England 18 Sept. 1944 Dear Mama Hickox:

I received your letter a few days ago and must say I was exceedingly glad to get it. You wrote things that I wouldn't have heard otherwise. Geneva sends me the papers but I don't receive them very often. I will get them all sooner or later I suppose. The last ones that I got notches cut all in them: It is a cus-

I am in the office this morning with nothing to do. It's the first time that I can say that. To keep myself busy and from freezing, I'm catching up on my back correspondence. It is rather cold now, especially the nights and mornings. I thought that I had become acclimated, but I don't suppose I ever will. It is getting fall now, however,

and should be turning cold. We do not have any fire in the office at awful cold. We have steam heat. but they say it isn't turned on until 35-H&TC, 1 1-4 miles northwest of Nov. 1st. They will never thaw me

We have gas in our rooms, but it is used only to light the fires. We fill the grate with coal and when it er convenient, especially for me, a I never could start a fire here. Eton School which was built in the 13th century and is still used today. I'm sure the school you attended was much more modern than this one and how students can go to school there is more than I can see. The desks and benches are long, thick boards with names and tom for each student to carve his name somewhere before he leaves I don't see how the place has survived that for all these centuries. It is a preparatory school, equivalent, I suppose, to our high schools and from here the students attend Oxford or Cambridge. They go here principally for the prestige of it. The tenth generation in one family finished school there last spring and the first generation attended in the 13th Century. The students wear high hats and frock tail coats. I was sorry that school hadn't begun so I could see them, but the term doesn't start until the 22nd of Sept. They have eleven hundred students and they are selected by scholarship. Shakespeare, Bacon, Chaucer and all the English writers were supposed to have attended school at Eton. If you remember the picture "Good-bye Mr. Chips", the setting was in this school.


Former Rankinite **Receives** Award From War Department

Only One Chesapeake



have the same high quality protein as the more expensive cuts, and just as many of the precious B vitamins (riboflavin, thiamine and niacin), and the minerals, iron, copper and phosphorus.

Now, here are delicious ways of preparing those inexpensive cuts of meat.

many of the operations in hydroponies or chemical farming, including a project in our island possessions captured or destroyed by the Japs.

The increased supply of chemicals which will soon be available together with necessary tank material, indicates that the newer form of farming or gardening will soon replace many of the present victory gardens - and be further utilized in greenhouses, attics, basements and auter-buildings.

Air force men convalescing from wounds at the Coral Gables, Fla., nospital are being taught the art of chemical farming, and will soon be ready to lead the movement back to nydroponics

While chemical farming will never replace our present methods of farming, it has definite advantages which can be utilized in greenhouses and for the home garden, as well as proving a paying hobby for many returned service men as well as others who have little available soil space.

There is no magic entailed in the growing of plants without soil. Sand, gravel, cinders, sawdust, shavings or just water may be used instead soil. Plant nutrients are added to whatever medium is chosen and the plant gets its balanced diet just as it would from soil. Because the diet can be controlled, it is possible to grow better quality fruit and vegetables by the hydroponics method than by soil farming.

Some years ago Dr. W. F. Gericke of the University of California dug up an idea of Dr. Knop, a German agricultural chemist, who in 1859 decided that he would add to the water the chemicals that plants | sorbent material which brings them

As early as 1935 a number of large growers of certain vegetables and flowers began to cultivate crops without soil. The next few years, intil Pearl Harbor they competed with "dirt farmers." In the middle west a number of greenhouses were converted into chemical farms, with success.

The advantage of chemical farming is that the particular kinds of chemicals that each definite plant needs can be determined by the test tube, and supplied in amounts and at times needed. It is also possible to control temperature - and sun-light, either artificial or natural, which is not always possible in open fields.

Encouraging results have been obtained. Tests have been checked in comparison with the same plants grown simultaneously in soil under ideal conditions of temperature and moisture and the results were surprising. As a rule the soilless garden plots gave more rapid growth. larger plants and produced from 25 to 75 per cent more fruit or vegetable, as well as maturing earlier. Experiments are being conducted to determine if certain earthworms are essential to plant life in chemical

solutions as well as in the ground During the present year a large farm has been purchased at White Mountains, N. H., to be devoted entirely to chemical horticulture. Dozens of beds of sand-cultured flowers, will be raised and experiments in all forms of chemical culture will be carried out in cooperation with the society of chemical horticulture.



Lynn Says:

Definition of Terms: Braising means to dredge meat with flour. salt and pepper, then brown in hot fat, add water or vegetable juices and cook slowly until meat is tender. The cooking may be done either on top of the range or in the oven. This method is frequently referred to as pot roasting.

Stewing means to brown meat in hot fat, add water (more than in braising) and vegetables, and simmer meat until it is thoroughly done.

Roasting means to bake in the oven to degree of doneness and is a method used for more expensive, tender cuts of meat.

Pan-broiling is cooking in a skillet on top of the range. Fat is not added except to meat pat-

Broiling means placing meat on an open rack in the broiler and cooking the meat quickly, without water or fat.

2 pounds short ribs of beef Flour, salt, pepper potatoes, peeled carrots, scraped 5 onions, peeled 2 stalks celery 2 cup green pepper, diced

Shortening Mix flour, salt and pepper. Rub

Braised Stuffed Breast. (Serves 6)



To make stuffing, brown celery and onions in the melted butter. Add bread crumbs, mint leaves and sea-sonings. Stir until thoroughly mixed and place into pocket of roast. Fasten edges together with skewers. Brown breast on all sides in hot lard, add 12 cup hot water, cover tightly and cook slowly until done, from 1/2 to 2 hours. Stuffed Veal Steak.

The same stuffing as used in the lamb breast may be used for yeal steak, if mint leaves are omitted. Have two pounds of veal steak cut 1/4 inch thick. Spread the stuffing over the meat and roll. Fasten with skewers, and braise as directed for lamb breast.

Most braised meats are hearty and should have light accompaniments. Try a green vegetable or crisp salad and very light dessert such as chiffon pudding, custard or stewed fruit and berries with cookies. As garnishes for the main dish use parsley, watercress, sliced raw onions, carrot tops or spiced fruit.





IN LARGE CITIES BEFORE PEARL HARBOR 90 per cent, and more, of the Japs in this country were in the Pacific coast states. After Pearl Harbor the army cleaned them out and locked them up in concentration camps as a measure of safety.

Today large numbers of those Japs the army locked up are being liberated and colonized in many sec-tions of the United States, much to the dissatisfaction of the people that are their new neighbors.

I lived in Chicago for many years, more than half a century. My home was on the South Side of the city, facing the lake. It was a desirable residence section within the city limits. Near and around me were many excellent homes, fine apartment buildings and residential hotels. Within a block of where I lived there is today a colony of Japs. The federal government is said to have strongly indicated to the owner of an apartment house that he must provide space for a Jap family. When he did it was not one family, but several that moved into the one apartment. White families moved out, and that apartment building today houses a colony of Japs. Men and women are finding jobs, at low wage scales, as house servants, much to the satisfaction of those for whom they work, but very much to the dissatisfaction of the people of the neighborhood in which the Japs live.

On Kenmore and Kenwood avenues, near the campus of the University of Chicago, other Jap colonies have been located by the same methods and with the same results. The whites are moving out and real estate values are going down.

Since World War I, when Chicago experienced a great influx of southern Negroes, the South Side of the city had what was considered a Negro problem. The colored people did not advance into the sections that have now been captured by the Japs. The whites say the Negroes would have been preferable.

That is one point on which Chicago, and other metropolitan centers, have lost the peace.




