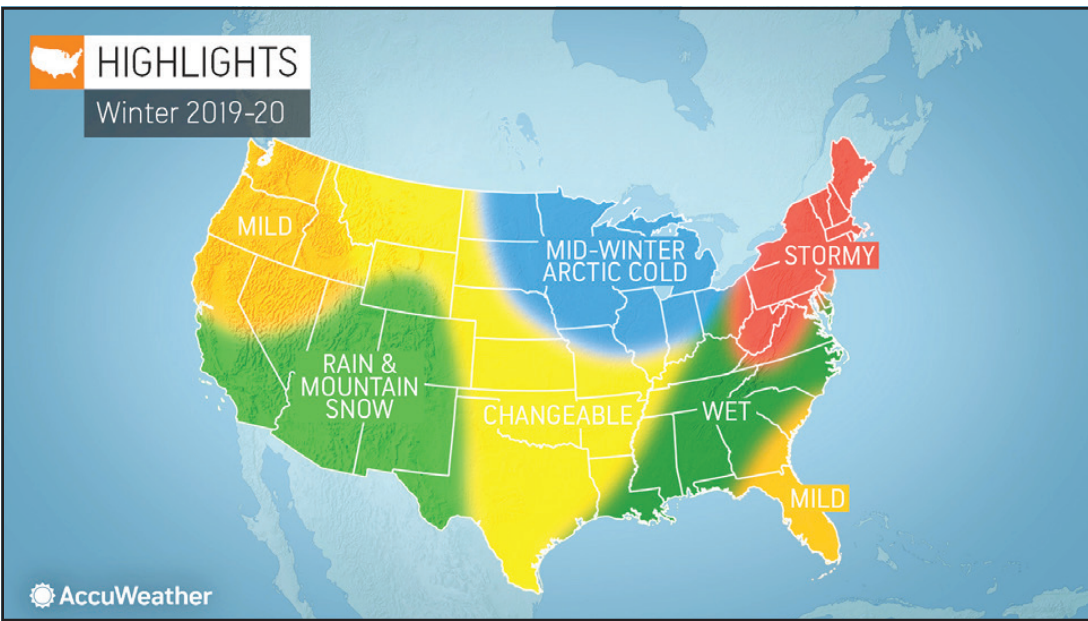
## Sometimes it does pour when it rains

Friona and Parmer County received their share and more of rain during the multiple weather events at the beginning of October. The "monsoonal flow" brought moisture up from the Gulf of Mexico and combined with several north "fronts" to produce ideal rain conditions. Nearly all of Parmer County received rain with the most common amounts being 5-6 inches. Several other locations, including the Hub

area, received over 11 inches of rain. A one-car accident at the Hub intersection on Tuesday, October 1st was attributed to "standing water" on the highway. The rain was well received by all especially since it was so hot and dry during August and September.

AccuWeather released its Winter Forecast last week. The Southern Plains will experience a "back-and-forth" weather pattern for much of

the winter. AccuWeather Expert Long-Range Forecaster Paul Pastelok said: "When we say back-and-forth, we're talking about extremes." He added, "In January, you may get a couple of chilly air masses, but it's offset by December and February when the temperatures actually end up being above normal," he said. "He concluded, "Early on, the region may see a few wintry events with snow and ice before milder air returns."



## Special Election for amendments and Parmer County's new voting machines

This past week, we received training on our new ExpressVote Machines. These machines meet all the requirements for security set by the Texas Secretary of State and Election Code. They will be in use during early voting and on Election Day this year.

**The ExpressVote is not connected to the internet.** It does not count your vote. You have complete control if you choose to vote using the ExpressVote. You may vote your precinct on the ExpressVote no matter in which precinct you reside.

After presenting your photo ID to the poll workers and being determined to be a registered voter, you will be given a paper ballot that will be blank except for a bar code indicating which precinct you will be voting.

You will place that paper in the machine and the ballot is displayed on the screen. It is colorful and large enough to read easily. If you need a black and white contrast to see it better, we can do that. If you need the ballot read to you, we have headphones and we can do that. If you read Braille, we have a key pad that offers that.

You simply touch the screen to vote. When you have finished, the ExpressVote prints your ballot. You can read it, make sure it is correct and deposit it in the ballot box. If it is incorrect, you take it to a poll worker and declare that it is incorrect and you want to

re-vote. As long as it has not been placed in the ballot box, you may re-vote.

Don't worry, we also have the old big paper ballots that you color in the ovals. You can choose to vote that way if you prefer. We encourage you to try the ExpressVote machine. I think you will like it.

By using this machine we do not have to print a large number of ballots and this saves the County and you the tax payer money. Because the ballot paper is blank and only printed when you vote, we save a lot of money on wasted ballots not used in this election. We can use the blank paper in any election in the future, thus preventing a lot of wasted paper.

Due to Legislative changes, early voting will ONLY take place at the County Clerk's office at the Courthouse in Farwell. It begins Monday, October 21st and ends Friday, November 1st. Our office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Fridays.

On Election Day, Tuesday, November 5th Precincts 101, 202 and 402 will vote at the Friona Senior Citizens Center. Precincts 201 and 303 will vote at the Bovina EMS building. All other precincts will vote in their usual polling places.

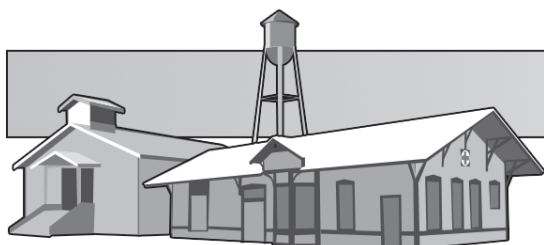

Home grown Texas Panhandle actors and producers, The McCain Brothers, announce the DVD release of their feature length thriller, "Killer Tumbleweeds". Just in time for Halloween.

Now based in Hollywood, the Bovina-raised brothers filmed their movie all over the world (Japan, Italy, Alaska, California, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas), but based the heart of the story and shot many scenes in Parmer Coun-

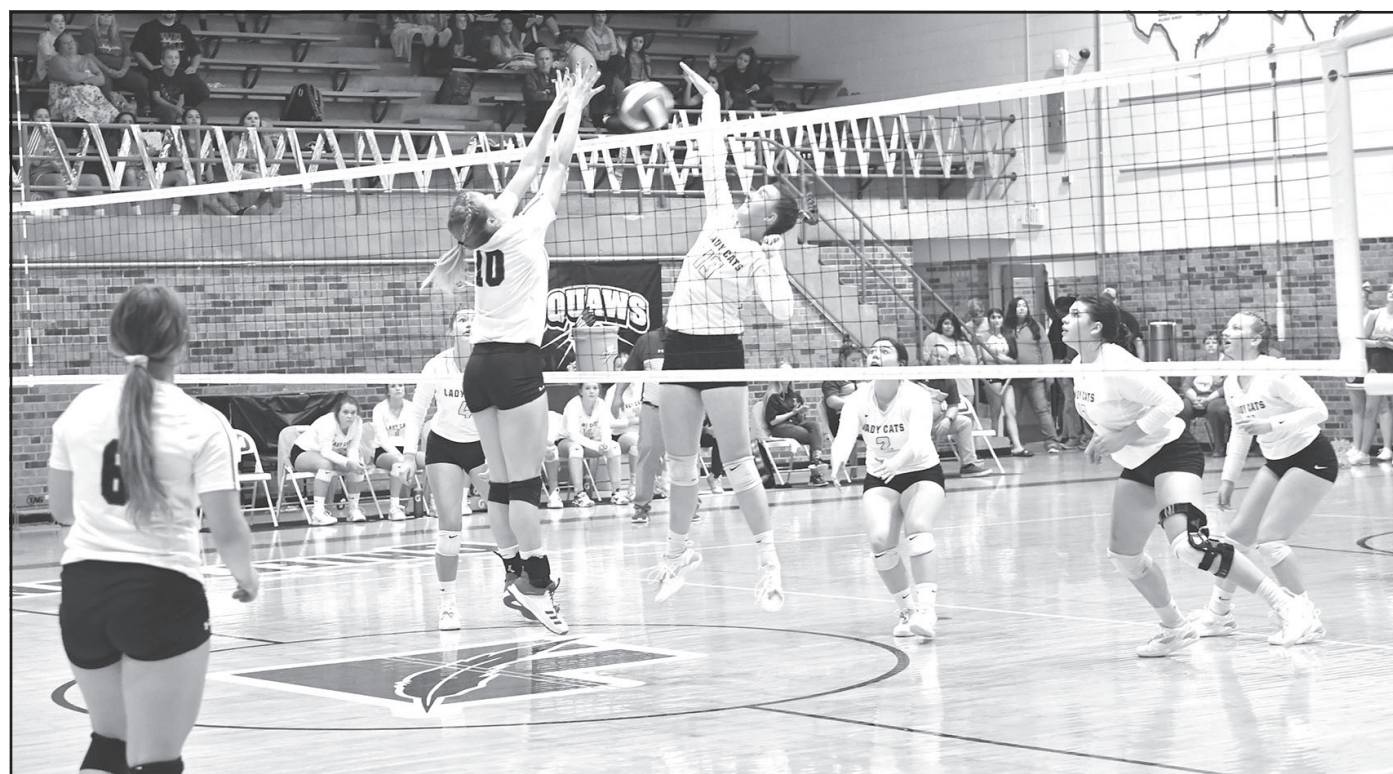
ty. "It's a silly little no budget movie featuring actors from Bovina, Farwell and Friona," says producer and director Ben McCain. His brother and fellow producer, Butch, explains further, "But it doesn't take away quality, because we were able to procure the tumbleweeds for free by checking our fences back home. This

Texas know-how helped slice some computerized special effects off the budget."

But most of the slicing was saved for the storyline: After the military secretly tweaks ordinary tumbleweeds to attack terrorists in far away deserts, something goes seriously wrong. The killer tumbleweeds escape and mul-

tiply, creating scenes of horror across Middle America. In a matter of days, 150 people are dead, 10,000 head of livestock are destroyed-not counting chickens and sheep and 300,000 children wind up suffering from Killer Tumbleweed trauma.

"Killer Tumbleweeds is an 87-minute edge-of-your-seat rolling ball of twisted entertainment with no profanity or nudity," says Butch. "However, there are scenes of humans being attacked by the angry weeds. The weeds have needs!" Ben adds, "If you don't have a sense of humor, have been called an intellectual or attended college back east, we would like to discourage you from buying this movie."

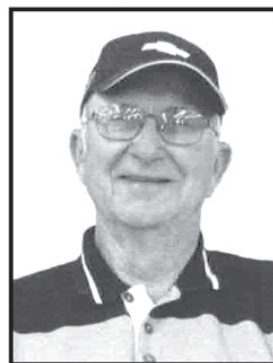

## Parmer Medical Center offering influenza shots

Parmer Medical Center and Friona Rural Health Clinic are once again going to be offering a Flu Shot Clinic at Friona Senior Citizens. The influenza (flu) vaccinations will be given at the Friona Senior Citizens building located at 1410 Washington on Monday, October 14th from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Two different types of vaccinations are being offered this year. The Quadrivalent vaccine protects against four types of influenza – the same three strains as the standard flu shot, plus an additional B-strain virus. This is the same vaccine we have offered last two years. We are also offering the Fluzone-HD which is more commonly referred to as the "High Dose" flu vaccine. Information from the CDC website regarding the Fluzone-HD vaccine will be

available. This may assist individuals in determining which vaccination they want to receive.

The charge for the vaccinations will be totally covered if the recipient is a subscriber to traditional Medicare. You will need to present your Medicare card and driver's license at the time of the injection. For all other vaccination recipients, the cost for the Quadrivalent injection is \$29.00 and the Fluzone-HD is \$75.00.

Medicaid will not cover the charge for the vaccinations received at Friona Senior Citizens but will cover the cost for vaccinations received at Friona Rural Health Clinic located at 1307 Cleveland Avenue. For more information, call Rhonda Wilkins at 806-250-2754 or Jeff Proctor at 806-250-2781.



# Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 2.2 cents in the past week to an average of \$2.32 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 6.2 cents per gallon higher than a month ago, but still 33.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.99 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country stands at \$1.89, while the most expensive is \$5.52 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 0.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.65 per gallon. The national average is up 9.6 cents per gallon from a month ago, yet stands 25.3 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"It was a mixed bag for gas prices over the last week even as oil prices remained relatively low. California continued to lead the nation as prices skyrocketed, but appear to have peaked for now, while the Great Lakes states also saw prices march higher due to a price cycle. Other states saw some downward movement, but we appear ripe for a week that features more price decreases than increases,

especially for hard-hit California," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

"I believe we're due for the national average to edge lower by perhaps five cents in the coming week as I believe increases should be limited due to oil's drop in the last week fueled by continued worry over tariffs and trade, not with just China but now extending to Europe after the WTO agreed with the U.S. that Airbus was getting favorable treatment. Many motorists may scoff at such an issue affecting gas prices, but indeed, the threat of tariffs between such large trading partners is a serious issue that could result in slowdowns in both areas, leaving demand for oil lower and thus weighing on oil prices as a result."

I am sure most of you saw what happened after white Dallas police woman Amber Guyger was sentenced to 10 years in prison for murdering Bothan Jean, a black man she thought had broken into her apartment. As it turned out, Guyger was in Jean's apartment by mistake.

Jean's 18 year-old brother, Brandt, showed what it was like to be Jesus when he publicly forgave her, said he wished nothing bad for her, and even said he loved her as a person and did not want her to go to jail. And then, he hugged her.

But, in the midst of all the bad, I wonder how many lives were changed because Jean and Judge Kemp love Jesus and lived their faith in that courtroom.

Sadly, some people have been critical of Judge Kemp for giving Guyger a Bible (the whole church-state thing); I believe she was being obedient to Jesus and helping Guyger hopefully become a disciple of Christ.

Some people have been critical of the jury for only giving Guyger 10 years in prison; I admit I was surprised she only got 10 years. It is easy to sit in judgment of what should or should not have happened, especially when we weren't in the courtroom. One of the black jurors said she believed Bothan Jean wouldn't have wanted her to have more than 10 years, and she just couldn't give her any more time than that.

As usual, some people had to bring up the race of the people involved. I really don't understand why, because race was not a factor here. Jean and Judge Kemp are obviously children of Christ, and they were just being obedient to their Heavenly Father.

I admire and respect Judge Kemp and Brandt Jean more than words can say! Just like Jesus fights for each of us, they fought for Guyger's soul. God did a mighty work that day through them, and it is sad that not everyone could see it because of their negativity, and possibly because they do not know Jesus, the One they were trying to introduce to Guyger.

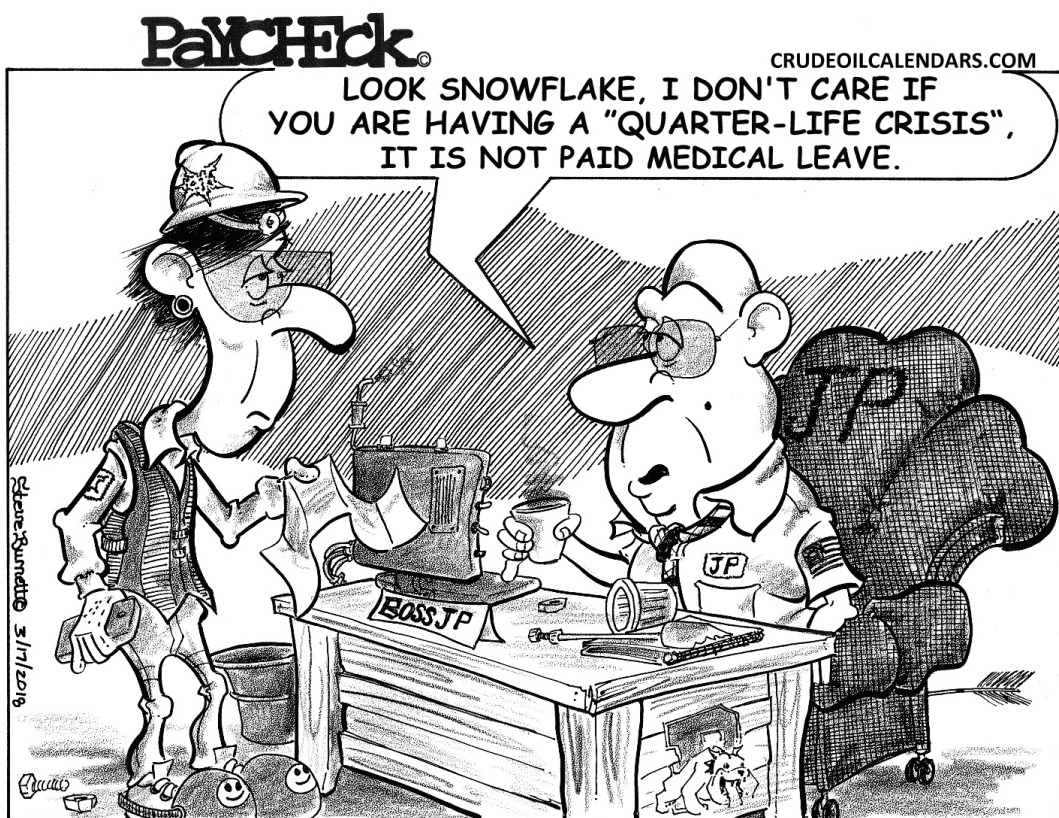
## Psalm 143—God's Ground

## State Capital Highlights

### Abbott puts Bush in charge of disaster mitigation effort

AUSTIN — A plan is afoot for large-scale, regional projects to improve the state's resilience to hurricanes and other natural disasters, Gov. Greg Abbott announced Oct. 4.

Abbott tapped Texas Land Commissioner George P. Bush to lead the federally funded \$4 billion-plus "comprehensive mitigation" effort. Funding will come from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development under a community development block grant.

"Today we are pushing forward with the single-largest mitigation program our state has ever seen," Abbott said. "Commissioner Bush and I are committed to working together in partnership with HUD (U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development) and the Texas Division of Emergency Management to maximize the impact of this funding."

HUD on Aug. 23 released mandatory rules for the use of more than \$4.3 billion in congressionally appropriated funding to be administered by the Texas General Land Office. Funding has been earmarked for projects as follows:

- \$4,074,456,000 for Hurricane Harvey;
- \$169,748,000 for 2016 floods; and
- \$52,985,000 for 2015 floods.

The overall total includes certain funds for 2015 floods to be allocated directly by HUD to

- City of Houston, \$61,884,000; and
- City of San Marcos, \$24,012,000.

### Federal disaster declared

The White House on Oct. 4 ordered federal assistance to supplement state and local recovery efforts in Texas counties affected by Tropical Storm Imelda from Sept. 17 to Sep. 23.

The disaster declaration makes federal funding available to affected individuals in the counties of Chambers, Harris, Jefferson, Liberty, Montgomery and Orange. Assistance may include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Federal funding is also available on a cost-sharing basis for hazard-mitigation measures statewide. Additional designations may be made at a later date if requested by the state and warranted by the results of further damage assessments, according to a White House news release.

When Gov. Abbott requested the presidential disaster declaration on Oct. 1, he said, "The recent severe weather in the Gulf Coast region has

impacted thousands of Texans, leaving many without the resources they need to recover."

### Revenue inches higher

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Oct. 2 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.74 billion in September, an amount 1.2 percent more than the amount reported for the month of September 2018.

"State sales tax revenue grew only modestly in September," Hegar said. "Strong growth in receipts from the construction sector, retail trade and restaurants were largely offset by declining receipts from oil- and gas-related sectors."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in September 2019 was up 3.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

### 'Farm Fresh' kicks off

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller on Oct. 2 announced the start of the Texas Department of Agriculture's annual Farm Fresh Challenge for Texas schools.

The effort encourages schools to buy Texas-grown foods, teach students about the importance of agriculture and celebrate their activities on social media.

More than 220 school districts and charter school organizations have pledged participation for 2019, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

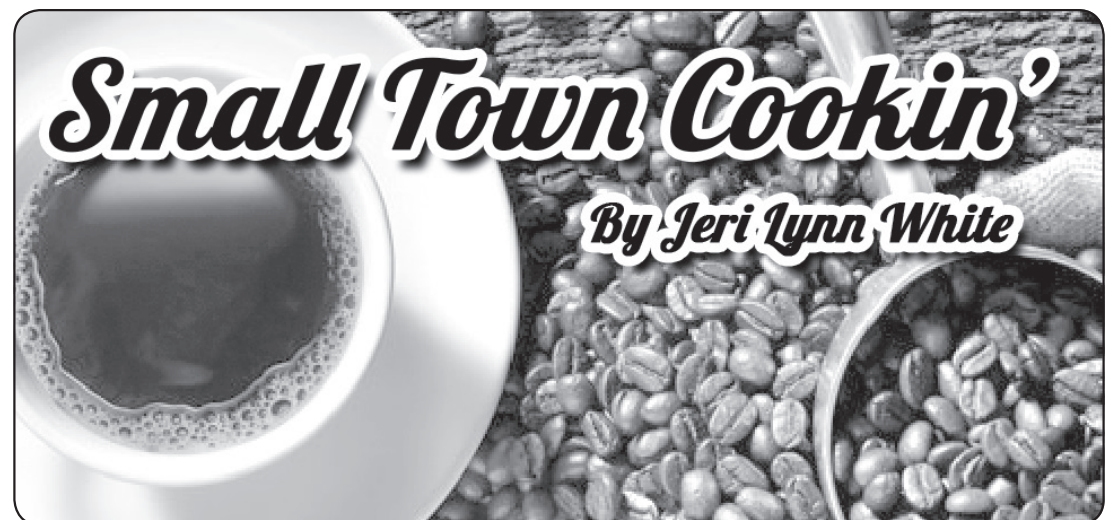
### DSHS updates case count

The Department of State Health Services on Oct. 1 reported the identification of some 75 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who report vaping before developing symptoms.

State health officials, who update and post the case count every Tuesday, are gathering more information about 34 other possible cases to determine whether they are consistent with the symptoms and substance use seen in cases in Texas and 47 other states.

Patients range in age from 13 to 75 with a median age of 22 years. About one-third of the Texas cases have been in teens, three-quarters are male and almost all required hospitalization.

Nationally, 1,080 cases have been reported. DSHS is working with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration and other states to gather evidence of what the cases have in common and determine a cause.



## Coffee Part II

This week the story of coffee continues. In 1669, the French were introduced to coffee by Soliman Aga, the Turkish Ambassador to Paris. This led to the first literary coffee shop opening in 1686. Café Procope, still open to this day, is the oldest café in Paris. The French's love of coffee led to one of the most interesting stories about coffee. In 1713, the Mayor of Amsterdam gifted a coffee plant to King Louis XIV. The king kept the coffee plant under constant protection in the Royal Botanical Gardens in Paris. Fast forward to 1723. The coffee plant had grown and flourished. A young French naval officer, Gabriel Mathieu de Clieu, decided to ask the King for a clipping of the coffee tree. The King refused, but this did not stop de Clieu. He scaled the walls of the garden and stole a cutting from the tree and planned to escape with the cutting to the French colony of Martinique in the West Indies. He did escape on a ship and kept the coffee plant in a glass cabinet below deck. During the journey to Martinique, de Clieu had to fight off a Dutchman who tried to steal the plant, a band of pirates who attacked the ship, and a terrible storm that almost sank the vessel. Gabriel was forced to share his ration of water to keep the plant alive. After finally arriving in Martinique, Gabriel secretly cultivated the coffee

plant and within three years coffee plantations spread all over Martinique, St. Dominique, and Guadeloupe. King Louis XIV finally forgave Gabriel for his theft and made him Governor of the Antilles because of the prolific coffee production. This little coffee plant was the stock for coffee plants throughout the Caribbean as well as South and Central America.

Around this same time, the English Governor of Jamaica, Sir Nicolas Lawes took the first coffee plant to Jamaica. Soon coffee cultivation spread to the Blue Mountains and took off like never before. Although most of the world was embracing coffee, in 1757, the British East India Trading Company stopped trading coffee. This caused tea to become England's drink of choice.

Political uprisings in America would cause coffee to become America's drink of choice. Because of cries of "taxation without representation," American Patriots held the Boston Tea Party in 1773, dumping loads of English tea into Boston Harbor. Drinking coffee became America's patriotic duty. In New York City, across the street from the Merchants Coffee House, which had been the "birthplace of our nation" several years earlier, the birth of the New York Stock Exchange took place. The trading room moved to the second floor

of the Tontine Coffee House where it remained until 1817.

Soon coffee and technology would meet, and the world of coffee would never be the same. In 1818, Laurens, a Parisian metal smith invented the first coffee percolator. In 1822, with the invention of steam power, Louis Bernard Rabaut created a brewing machine that used steam to force hot water through coffee grounds. James Folger decided to stay in San Francisco, rather than chase gold, and founded the Folger Coffee Company. In 1864, Jabez Burns was granted a U.S. patent on the Burns coffee roaster. Although the design was similar to that of Laurens, James H. Nason was granted a patent for the first coffee percolator in the U.S. Soon after in 1871, John Arbuckle invented a machine that filled, weighed, sealed, and labeled coffee in paper packages.

Interestingly, in 1886, Joel Cheek created a new coffee blend which he named Maxwell House. It was named after a hotel in Nashville, Tennessee where seven presidents had stayed, including Theodore Roosevelt. Roosevelt once commented that the coffee at Maxwell House was, "good to the last drop."

Thus, our coffee journey enters the Twentieth Century, but it does not end there. Look for the conclusion of our coffee adventure in next week's paper.

### Perfect Iced Coffee

#### Ingredients:

- 1-pound Ground Coffee (good, Rich Roast)
- 8 quarts Cold Water
- Half-and-half (healthy Splash Per Serving)
- Sweetened Condensed Milk (2-3 Tablespoons Per Serving)

Note: Can Use Skim Milk, 2%% Milk, Whole Milk, Sugar, Artificial Sweeteners, Syrups...adapt To Your Liking!

#### Instructions:

In a large container, mix ground coffee with water. Cover and allow to sit at room temperature twelve hours or overnight. Line a fine mesh strainer with cheesecloth and set over a pitcher or other container. Pour coffee/water mixture through the strainer, allowing all liquid to run through. Discard grounds. Place coffee liquid in the fridge and allow to cool. Use as needed. To make iced coffee, pack a glass full of ice cubes. Fill glass 2/3 full with coffee liquid. Add healthy splash of half-and-half. Add 2-3 tablespoons sweetened condensed milk (can use plain sugar instead) and stir to combine. Taste and adjust half-and-half and/or sweetened condensed milk as needed. This amount makes about 24 servings.

### Coffee-Braised Roast

#### Ingredients

- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed, divided
- 1 boneless beef chuck roast (4 to 5 pounds), trimmed
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup strong brewed coffee
- 1 cup beef broth
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 cup cold water
- Mashed potatoes

#### Directions

In a large resealable plastic bag, combine vinegar and 2 garlic cloves. Add roast; seal bag and turn to coat. Refrigerate overnight, turning occasionally. Drain and discard marinade. Pat roast dry; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place roast in a 5- or 6-qt. slow cooker; add coffee, broth, onion and remaining garlic. Cook, covered, on low until meat is tender, 6-7 hours. Remove roast and keep warm. Strain cooking juices, discarding onion and garlic; skim fat. In a small bowl, mix cornstarch and cold water until smooth; gradually stir into slow cooker. Cook, covered, on high until gravy is thickened, 30 minutes. Slice roast; serve with mashed potatoes and gravy.

## Cornyn Announces Treasury Will Help Texans Redeem Billions in Unclaimed Savings Bonds

U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) announced Friday that the U.S. Treasury Department will assist Texans in claiming an estimated \$2.1 billion in unredeemed savings bonds:

"Texans deserve access to all of their hard-earned money, whether it's a bond purchased for grandchildren or during a time of war decades ago," said Sen. Cornyn. "Instead of having these bonds sit forgotten in the hands of the Treasury, they can soon disburse this money to its rightful owners."

Sen. Cornyn cosponsored the Unclaimed Savings Bond Act (USB Act) earlier this year that would allow states to actively seek out and assist residents to reclaim funds on un-

redeemed U.S. savings bonds through the use of their unclaimed property procedures. The amount owed to Texans is estimated at more than \$2 billion.

As part of their plan, Treasury will create an online tool that will allow individuals to verify against Treasury records if they have any unredeemed savings bonds dated after 1974. Treasury will also provide shareable links to states so the tool can be promoted through Unclaimed Property Program websites. The records for the newer bonds are in the best physical condition. For the records on the older bonds dating back to World War II, Treasury will gather expert opinions and states' input on how to digitize them.

### Comptroller's Office Announces Updated Web Tool Highlighting Texas' Place in National Economy

(AUSTIN) — After adjusting for cost of living, Texas has the highest average wages in the United States, according to an updated Comptroller's office tool that lets users see how Texas and its distinct, diverse regions fit into the national picture. TextIndex updates information from the Comptroller's 50-State Scorecard which debuted in 2015 and

was updated in 2017. The inclusion of Texas' regional data in TextIndex allows a more detailed look at the state. Data range from information on the state's under-18 population and degreed professionals to home values and the state tax burden. "The new TextIndex is a more user-friendly tool that allows you to dig into data

that not only compares Texas to other states, but also provides key insights across the 12 economic regions of our state," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "This is information that illuminates some of the most important issues facing Texas, highlighting categories in which we lead the way and those in which we still have work to do."

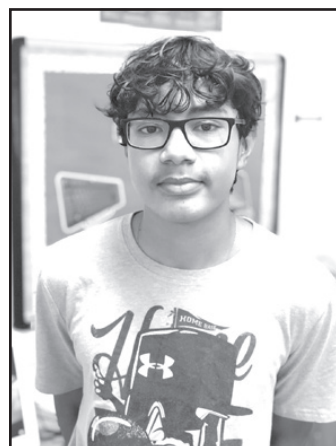
