Report From Your Veterans County Service Officer

In an effort to put teeth into regulations pertaining to Veter-ans' Emergency Housing pro-gram, the OPA and Office of the Housing Expediter launched a nationwide enforcement drive last week aimed at stamping out malpractices, correcting abuses and answering criticism of pres-ent conditions. Civil and criminal charges will be filed and pressed against violators.

To help reach the goal of 2,-700,000 houses for veterans in 1946-47 at prices veterans can afford to pay, Housing Expediter W. W. Wyatt delegated to OPA the responsibility of enforcing veterans' preference requirements and maximum sales prices

Striking directly at the heart of the problem, the program has four major objectives:

1. To make certain that veterans get the first opportunity to buy or rent new dwellings.

2. To prevent houses and apartments built under the program from being sold or rented at over ceiling prices.

3. To insure that houses built under this program conform substantially with the builders' commitments in their priority applications

4. To obtain compliance with the requirements that new construction built under the program be posted with placards so that veterans may be informed that housing is available to them first. Necessary enforcement action will be taken through the OPA's eight regional enforcement offices in those cases where the OPA Area Rent Offices are unable to secure compliance. Repeat violations, evasive practices, and other types of violations will be referred to the agency's enforce-ment department for action. The part of the program which makes it mandatory that houses be sold at ceiling prices is similar to the

OPA rent control procedure. In delegating to OPA the en-forcement job, Mr. Wyatt pointed out that the price agency will have the power to revoke, deny, or suspend authorization and priorities assistance to builders who violate the maximum sales prices or fail to give the required preference to veterans. The civil and criminal sanctions of the Patman Act and the Second War Powers Act will be used.

THE VINE AND THE BRANCH-JOHN 15

Verse 1. "I am the true vine, and My Father is the husbandman

That Jesus states He is the true vine is sufficient evidence that there are vines which are untrue. God said to Israel, "Yet I had planted thee a noble vine, wholly a right seed: how then art thou turned into the degenerate plant of a strange vine unto Me?" (Jer. 2-21). Jesus declared, concerning all who teach for doctrines the commandments of men, "Every plant, which My Heavenly Father hath not planted, shall be rooted up." (Matt. 15:13).

Verse 2: "Every branch in Me that beareth not fruit He taketh away; and every branch that beareth fruit, He purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit.

We must be productive of good in the light of the above statement. "Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves." (James 1:22). "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified and not by faith only.

Verse 3: "Now ye are clean through the word which I

Despite the above statement, some contend that one is saved separate and apart from the Word. If this were true, en one could be saved while yet unclean. We read in Acts 11:14. "Who shall tell thee words whereby thou and all thy house shall be saved." Paul declares, " I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." (Rom. 1:16).

Verse 4: "Abide in Me and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit, except it abide in the vine, no more can ye, except ye abide in Me."

We are thus made to understand that we must be in Him in order to bear fruit. Only a person ready to affirm that a branch can bear fruit apart from the vine would contend otherwise. How does one get INTO Christ? Let Paul tell us: "As many of you as have been BAPTIZED into Christ have put on Christ." (Gal. 3:27).

Verse 5: "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in Me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without Me ye can do nothing."

Goodness is to be exercised in life, but that in itself, without Christ, will not save one. If it would, Christ need not have come to this earth and suffered and died for us, for there were morally good people upon the earth before His coming. et it be shouted from the housetops that we must abide IN Him, for IN Him are all spiritual blessings. (Eph. 1:3). Without Him we can do nothing.

Verse 6: "If a man abide not in Me, he is cast forth as a branch and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned.

Can we fall from the grace of God when once therein? If why did Jesus say the above? Does not one have to be in Him in order to take on so much as the form of a branch? Or can a branch form itself apart from the Vine? Further, Jesus said, "If a man abide not . . . as a branch"; INDIVID-UALS, not churches, compose the branches. "An He (Christ) is the head of the body, the church." (Col. 1:18). And there is ONE body (or church), (Eph. 4:4).




