Safety Suggestions for Individual and Home

- 1. Avoid sudden chilling, such as would result from a plunge into extremely cold water.
- 2. Wash hands thoroughly before eating. If possible, avoid tonsil and adenoid operations during
- epidemics. 4. Observe scrupulous cleanliness of the person; frequent bath-
- ing is advocated.
- Immaculate clean clothes are important: Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use was almost demolished.

- Dental defects should be corrected. All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly out with only a few bruises;

The purpose of running the pipe was believed to protect the hole from caving shale rather than to test at this time oil shows said unofficially to have been encountered in the Devonian. The formation at 8-707 feet was reported by some observers to be the Silurian.

Assets Administrator has been authorized to reserve certain items for exclusive sale to you. They are listed below, but in fairness, we must tell you that quantities are not large, the demand is tremendous and you may not always be able to buy exactly what you want. Every veteran, however, will have the satisfaction of knowing that all items placed on the reserve or "set-aside" list

are going to veterans like himself. Subject to availability, you may purchase these items for your personal use, as well as for your business, professional, or agricultural enterprise. You may be sure that only World War II veterans will be entitled to purchase them.

The amended Act contains a second provision that further improves your buying position for your business, professional or agricultural enterprise. For items not included in this list, only Federal agencies buying for their own use may purchase ahead of you. This gives you, for business use, an advantage over State and local governments, tax-supported institutions, certified non-veteran small business enterprises and all other potential buyers except Federal agencies. For a specified period after the Federal agencies have had an opportunity to purchase surplus, all available items which do not appear on the reserve list will be available to you to purchase for your own business.

Under the amended Act you still must be certified to purchase war surplus, as thousands have done since the original Act was passed. The certification procedure has now been simplified, as explained at the right.

The War Assets Administration will make every effort to see to it that you receive the benefits Congress intends you to have. Your patience and cooperation will aid in the difficult task we face in trying to satisfy the needs of every veteran who wants to buy surplus property.

Thousands of veterans of World War II have already been certified to purchase surplus items. Such certifications remain valid and may be used to purchase items for which you are certified whether the item is on your reserve or "set-aside" list or on other surplus lists. You will be notified either by mail or by public local announcement where and when to make purchases.

STEP I. Take your honorable discharge from the arms services of World War II and apply at any of the offices listed below for a veteran's certificate for the item you desire.

Citizens of McCamey Help Us Prevent the Outbreak of Polio and Other Diseases

As far as we know, there has not as yet been a single case of Polio in McCamey, but it is only reasonable to assume that this good record can not be retained unless some drastic steps relative to sanitation in our town are taken immediately.

Medical Science points out that the prevention of Polio (as well as other diseases) can best be prevented by cleanliness and by the elimination of flies and mosquitoes. The city has taken over the hauling of garbage and we expect to have this matter well under control within a short time. This, of course, is the first step toward a more sanitary condition. But it will be necessary for everyone to cooperate with us. Therefore, we find it necessary to enforce the following ordi-

- 1. Open toilets are prohibited (if you have one, please close it and connect with the city water and sewer at once).
- 2. Cess pools that have broken in must be tightly covered (this will help eliminate both flies and mosquitoes).
- 3. Hog pens will not be permitted within the city limits. (Milk is still scarce and for that

reason we think that perhaps it is not wise to eliminate cows at this time. But for the protection of the health of your children and your neighbor's children, we ask that you kindly keep cow and horse lots clean).

4. All garbage cans must be covered. (If chase one for \$2.00 at the Anderson Warehouse. Or, if you prefer, you can make your own cover for the can you have. But in that case, be sure that the cover fits tightly and that the cover is kept on the can at all times).

We do not wish to embarrass anyone with prosecution, but we do intend to enforce these ordinances. It is for the best interest of all of our citizens.

If everyone will do his part, we can have a sanitary and healthful city. Let each one of us see to it that his own back yard is kept clean. Allow no garbage to remain around the house, in the yard, or in the alley. Place it all in the covered cans, and we'll try to haul it off before the flies get a chance at it.





EDITOR'S COLUMN

You who raise and feed livestock know as well as I do that the problems of the livestock-meat industry are usually mighty complicated. Naturally, I am always interested in what others have to say about our problems, especially in the press or over the radio.

During the recent meat strike, for instance, I was impressed with the effort that was made to place both sides of the question before the public. On the other hand, I was disturbed, on several occasions, by statements made by people who either did not know all the facts, or who ignored them—people whose words consisted of part-truths and their own biased opinions.

To my way of thinking, all of us should consider all the facts that are available if we are to form a fair opinion on any subject. And so, it seems to me especially important that ranchers and farmers have the fullest factual understanding of every part of the livestock-meat industry. Now I don't pretend to know all there is to know, and you probably have many facts that I lack. But from long experience in this business we have learned many things which might help clear up certain doubts and questions you may have in your mind.

If there are things about our business that you aren't sure about, we would appreciate hearing from you. We will reply with whatever facts we have. I am sure that our correspondence will make for a better mutual understanding of our common problems.

Even Crops Can Tell You When They're Hungry A farmer with the 'know-how" can spot, at a glance, evidence of starvation in his growing crops, and remedy it. You will find it profitable to learn the signs of "hidden hunger" in your crops, whether you are selling them as cash crops or using them as feed for livestock. Once you have learned to understand the "sign language" of plants, veins of upper leaves (condition known you can often tell just by looking at a growing plant 'white-bud") indicates zinc deficiency. whether it is drawing from the soil all the nitrogen,

phosphorus, potash and other elements it must have Scorching along the edges of leaves indicates

Other crops also show "hunger signs" which can be recognized at a glance if you know their sign language. Your county agent or vocational agricultural teacher can tell you about them or advise you about books or bulletins which give detailed information. Because of their thorough understanding of soil and crop conditions in your district, they are the men to answer your questions. Both are ready and able to help you. They know the signs of crop malnutrition and can give you valuable advice.

The production of livestock and the preparation and distribution of meat . are as inseparable as strawberry-shortcake. When producers prosper, meat packers prosper. When one suffers constant loss, the other must suffer also. Those of us in the livestock-meat industry have mutual interests, and we work together toward a common goal.

Ratty Arithmetic: One rat eats about 150 pounds of corn per year. It costs you as much to keep 10 rats as to keep 17 laying hens. Those 17 layers could produce 200 eggs each, at 36¢ per dozen, which would bring you \$162. For 10¢ you can poison those rats. Then, you can feed the corn to your hens and collect the difference of \$101.90.

You who raise and feed livestock know as well as I do that the problems of the livestock-meat industry are usually mighty complicated. Naturally, I am always interested in what others have to say about our problems, especially in the press or over the radio. 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
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
