FORT DAVIS, Oct. 30 .- Antelopes may be an asset to ranchmen as well as to townspeople, Frank Etheridge of Alpine told Mile High Club Monday night. He is with the State Game Department and is engaged in gathering and moving antelopes

"Antelopes bring hunters and hunters bring money to these towns out here," Mr. Etheridge said. "Yet there are ranch owners who are asking that we get the antelopes off their country because they eat too much grass.

"In the recent open season on antelopes," the speaker continued, "a man obtained 80 stomachs for examination of the contents. He has had no opportunity thus far to carry the research through, but in the examination of one full stomach, for instance, only three blades of grass were found."

"This leads to the idea," Mr. Etheridge explained, "that perhaps the antelope eats plants that neither cattle nor sheep eat. If true, it may be beneficial to the ranchman to have such weeds cleared from his land. This is something yet to be established,
