Influenza Cases Increase in Texas

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 8.—Reports coming in from various sections of the State indicate that the number of influenza cases appears to be increasing with the advance of the fall season, and during the past week 930 cases were reported in Texas.

Commenting on this situation today, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said that most of these cases are mild and lend themselves to treatment readily. He pointed out that two cooperative factors are essential to victims of this disease; first, call the family physician promptly when suspicious symptoms appear; second, to take it easy for a reasonable length of time after the acute stage has subsided.

"It is essential to realize that influenza, no matter how mild the attack, calls for a period of convalescence, because serious complications can occur if this important fact is ignored," Dr. Cox said. "Influenza is not mass-controllable. However, those persons who maintain the highest possible health levels at all times, increasing their resistance to the communicable disease germs, will have a protective advantage over those more careless persons who continually abuse their health."

The State Health Officer declared that living by nature, getting plenty of sleep, daily exercise in the open, nourishing food, and good personal hygiene offers the best known bulwark against all respiratory diseases and added that avoiding habits of any and all kinds detrimental to maximum well-being is a wise course to take in the pursuit of good health.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Is a veteran eligible for readjustment allowance benefit if he settles in Canada or Hawaii?
A. Residence in the United States, its territories or possessions is a definite eligibility requirement for readjustment allowances. Veterans living in Canada are not eligible. Veterans living in Hawaii are eligible if they meet all other eligibility requirements.

Q. I obtained a G. I. loan on which the government guarantee was \$2,500. Recently I lost my job and would like to know if I'm eligible for unemployment compensation provided in the G. I. Bill?
A. The fact that you obtained a G. I. loan does not affect your eligibility for readjustment allowances. You may receive them if you meet the requirements as specified by law.

Q. My son has been pursuing a course of training under the G. I. Bill, but finds that he can't afford to continue and support himself and his family. Can he terminate his course at any time without notifying the Veterans Administration?
A. A veteran should not quit his course of education or training without notifying or obtaining the approval of the Veterans Administration regional office handling his claim. This is necessary so that he will be qualified for further training.

International Airmail Postage Rates Reduced

Effective Nov. 1, air mail for every country of the world to which the service exists is subject to a rate per half ounce of either 10c, 15c, or 25c, except Canada and Mexico, to which the domestic rate of 5c per full ounce applies, and Cuba, which is subject to the rate of 8c per half-ounce.

For 25c per half ounce an air mail letter can be sent as far away as China, Palestine, Burma, Australia, Belgian Congo, the Malay States, New Caledonia and New Zealand. Such countries as Algeria, Austria, Belgium, Greece, Italy, Norway, Rumania, Sweden, Spain and Switzerland goes air mail for 15c per half-ounce. For only 10c per half-ounce an air mail letter will fly to Argentina, Brazil, Peru, and Newfoundland.

Iraan Braves Win Over Crane, 25-0

The stage was set for an all-out battle Nov. 11 between the Iraan Braves and the Fort Stockton Panthers for the championship of Dist. 5-B when Iraan defeated Crane in the latter city Friday night 25-0. It was a rugged battle in that Crane fought stubbornly to retain a slim chance at the championship by knocking over the Braves, but Iraan played hard, driving football to smother all attempts by the Cranes to score while racking up four touchdowns and one point after to bring home the victory. It was a costly win, Herndon, stellar Brave guard, sustained a broken collar bone.

The game opened briskly with Iraan receiving the opening kickoff. Crane held stubbornly and forced a kick, but Crane could not go against the tough Iraan defense and kicked back. Rowe took the Crane punt and returned to near midfield. The Braves launched a drive from that point that carried down to the Crane two where Cade, fleet Indian halfback, fumbled as he crossed the payoff stripe and Crane took possession on their own 20 to momentarily stave off a tally by Iraan. The rest of the first quarter was a battle between the 30 yd. lines, neither team being able to muster a scoring punch.

BRAVES SCORE

In the second chukker, Iraan had possession around her own 33 marker. Featuring off tackle slants by McFaddin, Whitefield and Cade, the Braves marked up a series of first downs to the Crane eleven. Here, McFaddin swept around his own right end to score standing up. His blockers did an excellent job of clearing the way and the Brave captain turned on speed to outdistance the Crane secondary. Whitefield missed the conversion try.

Neither team was able to do much damage for the balance of the second quarter, although Crane tried desperately to score to deadlock the game by the end of the half.

IRAAN ICES GAME

The Braves scored a clincher in the third quarter, and added one touchdown for good measure when Fife, Indian center, intercepted a Crane pass on Crane's own 15 and scored. Previously, McFaddin had scored the second touchdown, following a drive down the field, from the 10 yd. line. For this score, the Brave captain thrust through a gaping hole over his own left tackle and scored again standing up. Cade kicked the point following Fife's

touchdown, but Whitefield missed the try on the second score. The Braves scored the final touchdown in the fourth quarter. Brave halfbacks had hammered down the field after taking possession on their own 40 for short gains to the Crane 2 yd. line. HARD FOUGHT GAME

Iraan was definitely superior throughout the game, but it was a much harder game than the score indicates. First downs favored Iraan by a 15 to 5 count. Crane could not generate enough offense to get inside the Brave 20, but they constantly threatened by means of passes. The Crane running game was effectively throttled by charging Iraan linemen. Although Crane filled the air with passes, only two tosses were completed against alert Brave secondary, one toss going for 22 yds. Iraan stuck largely to ground plays, throwing only three passes, two of which were intercepted by Crane.

The game between Iraan and Fort Stockton will be played in the Pecos County seat, Nov. 11, beginning at 2:30 p. m.

Of course, none of it goes very

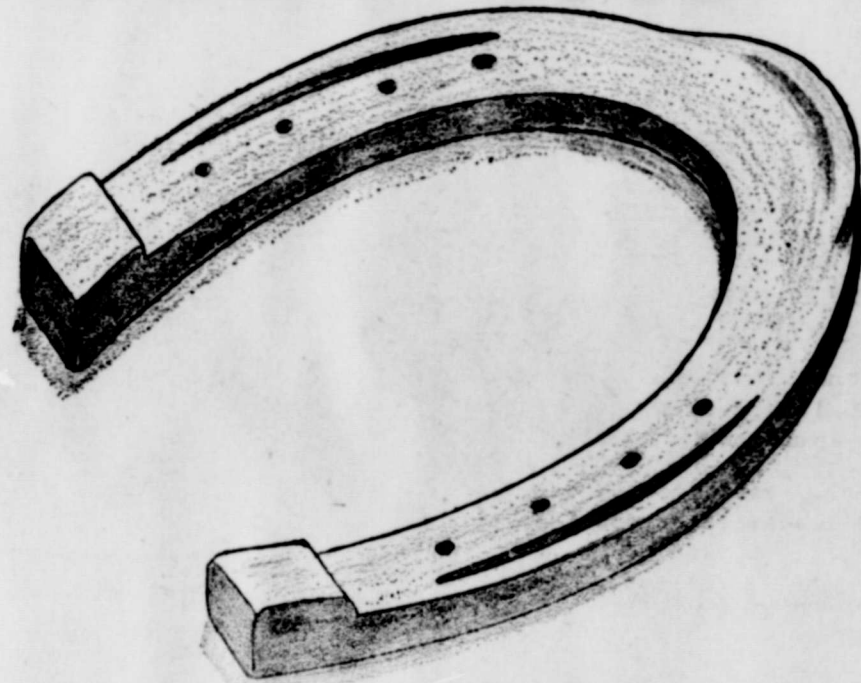
