City Council approves budget and tax rate for 2019

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Thursday, September 12th at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Council approved the Minutes of the August 12, 2019 regular council meeting, the August 23, 2019 public hearing meeting, and the August 30th public hearing meeting.

The Council approved a tax refund of \$32,578.49 to be made to West Texas Protein, Inc. The company is not located in the city limits but has been paying city taxes on its equipment and inventory valuations for the past five years. It could not be determined exactly how the mistake happened since the company had never been taxed on the value of its real property.

Approval was given for a variance for a carport to be built at 1707 W. 10th (Western Block 2 Lot 14) to Justin Jeter.

A request from Mike & Rita Martin to receive "outside city limit" water service at A-1 Service Center 1799 US Highway 60 was tabled until it could be determined if an easement could be obtained from the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union.

Council heard a report from the Friona Police regarding Department budget, expenses, personnel, and upcoming events. Omega Electronics of Amarillo was scheduled to install a recording system for the new dispatch console and activate all emergency

Approval was given for an increase in employee medical coverage for 2019-20. The new premiums will be \$682/month for the first three months and \$716/ month for the following nine months.

The Council approved \$4,346,982 budget for 2019-20. The Council also approved a tax rate of \$0.6894 per \$100 valuation for the year 2019. The fiscal year starts on October 1, 2019 and ends on September 1, 2020.



The West Texas Walk of Fame is located at Buddy and Maria Elena Holly Plaza at 19th Street and Crickets Avenue in Lubbock, Texas.



Panhandle Regional Planning Commission celebrates 50 years

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) celebrated "50 Years of Service" last Friday night at its 2019 Annual Meeting Banquet held at the Hodgetown Baseball Park in downtown

Friona Mayor Ricky White, who is the 2019 Chair of the 27-member Board of Directors provided the opening and closing remarks at the banquet. PRPC Executive Director Kyle Ingham introduced the board members and special guests and later presented the employee service awards. Former Executive Director Gary Pitner gave a "Reminiscing 50 Years" presentation. The banquet attendees also saw a video message from Texas Governor Greg Abbott. Keynote Speaker for the event was Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar. He was introduced by Borger resident Winston Sauls, Secretary/Treasurer of the Board.

In his letter congratulating the PRPC for its 50 years of service, Board Chair Ricky White

concluded, "It does not take a special person to be a great public servant. It takes people who are willing to put in the time, who have the desire, and have the perseverance to serve. I look forward to our continued work together as we shape the Texas Panhandle and local governments for another 50 years."

The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) is a voluntary association of cities, counties, and special districts in the Texas Panhandle. Established in 1969, the PRPC assists local governments in planning, developing, and implementing programs designed to improve the general health, safety, and welfare of the citizens in the Texas Panhandle.

The PRPC is an organization of, by, and for local governments. It was created on the premise that local governments in the panhandle can accomplish more by working together as a group. Since its inception, the PRPC has been involved in a wide range of beneficial projects and programs. Current

activities include initiatives in the areas of workforce development, local government services, economic development, 9-1-1 services, solid waste management, emergency preparedness, water planning, and technical assistance to local governments.

The Texas panhandle region covers a 26-county area consisting of almost 26,000 square miles and a population of 427,927. The PRPC has 94 member governments which include all 26 counties, all 62 incorporated cities, and 6 special districts.

In other business, the Council approved the Accounts Payable and Financial Statement for August 2019. Approval was given to transfer \$92,000 from Operation and Maintenance Admin Tax to General Fund Revenues Admin Tax. Approval was also given to transfer funds from the Water & Sewer Fund to the Interest & Sinking Fund up to \$115,876.00 for a bond payment.

Consideration of an ordinance related to the collection of residential and commercial garbage and the costs for such service was tabled. Approval was given to a negotiated rate settlement with Atmos Energy Corporation. The new rate will go into effect on October 1st.

Senator Cruz Honors Shea Woodard Hall on Senate Floor

Shea Woodard Hall

WASHINGTON, D.C. - On September 26th, U.S. Senator Ted Cruz (R-Texas) delivered remarks on the Senate floor honoring Shea Woodard Hall for her 26 years of service in the U.S. Senate and to congratulate her on her upcoming retirement. Shea has been a member of Sen. Cruz's staff for seven years, serving as the West Texas Regional Director for Sen. Cruz, and will retire in October.

"Mr. President, I rise today to give tribute to a great American, a great Texan, a dear

friend, and a 26-year veteran of this institution, who has dedicated her career to serving the needs of her fellow citizens.

"Her name is Shea Woodard Hall.

"She has worked as the West Texas Regional Director on my team for seven years. She is now retiring.

"Shea started working in the Senate in 1993, when she was hired by my predecessor, Senator Kay Bailey Hutchi-

"As West Texas Regional Director, Shea started with 89 counties in her region. By land area, that's bigger than some states. Shea could leave her office in Abilene, drive seven hours north, and still be in her region - that's how much territory she was responsible for.

"Shea was always willing to go the extra mile - literally. In her first three years working in the Senate, Shea put 75,000 miles on her car. In fact, she's put so many miles on her vehicles throughout the last 26 years that it's probably for the best that she married a local car dealer in Abilene.

"After 26 years serving 89 counties in West Texas, everyone knows Shea, and Shea knows everyone. From every mayor, to every county judge, and sheriff, to every state elected official, Shea made it a point to know them all.

"In fact, when I traveled with Shea in West Texas we would arrive at an event, and it was no doubt who folks were happier to see me or Shea, and it sure wasn't me.

"Shea's also known in West Texas for her rural tours. They are legendary. You see, Shea's region is diverse. It spans from Amarillo, to Lubbock, to Abilene, to San Angelo, to Big Spring to Midland-Odessa.

"On the last tour she planned, an ag-tour, we started in Lubbock, with stops in Muleshoe, Friona, Dalhart, and Amarillo. Now, if you know Texas, that's one heck of a big loop. On one of the stops, I asked Shea what we would be seeing that day and she answered, 'strippers.' I was fairly puzzled at that response, and she quickly clarified, 'Cotton Strippers!' I was relieved.

"There are too many stories of Shea helping people in West Texas to list, but one of my favorite stories is about how Shea helped bring the B1-bomber to Texas.

"When the City of Abilene and Dyess Air Force Base were working to secure low-level training routes for the B1-bomber, Shea received some questions and some concerns

from local ranchers who were afraid the noise would upset their cattle.

"Always the steady hand, Shea responded with some West Texas wisdom.

"She'd tell them that the low-level training routes were good for our national security, that they would enhance Dyess Air Force as the pre*miere B-1 base in the country.* And finally, she'd tell them that she hadn't received a single phone call from a cow protesting the noise.

"I'm proud to say that because of her efforts, and many others, those training routes remain and Texas is one of the homes today of the B-1 bomber.

"Shea has become a living legend in West Texas because no problem is too big, and no problem is too small. She wants to help anyone and everyone who calls her with an issue. She often helped people in stressful situations, navigating the leviathan of big government on behalf of fellow Texans in their time of need. Shea also doesn't take no for an answer. If she didn't get the answer she needed to help a fellow Texan, she didn't give up. She has been a tireless and effective member of our team.

"That is her legacy, and I know it will endure.

"Shea is retiring next month, and while we will miss her greatly, she will remain a friend, she will remain family. And we wish her well as she begins her well-earned retirement.

"The Senate, the people of Texas, and the thousands of people and families that she has helped over the course of 26 years of service will miss her too.

"Thank you, Shea, for your work, your determination, your passion, your patriotism, and your love for Texas.

"Texas says thank you.



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 1.4 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.35 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 5.8 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, yet stand 28.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.89 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.89 while the most expensive is \$6.24 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 1.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.64 per gallon. "Oil prices have cooled back off after Saudi Arabia brought a significant portion of oil production and processing back online, helping the national average to begin moving lower again, but don't tell California- who saw a massive spike of nearly 25 cents per gallon in the last week, fueled by refining issues there," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for Gas-Buddy. "While most of the country will likely see prices tip-toe lower as oil prices have moved lower, California will see prices move higher in the week ahead, with increases also possible in those areas that receive their gasoline from California- including Las Vegas. Prices in most of California were slightly higher earlier this year, but if they all rise by an additional 10-15 cents they may rival the highest level since 2014. Prices there will eventually start following the national average lower, but it may be several weeks before it becomes noticeable."





When the going gets tough, where do you turn? Psalm 142 flows from a very troublesome time in David's life where persecution abounded and his friends were few. Through these trials, his resolve remained in the Lord and this brief Psalm provides two clear principles that help you to trust the Lord through

difficulty. First, go to God with your complaints and troubles. Often when we have complaints or problems, we like to go to everyone else and let them share the load of difficulty we try to bear, but the reality is that most people you gossip or complain to are not able to do anything about it, other

than pitch in their two cents, or jump on your pity party band wagon. When you go to the creator with your complaints, though, you begin to see your troubles in light of His omniscience, your difficulties in light of his omnipotence, and your stresses in light of his sovereignty.

Secondly, continue seeking God in earnest, clear prayer which leads you to intentionally cling to God through the trial. Notice in verses 3-4 that David resounds the truth of how exhausting the persecution has been on him emotionally, physically, spiritually and relationally, but in the final three verses he counters his exhaustion with truth and hope. "You are my refuge, my portion in the land of the living," he proclaims in verse 5. The importance to stand on God's promises and commit to cling to him no matter what is essential if you will intentionally trust the Lord through your troubles. Feelings will betray you, circumstances may get darker, relationship might abandon you, but when your hope rests on the solid rock, you have a foundation that can endure any storm you face.

Sometimes you need a little help getting them to talk, so you might try coming up with something similar to asking someone about their story or their heart. I believe God will give you the words and the time to speak. If you know they are a Christian, hopefully they will be willing to talk about Jesus. And, if they aren't a Christian, just listen and wait for the opportunity God gives you to introduce Him.

Being a Christian means we bear the burdens of others, as well as share in their joy and excitement without being envious or jealous. I know I need to be a better listener; I need to be a better friend: I need to be more like Jesus!!!

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

Chief election officer encourages Texans to register before deadline

AUSTIN — Texas Secretary of State Ruth Hughs invited eligible Texans to celebrate and participate in National Voter Registration Day the fourth Tuesday in September — by ensuring they are registered to vote before the Oct. 7 registration deadline.

Hughs, the state's chief election officer, issued a final call to action to voters, community leaders and elected officials to encourage their fellow Texans to register and prepare to vote in the upcoming Nov. 5 election.

"An active and engaged citizenry plays an essential role in ensuring the continued well-being of our democracy," Hughs said.

The number of registered voters in Texas stood at 15,823,406 in September. For more information on voting in Texas, visit www.votetexas.gov

E-cig cases are counted

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Sept. 24 announced the agency had identified 54 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who report "vaping" before developing symptoms.

State health officials are gathering more information about 35 other possible cases to determine whether they are consistent with the symptoms and substance use seen in cases in Texas and 37 other states. About half of the Texas cases have been in teens, and more than half required hospitalization.

Respiratory symptoms include difficulty breathing, shortness of breath and coughing. Some people have also experienced nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. DSHS said clinicians should ask patients with those symptoms about a history of vaping, gather as much information as possible about suspected cases, and report them to the agency.

Unemployment rate holds

The Texas Workforce Commission on Sept. 20 reported that the state's economy added 18,200 seasonally adjusted total non-farm positions in the month of August.

Notably, the Lone Star State's unemployment rate held steady at 3.4 percent, matching the alltime record low set in June. The rate of 3.4 percent is the lowest since the agency launched this method of tracking in 1976.

The state's lowest unemployment rate among metropolitan statistical areas in August was the Midland MSA with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.2 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA at 2.7 percent.

TxDOT asks for input

The Texas Department of Transportation on Sept. 23 started asking citizens what they think will be the most pressing transportation needs for the next 30 years.

TxDOT is hosting a second round of public meetings that the agency says will be essential to developing the state's long-range transportation plan, which helps inform the direction for the future of Texas' multimodal transportation system.

The Texas Transportation Plan 2050, or TTP 2050, will guide TxDOT's planning and programming for the next 30 years and set long-range goals for all forms of transportation.

Texans who can't get to the meetings in person may participate online by visiting www.txdot.gov and searching for "TTP 2050". TxDOT is providing an interactive survey to gather public input. The virtual open house also features a transportation usage survey.

Online surveys will close Nov. 15, 2019, and public comments will be accepted throughout the development of the TTP 2050 until early 2020, the agency said.

RRC tops cleanup goal

In fiscal year 2019, which ended Aug. 31, the Texas Railroad Commission cleaned up more than 400 abandoned oil field sites.

On Sept. 27, the state's energy-regulating agency said the number of cleaned-up sites is more than double the goal set by the Texas Leg-

While most operators clean up their own oilfield sites when the wells are no longer productive, the Railroad Commission uses industry fees to clean up abandoned sites through the State-Managed Cleanup Program. The fees include regulatory fees, permit fees, enforcement penalties and bond amounts assessed on oil and gas

Since the State-Managed Cleanup Program was established in 1992, the RRC has assessed, investigated and — if cleanup was determined necessary - completed cleanup activities at 6,821 abandoned oilfield sites, restoring land used in energy production back to a safe condi-

Coffee

Drinking coffee is a daily habit that most Americans take for granted. How coffee became our morning drink of choice is not only a long story, but one with many twists and turns along the way.

The story of coffee begins around 850 in Ethiopia. According to legend, a goat herder named, Kaldi, noticed that his goats were acting strangely after eating red berries from a bush. Kaldi tried the berries and enjoyed their "uplifting" nature. He took the berries to local Monks who claimed they were the Devil's work and threw them into the fire. Soon the roasting coffee beans enticed the monks to pull out the beans and throw them in water to put out the fire. The first cup of coffee was born. The monks tried the drink and realized they could stay awake all night praying.

Around 1100 Arab traders returned from Ethiopia to Yemen with coffee plants. They called the

new treat, "qahwa," which meant "that which prevents sleep." From there Ottoman Turks introduced coffee to Constantinople. Coffee's popularity took off when the Mufti of Aden approved the drinking of coffee. The first coffee houses were soon established in 1454 and by 1475 the first coffee shops opened in Constantinople. In 1511 Governor Khayr Bey tried to ban coffee. He was executed for his trouble.

During the 1600's Arabia and Muslim Africa had a monopoly on growing coffee. In fact, it was illegal to sell fertile coffee beans to transport out of the country. However, Baba Budan managed to smuggle fertile coffee beans out of Mecca and take them to India. Coffee beans in India even to this day originated from the beans that Budan brought back. In his honor, he was made a saint and a region of India is named after him.

As coffee became popular across Europe, not everyone agreed about its importance. The church in Venice called coffee Satan's drink. Then Pope Clement VIII tried the drink and declared it delicious. He soon baptized coffee and made it a "Christian Drink." Not long after, coffee grew in popularity with the Dutch, the English, the French, and the Venetians. Coffee houses, also known as "penny universities," encouraged both the poor and wealthy to gather to discuss the matters of the day. Several businesses such as Lloyd's of London and the London Stock Exchange grew from

The story goes that Captain John Smith brought coffee to the Americas around 1607 and introduced it to the Indians when he was captured. By 1668, coffee overtook beer in New York City as the most popular drink for breakfast. This, however, is just the beginning of coffee's story. So, until next week, here are a couple of recipes to tide you

Coffee Sugar Cookies

Ingredients

1 c butter softened 1 1/2 c granulated sugar

2 eggs

2 tbsp. fresh ground coffee, you can also use

instant crystals or powder 1/2 tsp. vanilla

2 1/4 c flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/4 tsp. salt, I used kosher

Instructions

In a mixer, cream together butter and sugar. In a small bowl, combine eggs, vanilla, and coffee until fully incorporated. In separate bowl add together flour, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt. Slowly add your egg mixture to the butter mixture until well combined. Slowly add flour mixture until fully combined, do not over beat. Chill this dough for at least one hour, preferably overnight. When you are ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll out dough on floured solid surface to about 1/2 inch thick. Using a circle cookie cutter, punch out circles and place on a parchment lined baking sheet. Bake for 8-10 minutes, or until edges are slightly golden. Allow cookies to cool completely before covering in any icing.

Coffee Rubbed Brisket

Ingredients: Coffee Rub


2 cups light brown sugar 1 cup chili powder 1/4 cup paprika 1/4 cup coarse sea salt 1/2 cup ground black pepper 1/4 cup finely ground dark roast coffee Brisket 1 beef brisket, 4 to 6 pounds 3 large carrots cut into pieces 2 yellow onions cut into wedges

11/2 (18-ounce) bottle dark beer

Directions:

For the rub, combine brown sugar, chili

powder, paprika, salt, pepper and coffee in a medium bowl. Stir to combine well. Preheat the oven to 275°F. Rub brisket all over with coffee rub and set aside for 30 minutes. Arrange carrots and onions in the bottom of a roasting pan. Set brisket on top of vegetables. Pour beer over brisket and roast, 3 to 5 hours, until brisket is tender and falling apart. Allow about 45 minutes per pound of brisket. When brisket is done, you should be able shred the beef easily with a fork. Remove from the roasting pan and let rest 10 to 15 minutes. Pour the pan juices and vegetables into a saucepan. Skim the fat off the top of the juices and discard. Slice meat across the grain and arrange on a platter. Serve juices and vegetables with meat.

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

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October 8 field day to focus on playas and wind development By Jim Steiert

Landowners, Master Naturalists, educators, and the interested public are invited to a Playa Field Day October 8, that features a timely panel presentation on "Playas & Wind Development: Practices, Protocols, & Outcomes."

The field day is Tuesday, October 8, from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Floyd County Friends Unity Center located at 990 FM 786, adjacent to the south side of U.S. Highway 70 – halfway between Lockney and Floydada.

Panel presenters include Rick Hansen, habitat assessment biologist, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD); Tiffany Lyon, wildlife biologist with Western Ecosystems Technologies, Inc., and Tylan Shelton, a former wind project developer and current asset manager of the South Plains II and Route 66 wind projects owned by Novatus Energy.

Activities begin at 9:30 a.m. with coffee and refreshments.

An opening presentation by Don Kahl, TPWD Region 1 Migratory Gamebird Specialist from Lubbock, will cover playa restoration possibilities through the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative (TxPCI).

Healthy playas ensure recharge of clean water into the Ogallala aquifer. The recharge rate through playas is 10 to 100 times greater than elsewhere.

Kahl says Texas has 23,037 playas, with 4,080 currently categorized as pristine/functional. Another 5,631 are currently listed as functional but at risk, and 13,326 playas are categorized as not functional.

Kahl's TxPCI work, launched in 2015, seeks to rehabilitate playas listed as not functional. Others partnering with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in the effort include the Playa Lakes Joint Venture, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Ducks Unlimited, Texan by Nature, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and Ogallala Commons.

"Our focus is on backfilling tailwater pits in grass-buffered playas. A hole in the clay pan of a playa, such as a tailwater pit, is a hole in the playa's filter mechanism. Water gathered in a pit is not productive like rainwater spread shallowly over a whole playa basin. With pits, you lose the shallow water habitat," Kahl says.

Kahl says TxPCI seeks playas to restore and directly contacts the landowner. The initiative pays 100% of restoration costs and hires and pays contractors. Playa landowners receive a one-time incentive payment of \$80 per playa acre, and must enter into a ten year agreement that precludes future pit creation in the playa.

The initiative has projects in Castro, Floyd, Swisher, Briscoe, Hale and Armstrong counties thus far and as of spring 2019 had completed 13 pit filling projects with 489 playa acres restored. Thus far TxPCI has spent an average of \$12,305 per project.

Primary funding for TxPCI is via migratory gamebird funds through the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, federal and North American Waterfowl Conservation Act grants, and regional grants from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"This effort shows that water conservation goes beyond what you do in your household. It's important to realize where your water comes from, and the important role that playas play in keeping Ogallala aquifer water available," said Kahl.

FSA Encourages Farmers and Ranchers to Vote in County Committee Elections The 2019 Farm Service Agenticipate or cooperate in an FSA

The 2019 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections will begin on November 4, after ballots are mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices, or to be postmarked, is December 2, 2019.

County committee mem-

bers are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must par-

ticipate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, may also be eligible to vote. Eligible voters in local administrative area 1 who do not receive a ballot can obtain one from their local USDA Service Center.

Parmer County producers nominated in LAA-1, to serve as a committee member for a 3-year term are Andy Carthel and J' Lond Jarecki. Mr. Carthel resides in Friona and has a cotton, sorghum and wheat operation. Mr. Jarecki resides in Friona and has a cotton, wheat and corn operation. Newly elected committee members will take office on January 1, 2020

More information on county committees, such as the new 2019 fact sheet, can be found on the FSA website at fsa.usda. gov/elections or at a local USDA Service Center. The panel presentation will be at 10:10 a.m.

At 11:15 a.m. participants will depart for a field tour to visit a nearby playa restored through the TxPCI, and also to view wind turbines in relation to playas.

The tour returns to the Unity Center for lunch. Jim Steiert, outdoor writer and playa enthusiast from Hereford, will close the event with brief remarks. His book, Playas: Jewels of the Plains (Texas Tech University Press, 1995) can be purchased at the event for \$40.

Playas are shallow, rainfed wetlands throughout the Great Plains. When containing surface water, playas provide crucial habitat for wild-life that depend on water to survive. When dry, playas also support several other Great Plains wildlife species because they are often the only natural

lands in a region dominated by agricultural production. Playas also recharge water to the underlying aquifer, filter nutrients and chemicals from the surrounding watershed, and add recreational value to the region.

The Field Day is sponsored by Ogallala Commons and its partners, the High Plains Water District, the Dixon Water Foundation, and Texas Parks Wildlife Department. Those attending are asked to wear clothing, footwear, and a hat suitable for the field tours. There is no charge for the event, though a \$10 donation for lunch is appreciated.


