in Japan. A similar dish known as fiori de zucca, is served in Italy. Zucchini is full of folate, potassium, as well as vitamin A. It can be eaten raw as well as cooked by steaming, boiling, grilling, stuffing, baking, frying, or adding to baked goods such as bread and cakes.

Many cultures use zucchini in different dishes:

Mexican - uses it to make soups or quesadil-

French - ratatouille - a summer vegetable stew; courgette farcie - zucchini stuffed with tomatoes and bell peppers

Turkish - mücver - shredded zucchini, flour, eggs, lightly fried and eaten with yogurt

Bulgarian - a snack of fried zucchini served

with dip made from yogurt, garlic, and dill Egyptian - zucchini with tomato sauce, garlic, and onions

With zucchini's high production rate, it always good to have a variety of recipes on hand to mix up our use of this delicious vegetable. Below is a recipe that you may have heard of before and maybe a couple of new ones to try out just in case you ever leave your windows down.

Ingredients

- 2 medium zucchinis sliced into 1/2" rounds
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning salt & pepper to taste
- 1/3 cup shredded parmesan cheese divided

Instructions

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Toss zucchini slices with olive oil, seasoning, salt & pepper and about 2 tablespoons of the parmesan cheese. Place on a baking sheet and top with remaining parmesan cheese. Bake 5 minutes. Turn oven to broil, place pan near the top and broil 3-5 minutes or until cheese is melted and zucchini is tender crisp.

Zucchini Salsa Verde

Ingredients

- 1 large sweet onion, cut into wedges
- 2 poblano peppers, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 medium zucchinis, cut into 1-inch pieces 4 tomatillos, husks removed and quartered
- 3 jalapeno peppers, halved and seeded
- 2 tablespoons canola oil 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 1 tablespoon Louisiana-style hot sauce
- 1 ½ teaspoons grated lime zest
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons honey, optional

Directions:

In a large bowl, combine the first six ingredients. Transfer to a grill wok or basket. Grill vegetables, covered, over medium heat for 18-22 minutes or until slightly charred and tender, stirring occasionally. Cool slightly. Finally, chop and transfer to a small bowl. Stir in the lime juice, hot sauce, lime zest, salt and honey, if desired.

Ingredients

- ½ cup butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 large egg, room temperature
- 1 cup finely shredded zucchini 1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon ½ teaspoon salt

½ cup raisins ½ cup chopped walnuts

- **Lemon Glaze:**
- 2 cups confectioners' sugar 2-3 tablespoons lemon juice

Directions:

In a large bowl, cream butter and granulated sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg, zucchini and lemon zest. Combine the flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well. Stir in raisins and walnuts. Drop by tablespoonfuls 3 inches apart onto lightly greased baking sheets. Bake at 375OF for 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to wire racks to cool. For glaze, combine confectioners' sugar and enough lemon juice to reach a thin spreading consistency. Spread or drizzle over cooled cookies.



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
