Perhaps, though, the soundest procedure to follow to reclaim our range, or maintain it in a highly productive condition, is to base the carrying capacity on bad years and then, if a good year hits, a portion of the lambs or calves can be held over for a while. The essential consideration is to get the range reseeded and revegetated with desirable forage and grazing plants.

It is possible that simply to stock a pasture according to its present productive ability will not reclaim it as quickly as if other methods are used in conjuction with the proper rate of stocking. In a large portion of this area about all the weeds
