





Corn sold a little higher at \$2.25 per bushel sack for the white, and \$1.40 to \$1.75 per half Grapefruit loadings declined rapidly in a weak market. Denver and New Orleans saw fair trading.

Eggs and poultry held fairly steady at most SW points last Fryers remained firm but hens and roosters weakened at Denver. Heavy hens brought 24 to 26c per pound at Fort Worth, 26 at Dallas and 26 to 30 at Denver. Fryers sold generally around 32 to 36c. Most areas bought eggs at 37 to 38c per doz.

Most cattle remained steady to strong last week, but some classes of cows lost ground, and calves weakened at Oklahema City. Medium cows brought \$14.50 to \$16 at San Antonio. Medium to good kinds turned at \$14.50 to \$17.50 at Forth Worth and \$14 to \$17.50 at Oklahoma City.

Hogs gained mostly 25 to 75c last week. Most good and choice butcher hogs sold from \$24 to \$24.75, but Denver paid up to \$25.50. San Antonio bought sows at \$21 to \$22.

Sheep and lambs lost 25c to \$1 at San Antonio and aged sheep fell 50c to \$1 at Fort Worth last week. Other SW sheep and lamb gained mostly 25c to \$1.

News From Veterans County Service Office

VETERANS MAY OBTAIN ORTHOPEDIC SHOES

Special orthopedic shoes may be obtained free of charge by veterans with service-connected disabilities from the VA, according to an announcement recently made by Dr. P. H. Hawley, Chief of VA's Medical Service.

Machines used to make plaste easts of injured or deformed feet have been transferred from the War Department to the VA and Hospital, Hines, Ill., and at VA Hospital in Atlanta, Ga., formerly the Army's General Hospital. Additional machines will be installed at VA regional offices in Kansas City, New York and San Francisco, and will be in opera-

Plaster cast machines are sent to the Army's QM Supply depot at Boston, Mass., where special lasts and patterns will be developed. The orthopedic shoes are constructed by commercial contractors and the completed shoes will be shipped to the veterans by the VA regional office or hospital making the purchase.

Qualified veterans and also army personnel will be eligible for the service, either at army establishments where the castmaking machines are in operation or at VA hospitals or regional offices where the machines are in operation or where they are scheduled to go in operation very shortly. Veterans should make application through their nearest VA representative.

Cast-making machines are also maintained by the Army at Orthopedic Footwear Clinic, Boston, Mass: Walter Reed General Hospital, Washington, D. C.; Brooke Army Medical Center, Ft. Sam Houston, Texas; Fitzsimmons General Hospital, Denver, Colo.; Madigan General Hospital, Fort Lewis, Wash.

NAVY DISCHARGES

If a former Navy man was given a discharge "under satisfactory conditions," NavPers 661, he may now exchange it for a discharge certificate, "Certificate of Discharge Under Honorable Conditions," also designated as NavPers 661. The original discharge should be returned to the Chief of Naval Personnel, Navy Dept., Washington 25, D. C.


