DILLINGER ERA NO. 2

Five McCamey stores have been robbed during the past two months. There will be more. Crime waves follow war. Those of us who are old enough remember the Dillingers of the machine-gun era following World War 1.

This writer warned in these columns . . . a year ago . . . that both the system and the manpower of our local law-enforcement agencies were totally inadequate. This writer foretold the present wave of crime sweeping the country.

Again, this year, two editorials dealing with the same subject have appeared in The News. These editorials, published in the issues of April 19 and May 12, respectively, appear below:

AN OFFICER WITH GUTS

(Issue of April 19, 1946)

Last week, in these columns, a peace officer with guts spoke his piece. He said, "Never, in my years of public service, have I seen a time when peace officers were disrespected as they are today."

He also said, "Never before have I encountered a situation where an officer was required to do so much with so little.'

Deputy Sheriff Earl McWilliams hit the jackpot with those

Sam Haynes, Williams' predecessor and a veteran peace officer with a long and honorable record of law-enforcement, twice resigned his position as deputy sheriff of Upton County BECAUSE HE WAS EXPECTED TO DO TOO MUCH WITH TOO LITTLE.

Haynes did not want to leave Upton County. He fought very hard to obtain for the residents of the county a sufficient number of peace officers to fill the need of law-enforcement.

In 1945, immediately prior to Haynes' resignation, he and the writer of this editorial called at the home of a County official. Haynes and the writer made a strong plea for additional officers. This official stated that he was in favor of the plan outlined at the time of the meeting and further that he was aware of the need of EFFICIENT law-enforcement. He promised immediate action.

The line will form early on Dec. 2, with doors opening at 9 a.m. Each veteran will be allowed to buy one typewriter for his own personal use. The sale will last three days, but the supply will go fast, according to H. S. Gish, chief of the Veterans Division of WAA, who states that applicaons for typewriters have flooded the Fort Worth WAA for the past few days.

THE GOODNESS OF GOD





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

Combine with 1 cup bread crumbs, ¾ cup milk, juice of ½ lemon, 2 tablespoons tomato catsup, ½ cup pork sausage, ¾ tentatory in shallow pan. Pour Barbecue Sauce over them. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes in a moderate oven. To make Barbecue Sauce serown 1 medium onion, chopped, in 2 tablespoons margarine or butter. 
