#### Mental Disorders FIRST METHODIST CHURCH A Real Problem

AUSTIN, Tex.—Mental disor-ders today represent a real prob-lem and it is estimated that more than 50 per cent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific inches. Ain't nature grand? toll. High speed living, with its cruel exactions upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble. But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of blame. The fact is that nearly 50 per cent of the patients entering hospitals for mental disordersders are there because of organic or toxic causes.

For example, general paralysis is the direct cause of one-fifth of the mental trouble in males entering hospitals and one-tenth of the disorder for all groups. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the

The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders, at least in the males. Alcohol and syphilis combined are responsible for approximately one-fifth of the hospitalized insanities. Nevertheless, improper living habits continue to impair many brains. Insufficient sleep, neglect of bodily care and an over forcing of nervous energy are the pitfalls to avoid in this connection.

Nature demands that her fundamental laws be at least reasonably observed. A constant outraging of the physiological economy takes its toll not only in bodies but in minds also. Insaniies and lesser nervous disorders could be spectacularly reduced if this fact was more generally respected. Training for mental health must be started in childhood as that is the time when corrections can be made to the best advantage.

#### ROMAN CATHOLICISM VS. THE BIBLE LARRY O. GROUNDS

From a Roman Catholic Pamphlet entitled "Catholic Re-igion Proved by Protestant Bible," I quote the following:

The Bible teaches that Christ founded but one church, not many churches, and that this is the church which has Peter for its head. Hence, only the church having Peter and his lawful successors for its head can logically claim to be the Church of Christ." (Page 6).

The Bible teaches no such thing and the Priest does not live that can prove it. It is a base fabrication upon which the Papal Hierarchy is founded. Christ founded only one church to be sure, but NEVER one over which Peter was head. The Roman Catholic Church, by her own definition, cannot exist without a POPE as her HEAD; which officer must be a UNI-VERSAL BISHOP, having no competitors in the Catholic World, and SUCH A SOVEREIGN CANNOT BE FOUND ON EARTH NEARER THAN FIVE HUNDRED YEARS TO THE DEATH OF THE APOSTLE PETER. Petros in the Greek is a noun and Masculine Gender, meaning a pebble or small stone while Petra is a noun and Feminine Gender and means a cliff or ledge. Thus that which Christ built His church upon was a Leodge, Cliff-the confessed truth of His Messiahship and not upon Petros or Peter.

Catholics FORBID their Priests, Bishops, etc., to marry. (Faith of Our Fathers-Page 401).

The Bible teaches, "That a Bishop MUST BE the husband of one wife! (1 Tim. 3:2). "Furthermore the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall DEPART from FAITH giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of DEVILS; speaking lies in hypocracy; having their consciences seared with a hot iron; FORBIDDING TO MARRY, AND COMMANDING TO ABSTAIN FROM MEATS, which God hath created to be received with thanksgiving to them which BELIEVE and KNOW the truth. (1 Tim. 4:1-3). How accurately the SPIRIT identifies this very body who FORBIDS marriage to the Clergy and commands the ABSTINENCE of meats on certain days!

Roman Catholics are taught to KISS IMAGES and to BOW down before them. "—so that by the images which we kiss, and before which we uncover our heads or kneel, we dore Christ and venerate HIS SAINTS, whose LIKENESS THEY REPRESENT." (Faith of Our Fathers-Page 199). Again under the caption, "Polish Soldiers Beg Mary to Free Nation," we have a portion of the following prayer-"O Immaculate Virgin, mercifully look down upon the sons of our noble nation. At Thy FEET Mother Most Hily, venerated throughout the ages by our people who have dwelt under thy protection, we pray that all the sons of Poland may safely return to their homes, etc." (Advanced Register-Catholic Pub-

The Bible teaches: "Thou shalt NOT make unto thee a graven IMAGE nor any LIKENESS of ANYTHING that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth: thou shalt not BOW DOWN thyself unto them, nor serve them." (Ex. 20:4-5). "Being then the offspring of God, we ought to think that the Godhead is like unto gold or silver, or stone, graven by art and device of man." (Acts 17:29). A statement could not be made more diametrically opposed to the above demonstration of idolatry—and that onder the guise of CHRISTIANITY! There is not ONE doctrine or dogma peculiar to the Catholic church, which cannot found in the New Testament.

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
