

the City of Friona in their "Panhandle Magazine" for December. News Channel 10 recently launched a new, free magazine called "Panhandle Magazine". It features the past, present and future of the panhandle. The City will gather information and photographs for the publication.

Chief Jimenez and the officers responded to 249 calls in October. There were 249 stops, 161 warnings, 88 citations, and 10 arrests. (2-warrants, 6-no drivers license, 1-possession of controlled substance and 1-terroristic threat). The officers drove a total of 2,853 miles patrolling and protecting our city.

Volunteer Fire Department responded to 10 emergency calls in October. On Oct. 1st, there were two calls: electrical short fire. Five firefighters and three trucks responded. Also, a car accident: five fire fighters and 2 trucks responded. Oct 7th, a railcar fire. Five firefighters and three trucks responded. Oct 13th, a car accident. Eight firefighters

and 4 trucks responded. Oct 18th, a grass fire. Six firefighters and one truck responded. Oct 20th, a grass fire. Seven firefighters and two trucks responded. Oct 21st, a dryer fire. Four firefighters and two trucks responded. Oct 26th, a car accident. Eight firefighters and two trucks responded. Oct 27th, a car accident. Fourteen firefighters and three trucks responded. Oct 30th, a car accident. Seven firefighters and two trucks responded.

Judge Campbell had 154 new cases in October. There were 119 total dispositions. The court collected \$13,934.07 in fines and court cost equaled \$9,299.64.

Emergency Medical Service responded to 43 calls in October. There were eleven 911 calls, twenty-four transfers and six calls ended in a "no transport". Total billing equaled \$56,114.74 and collected \$5,621.74. The City of Friona and the Parmer Medical Center have signed an agreement to allow nurses to ride with patients in the

ambulance during transfers. This agreement applies to the unique circumstances whenever the EMS does not have ALS or MICU staff available.

Accounts Payable equaled \$162,886.10 for October. Not any big expenditures, just normal operating expenses. The city continues to be in good standing.

City pumped 7,698,800 gallons of water and sold 10,288,000 gallons. Billing totaled \$61,006.83 on 1448 accounts. There were 13 new accounts and 11 disconnects.

Friona Public Library had 615 visits (including electronic) in October, an average of 29 daily visits and was open for 21 days. There were 767 items circulated and 103 new items added to inventory. The Friona Public Library Advisory Board of Trustees met on Oct 23rd and Library Director Anahi Gomez updated the members on the new library card, website, and Facebook page.

State Capital Highlights

Voters approve 9 of 10 proposed constitutional amendments

AUSTIN — Voters rejected only one of 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution in the statewide election held Nov. 5.

The House and Senate, in the 86th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature that ended in May, approved the propositions for voters to decide. Results are as follows:

Prop. 1, permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at a time, failed with 681,139 "yes" votes — or 34.56 percent of votes cast — to 1,970,765 "no" votes or 65.44 percent.

Prop. 2, providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas, passed with 1,285,397 votes or 65.62 percent of votes cast, to 673,306 votes or 34.38 percent.

Prop. 3, authorizing the Legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by disaster, passed with 1,667,110 votes or 85.09 percent of votes cast to 292,031 votes or 14.91 percent.

Prop. 4, making it more difficult for the state to impose an individual income tax by requiring a two-thirds majority vote of the House and Senate before putting the matter on a ballot for voters to approve or disapprove, passed with 1,467,994 votes or 74.41 percent of votes cast to 504,848 votes or 25.59 percent.

Prop. 5, dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas natural areas, water quality and history by acquiring, managing and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes, passed with 1,732,331 votes or 88 percent of votes cast to 236,251 votes or 12 percent.

Prop. 6, authorizing the Legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, passed with 1,250,089 votes or 64 percent of votes cast to 703,157 votes or 36 percent.

Prop. 7, allowing increased distributions to the Available School Fund, passed with 1,449,333 votes or 74.12 percent of votes cast to 506,142 votes or 25.88 percent.

Prop. 8, providing for the creation of the Flood Infrastructure Fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation and flood control projects, passed with 1,527,394 votes or 77.83 percent of votes cast to 435,184 votes or 22.17 percent.

Prop. 9, authorizing the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state, passed with 977,272 votes or 51.6 percent of votes cast to 916,513 votes or 48.4 percent.

Prop. 10, to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances, passed with 1,845,766 votes or 93.75 percent of votes cast to 123,032 votes or 6.25 percent.

Cash report is released

The State of Texas finished the 2019 fiscal year with unspent revenue, according to a new report

Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar on Nov. 4 announced the publication of the State of Texas Annual Cash Report, a 458-page document, for the fiscal year that ended Aug. 31.

The report, summarized in a cover letter to Gov. Greg Abbott, presents the state's financial condition and details revenues and expenditures on a cash basis as required by state law.

The Consolidated General Revenue Fund ended the year with a cash balance in the state treasury of \$8.4 billion, an increase of \$3.9 billion, or 88.1 percent, from fiscal 2018. The change in the balance, Hegar said, is largely due to an increase in tax collections.

Hegar estimates revenue

Comptroller Hegar on Nov. 4 reported state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.82 billion in October, 7 percent more than in October 2018.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in October 2019 was up 4.1 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue is distributed

Comptroller Hegar on Nov. 6 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$849.6 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of November.

The amount is 4 percent more than the amount distributed in November 2018.

Garam Masala

Now that we have learned about several spices, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves, I thought you might enjoy a recipe that uses these spices from a different culture. The garam masala spice mix is a seasoning blend that originated in India. In Northern India, they use the powdered blend while in the Southern regions, they make a paste with the spice blend using coconut milk, vinegar or water. The mix can vary depending on the region of India and tends to

be spicier the more south you go with the addition of chili peppers. The following recipe shows you how to make a homemade version of garam masala, but a premade mix is available in the international aisle of the grocery store, or you can order it from Amazon.

Garam masala is made from ground spices that are usually toasted. The word masala simply means spices and the word garam means warm. This does not refer to the spiciness of the

seasonings, but rather the fact that these spices tend to warm the body. The spices in garam masala are considered good for digestion as well as increasing metabolism.

The garam masala is often added at the end of cooking since it is intended to add to the fragrance of the food as well as the flavor. It can be used with meat, fish, vegetables, and in soups.

Ingredients:

3 tablespoons coriander seeds 2 tablespoons cumin seeds 2 tablespoons cardamom seeds 2 tablespoons black peppercorns

1 whole cinnamon stick

1 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

1 teaspoon whole cloves

Instructions:

Heat a dry skillet over medium-high heat and toast the coriander, cumin, cardamom, black peppercorns for about 10 minutes. Stir them from time to time to keep everything cooking evenly. When the ingredients have darkened slightly and give off a rich, toasty aroma, remove them from the pan and let them cool. Grind in a spice grinder or coffee grinder. Grate the nutmeg and add it to the mixture. Store in an airtight container away from heat. It will last up to one month.

Indian-Spiced Salmon (Pareve)

Ingredients

1.5 pounds (24 oz. or 680 g) salmon fillet (skin removed, cut into individual portions if desired) 1/2 teaspoon garam masala

Juice of 1/2 lime, plus additional lime wedges for serving

2 tablespoons tamari soy sauce 2 tablespoons pure maple syrup

Steps to Make l

Gather the ingredients. Preheat the oven to 425 F/220 C. Place the fish in a baking dish slightly larger than the fillet(s). Sprinkle the fish evenly with the garam masala. Whisk together the lime juice, soy sauce, and maple syrup and pour over the fish. Place the baking dish in the preheated oven and roast for 12 to 15 minutes, basting once or twice with the pan juices, or just until the salmon flesh is opaque in the center and the fish flakes easily with a fork. (The thickness of the fillets will determine how long the fish takes to cook.) Serve with lime wedges. Enjoy!

Tamari soy sauce is a specifically Japanese soy sauce. It tends to have a richer flavor, darker hue, and thicker consistency than regular Chinese soy sauce. However, the two can be interchanged in recipes.

Playa Field Day to focus on grassland birds

A Playa Field Day with a focus on grassland birds will be Tuesday, November 19 from 9:30 a.m. to1 p.m., starting in Canyon, and continuing with a field trip. Landowners, Master Naturalists, educators, and the interested public are in-

vited to attend.

The field day will feature a presentation on grassland birds, a field tour with the opportunity to view waterfowl on selected playas, and a visit to Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge near Umbarger. There will also be a presentation of general information about playa ecosystems, as well as playa restoration programs.

Activities will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Randall County AgriLife Extension Building Classroom, located at 200 Brown Road on the west edge of Canyon, on the south side of US Highway 60, with coffee and refreshments, and an overview of the day.

An opening presentation by Don Kahl, TPWD Region 1 Migratory Game Bird Specialist, will cover general information on playas and restoration possibilities through the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative.

Jaime Allen, Assistant Manager of the High Plains National Wildlife Refuge Complex that includes Muleshoe, Grulla, and Buffalo Lake, will give "An Overview of Grassland Birds" at 10:10 a.m. Her presentation will acquaint the audience with 8-10 bird species that utilize grassland habitat around playa uplands

and shortgrass prairies, both seasonally and year-round.

The Audubon society's North American Grasslands and Birds Report for 2019 states that fewer than 40 percent of the 550 million acres of historical grasslands that once stretched from Alberta to Mexico remain today. Most of these grassland acres were converted to cropland, others to energy development or other uses. As these tallgrass, mixed grass, shortgrass prairies, and desert grasslands are lost, so are the wildlife that depend on them.

Not surprisingly, grassland species are among the most imperiled group of birds in the United States. Total populations have declined more than 40 percent since 1966, and some species, like the lesser prairie chicken, hover at the brink of extinction. Bison, pronghorns, and monarch butterflies are only a few examples of other wildlife that face a diminished future if remaining grasslands disappear or degrade. Human health and livelihoods are also entwined with the fate of grasslands. Pollinating insects thrive in fields of wildflowers and native grasses, while the deep roots of native plants trapped nutrients and water-and keep prairies resilient through natural cycles of drought, fire, grazing, and storms.

At 10:45 a.m. a field tour will visit nearby playas south and west of Canyon that may

hold waterfowl that can be viewed from the roadside. By 11:45a.m., the tour will arrive at the Camping Area at Buffalo Lake NWR, where the group will reconvene in the Education Room for a sandwich lunch and a presentation about the history and impact of Buffalo Lake.

Playas are shallow, rainfed wetlands throughout the Great Plains. When containing surface water, playas provide crucial habitat for many wildlife that depend on water to survive. When dry, playas also support several other Great Plains wildlife species because they are often the only natural lands in a region dominated by agricultural production. Playas also recharge water to the underlying aquifer, filter nutrients and chemicals from the surrounding watershed, and add recreational value to the region.

The field day is sponsored by Ogallala Commons and its partners, the High Plains Water District, the Dixon Water Foundation, and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Those attending are asked to wear clothing, footwear, and a hat suitable for the field tours. There is no charge for the event, though a \$10 donation for lunch is appreciated.

Highlight from the Ark Encounter and Creation Museum Bus Tour

On October 26, 2019, Dale and Donna Schueler with the help of Diamond Tours headed out from Friona, TX on a 9 day and 8 night amazing trip to Cincinnati, Ohio. We had two big buses with a total of 79 people making the trip. Cathy Spencer, a friend previously from Friona and now from Spur, TX, helped us out with being the trip leader for our second bus. As a stop on our way we enjoyed some time at the Bass Pro Shop Outdoor World in Springfield, MO.

Our first day in Cincinnati was enjoyed with a time spent at the downtown Newport Aquarium which was celebrating its 20th Anniversary this year. New this year was a Freshwater Falls exhibit, with a cascading stream and waterfall featuring dozens of animal and plant species plus a tunnel underneath the surface of a Kentucky waterfall. In the afternoon we learned at BB Riverboats that if you love being near the water but not in it, that we could go aboard a yester-year-inspired river paddleboat for a scenic cruise down the

Ohio River. We got a glimpse of spectacular views of downtown Cincinnati's skyline. We enjoyed a great view of the Cincinnati Red's Baseball stadium and learned they were baseball's first professional team and were celebrating by turning 150 years old this year.

On the next day we enjoyed a visit to the Creation Museum near Petersburg, KY which is west of the Cincinnati International Airport. The state-of -the -art Creation Museum allows you to venture through and see animatronic dinosaurs and people that look so real. They have real fossils and more that bring the history of the Bible to life. We got to experience a state-of-the-art special effects theater with cutting edge 4D technology and a spectacular new program upholding the truths of God's Word beginning in Genesis. You can walk through the history of the world, starting in the Garden of Eden at creation with lifesized exhibits. At the Stargazers Planetarium there you can explore the universe with two biblical astronomy shows. More fun awaits



outside with the petting zoo, camel rides, zip lines and a stunning botanical garden with the beautiful Fall Colors. Due to rainy weather the day we were there we didn't get to enjoy the outside activities as much as we would have liked to but it was a beautiful place.

On Thursday we had a wonderful day visiting the Ark Encounter which is located off of I-74 near Williamstown, KY, about a 40 mile drive south of Cincinnati, Ohio. The Ark Encounter is a full size Noah's Ark built according to the dimensions given in the Bible, Genesis 6:14-16. It is 520 feet long, 85 feet wide and 51 feet high and this modern engineering marvel will amaze you. It has three decks of world-class exhibits that are designed to answer your questions about Noah's Ark and the biblical flood. You get to experience close up encounters with amazing animals that look so real and see the way Noah and his family took care of them. You also get to travel back in time to see life size statues of Noah and his seven family members and how they may have lived during their time on the Ark. Because of the cold rainy and windy day when we were there we did not get to experience the living exotic animals from all over the world that are in the Zoo on the grounds near the Ark. Adults and kids can enjoy the petting zoo and riding on the back of a camel. There are other outside activities with the zip line being very popular. We felt like this day was the highlight of our trip to get to tour the most authentic replica of Noah's ark in the world (and the largest wooden constructed building in the world). It was amazing to see how the biblical account of Noah's ark comes to life. We hope we can encourage many to take their families there to experience this adventure.

Texas gas prices have risen 2.3 cents in the past week to an average of \$2.27 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 3.6 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and 14.7 cents per gallon lower than a

year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the lowest price in the state today is \$1.92 while the highest is \$3.19 per gallon. The lowest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.92 while the most expensive is \$5.49 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 1.5 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.61 per gallon. The national average is down 3.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and is 6.8 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"It looks like average gas prices in most areas saw a modest uptick again in the last week, for the second consecutive week on continued optimism over a China/U.S. trade deal and another decline in gasoline inventories, which pushed wholesale gas prices higher in most areas," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for Gas-Buddy. "In addition, some areas of the Great Lakes saw prices spike due to price cycling, a local trend, and with

the stock market and interest rates heading up there's been a strong belief that the economy continues to chug along, boosting oil demand in it's wake as well, leading to an unusual trend in the fall: gas prices that aren't falling but stable or increasing. About the only region that has seen some relief in recent days and will see prices drop notably will be the West Coast, but only after gas prices in those areas soared on refinery kinks, power outages and more. California will likely soon slide back under \$4 per gallon while the Pacific Northwest- Washington and Oregon- will see declines of 10-25 cents over coming weeks. For the rest of the country, we'll see some limited price drops with the possibility of prices holding or even rising again this week, following oil prices higher."
