Texas City Explosion Worst Disaster In U. S. In Ten Years

A terrific chain of ship and waterfront explosions blasted hundreds of persons to death at Texas City on Wednesday morning and injured more than 1,000 people.

A report to The McCamey News said that residents were evacuating the city of 15,000 today because of a feared explosion of a nitroglycerine-loaded ship at the Texas City docks.

Estimates of the fatalities ranged from 1.200 down

Mayor J. C. Trahan said he knew of 300 dead. G. B. Finley, State Highway Commission official, said at Austin that officials at the scene had indicated the toll would reach 1.200. Houston Police Sergeant Wiley Whaley, at the disaster scene, estimated that the death toll would be between 450 and 500.

On account of the telephone strike, reports are coming in slowly. Red Cross and other officials fear that the

casualties may mount as the wreckage is cleared. It is known that several people from McCamey are in the Texas City section, but so far no word has been



"For conspicuous gallantry and Service. intrepidity as a member of a fire control and rescue party on board LST 446 in action against enemy Japanese forces off Tulagi Harbor, Solomon Islands, on April 7, 1943.

"Voluntarily boarding the bombed and burning Konawaha after that vessel had been abandoned by its crew, McWilliams rendered invaluable assistance in fighting fires and rescuing trapped crewmen and, although in imminent danger of fuel oil explosions, continued in his heroic efforts until the fire was extinguished and all possible rescue work accomplished.

"By his courage and initiative in the face of grave personal danger, McWilliams upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."







WAGES AND THE TELEPHONE STRIKE



Because wages are at issue in the telephone strike, let's take a look at what operators and plant craftsmen here are now getting. Almost all telephone people are in these groups.

The basic work period is a five-day, 40-hour week. Scheduled employees are paid overtime for time worked over eight hours a day, premium time for Sunday and holiday work, and added money for evening and night

OPERATORS

A girl just out of high school, with no previous experience, starts at the beginner's rate of \$26 a week. But if she works after 9 p.m., she gets \$27.50 a week, and if that week includes Sunday work, she gets \$30.10.

The beginning operator gets a raise in pay every six months for the first year. An operator with 12 month's experience, for example, gets \$28 for a normal 40-hour week. If it includes evenings and Sunday, she earns

Periodic increases bring the operator to the top rate of \$34 a week. If she works evenings and Sundays, her weekly earnings are \$38.90.

But the union wants to increase the beginner's rate of pay from \$26 to \$41-up \$15 a week. Also, they would increase the top wages from \$34 to \$51. That is an increase of \$17 a week.

PLANT CRAFTSMEN

Linemen and installers, starting in right out of school with no experience, begin at \$28 for a basic five-day week. In two years they are earning \$35.50 a week.

Periodic increases raise this basic rate to a top of \$56 a week. Exchange repairmen-the men who take care of repairing the equipment in your office or home-reach a top rate of \$58. Overtime and other extra pay during the past year increased the wages of most linemen, installers, and exchange repairmen by about 10 per

The union asks that the beginning wage rates of these Plant workers be raised from \$28 to \$43 -up \$15 a week. The union would also increase the \$56 top wage to \$78, and the \$58 top to \$78. Those would be increases of \$20 and \$22 a week.

We believe most people will agree that present wages are good. The company believes that no increases are justified at this time.

The way to resolve these differences of opinion and settle the strike is to arbitrate the wage issue. That would be fair to our employees, to telephone users, and to the

Nearly three weeks ago the company proposed that Governor Jester and the governors of the other four states in which we operate appoint a panel of five impartial citizens-men with a knowledge of conditions in this area-to arbitrate the wage issue. The company enlarged its offer to include not only basic wages but such other demands as length of time for employees to reach top wage rates and wage differentials between different communities.

The company urges union officials to reconsider the offer of arbitration. It is the fair way to settle the strike, restore full telephone service to the public, and get the telephone wage issue decided equitably.




