## Letter to The Governor

Honorable Coke Stevenson, Governor The State of Texas Capitol Building Austin, Texas

On Monday, April 29, an escapee from the Big Spring State Hospital for the Insane assaulted a McCamey business man with one of two pocket-knives he carried on his person, inflicting grievous stab wounds from which it is doubtful that the victim will recover. More than 300 stitches were required to close the wounds. The assault

took place on McCamey's main street in broad daylight. The man who committed this heinous offense in plain view of many men, women and children had been an inmate of the State Hospital for three years prior to his escape on January 16, and was, according to information given Deputy Sheriff Earl McWilliams of Upton County by Big Spring State Hospital authorities, nearly incurable and dangerous.

Now, according to information received from the local District Attorney's office, the Big Spring State Hospital authorities state that they had broadcast a pick-up notice for the escapee.

Upton County officers state that such a pick-up notice has never been received.
