Piencer Cattleman Is Buried Thursday In City Of Odessa, Texas

Thomas Edgar Baxter, 78, pio-neer West Texas cattleman, who rode horseback with a wagon train from his home in Tennessee to Texas in 1879, died Feb. 19 at Hamilton, Texas.

Survivors include his widow, two sons and two daughters, A. A. Baxter of Odessa, C. F. Baxter in the Navy, Mrs. A. J. Hunt and Mrs. P. R. Earnshaw of Odessa, also nine grandchildren. A son, Clovis Rook Baxter, preceded him in death May 26, 1945.

When Baxter was a boy of 11 he headed for Texas to join his brother who was a Texas Ranger with headquarters at Marfa. With the exception of a few years during the boom at Ranger, he had been in the cattle business and was a cattle inspector for a number of years. He rode cattle Texas to Dedge City on the old Chisholm Trail and made the

Funeral services were held on Thursday in Odessa at the Presbyterian Church.





Animals From Many Lands Speed World Rehabilitation

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Thousands of horses, cattle, mules, hogs, goats and other animals are being shipped through the UNRRA to liberated countries in Europe and to China to replace the catastrophic war losses ev-

from the U.S. Shipments will soon be made South America, Australia and Turkey. Mules have been procured in the U.S. and from U. S. and British Army surpluses in Europe and in Hawaii. The first shipment of mares and mules is now in process from Mexico.

From all of these sources, smaller animals, such as pigs. goats and sheep, will be procured if found surplus to the country's needs

The animals are urgently needed for food, raw materials and draft power. One of the major problems involved in procurement is obtaining animal breeds similar to those in the countries for which they are destined. During transportation they are accompanied by skilled UNRRA veterinarians to care for them and instruct the recipient countries in the best care.

To date, \$12 million worth of animals have been shipped. Animals scheduled for 1946 shipment are valued at about \$43 million.




