All young people of the community are cordially invited to participate in each of the caravan activities.

Caravanning, a project of the Board of Education of the Methodist Church, is in its eighth year, and during that time 535 caravan teams have served in churches throughout the United States; 85 teams are at work this summer, each team visiting seven churches.

The spirit of caravanning is one of voluntary Christian service, which aims to make the great principal of Christianity more widely practiced in every relationship of life.

I have made a number of suggestions, in recent issues of the News, for various types of new business for Upton County. I want to point out here that these are projects normally handled by the local chamber of commerce. They are not County functions. In other words, the County would not be required to spend the tax-payers money for the development of the various projects.

I am making all preliminary surveys to determine sources of capital, cost of building, cost of operation and approximate revenues to be derived from each project. I am assuming the cost of these surveys. I am giving my time.

I believe that, by the time these surveys are completed, our chamber of commerce will be reorganized and functioning. At that time, I shall make my proposals to that body so that a representative group of our Upton County residents may approve or disapprove each individual proposal.

I have spent much time this past week trying to see all of you at your homes. I hope that I do not miss anyone. If I do, however, please know that I need and want your vote. If I am in the run-off, then I shall be able to see all of you before you make your final trip to the polls.

The Alpine Cowboys suffered their third loss in a row when the Ozona Giants came over last Sunday and took them to an 8-5 cleaning in a hard-fought 10-inning battle. It was the first extra-inning game the Cowboys have played this year.

The batting slump, the Cowhands have been in for the past three games lost the game for the Alpine sluggers who garnered only seven hits off Lefty Shelton, Ozona pitching ace, while the Giants were piling up a total of 14 off Zagrafas, starting Cowboy pitcher, and Marselo Alarcon, who went in in the last of the sixth with the score standing at 5-3 in favor of the visitors.

Some sort of a record was established in the game when 23 batsmen were retired via the strikeout route, Zagrafas fanning nine in five and one-half innings, Alarcon whiffing eight in four and one-half and Shelton, who went the entire ten innings, retiring 11. Zagrafas issued four walks and Alarcon and Shelton two apiece.

The Cowboys scored a run in the eighth to tie the count at five all, but the Giants went on a hitting spree in the tenth, scoring three runs after two men were out and Alarcon had two strikes on the third batter. A single by Moore, Giant first baseman, followed by a two-bagger by Cox, shortstop, a rousing homer by Stuart, left fielder, and another single by Kyle, catcher, brought in three runs and ended the game as O. D. Burleson, Ernest Fierro and Henderson were retired in order.

The Commissioners Court of Pecos County Monday received a petition bearing signatures of more than ten per cent of the qualified property-owning electors of the county requesting an election to decide issuance of \$300,000 in bonds to finance adequate hospital buildings and equipment for Fort Stockton and Iraan, and set Aug. 10 as date for the election.

Plans have been discussed for operation of the hospital by an independent organization, free of political involvement, in order to provide every opportunity for business-like and efficient management. The county, however, has been asked to finance the physical plant and equipment needed for a 35- to 40-bed general hospital in Fort Stockton, and an emergency hospital and clinic in Iraan.

The court Monday received offers from bond houses to buy the issue at rates as low as 1 1/2% interest, but decided to await results of the election and then offer the bonds on a bid basis. It accepted the proposal of McIntyre & Co. of San Antonio to handle all legal proceedings, print the bonds, secure needed opinions and register them with the state, for a fixed fee of \$585. Other bids ranged as high as \$800, with six concerns seeking the contract.

In addition to the prospective hospital bond issue, the court studied proposals for other county projects which would involve expenditures of an estimated \$205,000 to be raised by the sale of time warrants, issued to mature over a ten-year period with retirement from a permanent improvement levy, and at rates not exceeding 1 1/2%, and probably lower.

Being studied are: \$50,000 for a youth center and recreation hall at Iraan; \$50,000 for a library and memorial museum in Ft. Stockton; improvements in Rooney Park and at Comanche Spring, \$50,000, and purchase of Gobbs Field, \$55,000.

The total obligation could be retired in ten years with a tax levy of not more than 14c, and such a levy would not require any increase in the 69c rate of recent years, an analysis of county finances by Judge H. H. Butz reveals.

A possible adjustment of county funds to utilize a general fund surplus now invested in government bonds could permit even a 6c cut in the county rate for 1946 in the face of a 14c levy for the various other building projects, making the county rate 63c which coupled with a cut in the state rate to 37c would provide a total state and county rate of only \$1.00.

All of these questions will be worked out at the county's annual budget hearing August 19, after results of the bond election

are known and other plans given further study.

Pecos streets were jam-packed Thursday morning, July 4, with thousands of persons, many having traveled great distances, to witness one of the most colorful parades ever to stride down Oak Street.

Colorful costumes of the Old West were numerous in the audience and practically all persons taking part in the parade were dressed in the regalia of the range country.

How much did the American Legion make on the 1946 Pecos rodeo?

That question cannot be definitely answered due to the fact that all bills have not been paid.

It is known that the crowds were bigger than ever before and thus it is known that the gross receipts were greater than ever.

An authoritative source reports that the front gate cleared \$10,112.49 after Federal taxes were paid and that the Legion made \$809 from concessions. The grand stand tickets brought in around \$3,750 after the Federal tax was paid.

A new grand stand cost the Legion approximately \$9,000, however, and instead of leaving the Legion with a nice, fat surplus in the bank, it is expected there will be a deficit after bills are paid.

Approximately \$10,000 was awarded in prizes, but the Legion furnished only \$3,500 of that, the difference being made up in entrance fees.

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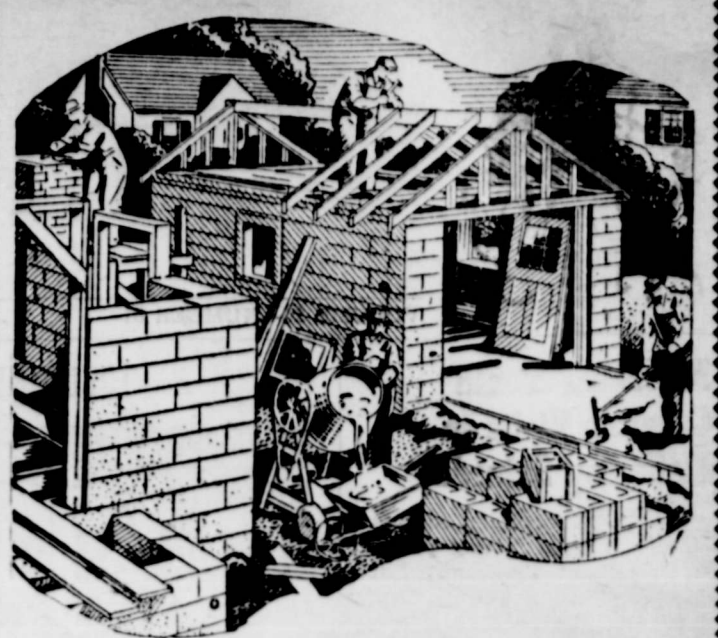
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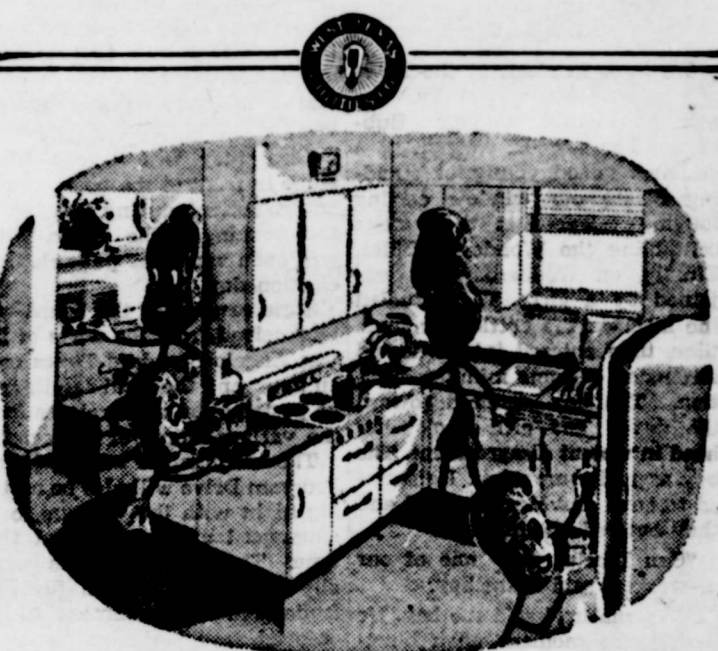

Advice for Veterans Entering School This Coming Fall

Veterans planning to enter school this fall should make their arrangements immediately. Veterans Administration authorities warn.

A record enrollment is anticipated, VA said. Prospective students were advised to contact the schools they expect to attend and to obtain certificates of eligibility from the nearest VA office.

A new physical medicine program for paraplegics (spinal cord cases) and amputees has been started by the VA hospital at Dallas. Promising results have already been obtained.

Dr. John J. Szama, director of the program, said new physiotherapy techniques and exercises developed by VA specialists are of special benefit in the rehabilitation of these handicapped veterans.

Veterans who left Army or VA hospitals without the benefit of this new rehabilitation program can re-enter VA hospitals for the instruction, Dr. Szama said.

VA personal counselors will soon serve veterans throughout the country. These experts are now taking a series of special university courses on counseling.

Very soon they will be available in VA regional offices to help veterans baffled by blind alleys in their education or on-the-job training.

The VA's master contract with 80 Texas county vocational schools to provide—initially—training for some 8,000 veterans became effective this month. W. T. Murphy, VA's director of education and rehabilitation in the Southwest, announced.

The contract calls for three types of training to be provided veterans-enrollees: agricultural, industrial and business. By fall, Murphy said, the number of the schools operating under the contract may increase to 100, with a total enrollment of 15,000.

Similar contracts for agricultural vocational schools are operating in Louisiana and Mississippi.

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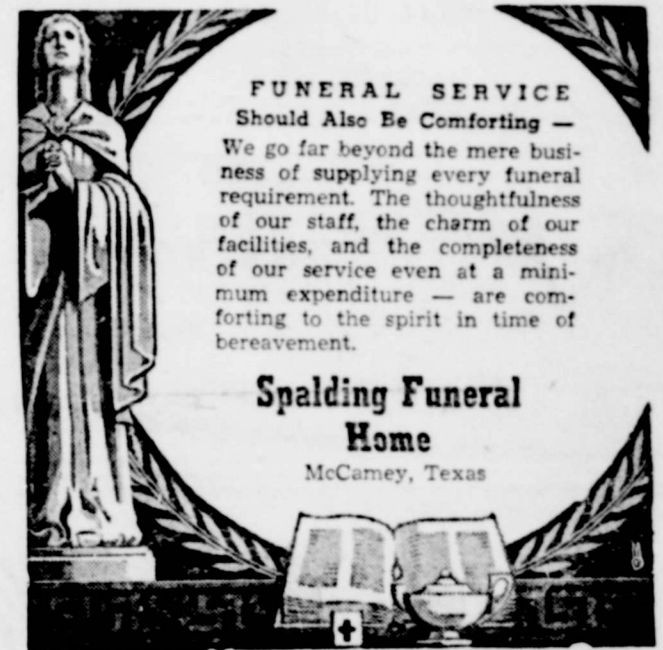

COMMON SENSE IN TEXAS

I believe it is time for West Texans to wake up and learn the facts of the case, not the clandestine lies. In 1942, down here at the University of Texas, a book was put on the Sophomore Engling Reading List for Engineering students. The name of this book was "U. S. A." by John Dos Passos. It was rough in spots, though not to be compared to "Forever Amber," and it was the rough language that led a certain student's father to protest its use to the Board of Regents. The Regents acted, and Rainey, then Prexy of U. T., conferred with the Department of English and the committee of English profs who had included the book on the reading list. It was, at the time, only 3 weeks before the end of the semester, so the Department of English announced that the book would be removed at the end of the semester. But the Regents were not satisfied; they demanded that the book be removed immediately. Rainey, acknowledging the Regents' legal authority, cooperated with them fully, and the book was removed without a fuss. Still, the Regents were not satisfied. They wanted to place responsibility for the use of the book upon one person in order to fire him. They put the committee under the third degree reminiscent of methods employed by some big town police departments on the lowest criminals. It was here that Rainey (and the whole University) bolted. The Regents were becoming too high-handed; they were attacking academic freedom.

John Lee Smith has attacked Rainey as having championed the book. Rainey did not champion any book. He was defending the principle of Academic Freedom. He was battling the forces then that he is battling now—the Special Interest Groups of Texas.

The non-Texans with Texas monopolies, along with their hirelings and lobbyists and mercenary politicians, are fighting with their backs to the wall. They know only too well what a free Texas will mean... it will mean less money for their own pockets. They know that they are losing in this race, and as a last, desperate attempt to destroy Rainey's influence, they have resorted to spreading subtle and cowardly rumors about Rainey's character. If anyone, whether he is obviously opulent or wretched, councils you with advice not to vote for Rainey because of "the women in his life, and the obscene ways in which he uses them," then that man, or woman, is badly misinformed — or dishonest. When

you hear that he was employed by the CIO, or that he is a Communist, then the speaker probably is a hireling of the special interest groups, big business men from the North and East who are sapping our natural resources, taking them out of Texas and leaving us nothing.

"Texas," to use Rainey's own words, "is a sleeping giant." Texas has the greatest concentration of resources in the world. Yet, though \$1,600 per year is the minimum necessary for a decent standard of living, 70% of Texas families receive \$1,500 or less. 40% receive less than \$1,000, and 33% receive less than \$600.

Rainey's platform should appeal to every red-blooded Texan who wishes to see Texas unshackled "from the powerful economic forces that today control our politics, our industrial life, and threaten our educational system." Rainey demands good schools, a first-class health program, a decent welfare program, farm-to-market roads. All that will take money, and Rainey admits it. He intends to place tariffs on all raw materials going out of the state, as well as small gasoline and cigarette taxes. I become nauseated when I hear some hopeful candidate spout off about doing wonders for Texas, and at the same time promising to lower taxes.

Higher taxes will not necessarily be paid by the poorer people, but, on the contrary, the largest part of the bill will be footed by the out-of-state business interests, the very interests that fear and fight Homer Price Rainey, and that sponsor such men as Pappy O'Daniel in their money-making scheme to wipe out OPA.
