Holley Reports On Paralysis Foundation

Mr. A. B. Holley, Chairman of the Upton County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, disclosed today that \$2,492,281 in supplementary aid has been sent so far this year by the National Foundation to its chapters in 36 states.

This financial assistance was necessary to replenish chapter treasuries depleted in providing treatment and care of infantile paralysis patients stricken this summer and in aiding victims of prior outbreaks.

Holley made this disclosure following receipt of a statement from Basil O'Connor, President of the National Foundation, which re-emphasized the fundamental policy followed by the Foundation and its chapters in providing for care and treatment of infantile paralysis victims.

O'Connor's statement said: "The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has accepted a public trust through the annual March of Dimes. The voluntary contributions of the American people to this annual appeal in January is their insurance that no infantile paralysis patient need go without the best medical care and treatment, regardless of age, race, creed or color.

"It has always been the policy of the National Foundation to aid any person stricken by this disease, where the financial burden would otherwise lower his or her

family's standard of living. "Such aid covers transportation of the patient to and from hospitals and clinics; payment of hospitalization, medical care and treatment until maximum recovery is achieved; the defraying of nursing and physical therapy charges, and costs of orthopedic surgery, as well as provision of such special appliances as may be indicated.

"Resources necessary for this tremendous task are available They were donated by some 50,-000,000 Americans who realized that costs involved in the care and treatment of this disease, one of the most expensive known to medicine, are far beyond average family means.

"Through pooling dimes the nation has established a voluntary, non-profit organization to take care of any one stricken by polio. I want to assure every family in this country that if polio should strike, local chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis serving every county in the nation are ready and able to provide every possible facility until maximum recovery is assured."
