Highway Patrol Books LAZBUDDIE NEWS 12 Accidents In June

The Highway Patrol investigated 12 rural traffic accidents in Parmer County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for eight injuries and an estimated here from Silverton. He is an property damage of \$8,569.

The rural traffic accident summary in Parmer County for the first six months of 1965 shows a total of 60 crashes resulting in two persons killed, 29 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$33,-

"As of the first of this month, there had been a total of 1,040 fatal crashes in Texas taking lives of 1,261 persons," the Sergeant stated. This is approximately two per cent less than for the same period of 1964; however, if past trends continue, we will in all probabil-

ity exceed the all time record high of 3,006 persons killed in traffic crashes experienced in Texas last year.

"Texas was fortunate over the 4th of July weekend in that the predicted number of persons were not killed, but we cannot brag, as 25 persons were killed over the holiday while in the rest of the nation we experienced a great increase over last year, and set a new all time record for deaths over the 4th of July holiday just as we did during the previous Memorial Day holiday," Wells said. The veteran Patrol Supervisor concluded that with the vacation season well underway more vehicles will be traveling streets and highways, and he called on all motorists to become more thoughtful in regard to complying with traffic laws in an effort to reduce the

COTTON INSECTS During the past week we inspected several cotton fields

in the Bovina area and found some bollworms, lygus bugs and fleahoppers in just about every field. Two fields had 20% square damage, which is high for this early in the summer. We have seen and heard of

other bollworm, lygus and fleahopper infestations over the daily. county. Therefore, we believe every cotton producer needs to check his cotton fields for bollworms, lygus bugs and fleahoppers. All three of these insects can and very likely will cause some damage to our cotton.

Insecticides recommended for bollworms control follow with the pounds per acre of actual insecticide in parethesis: County water should be cut-off A. Strobane - DDT, 2-1 mixture, by Agusut, 20. (3.0 to 4.5), B. Endrin + DDT (.3 to .5-1.0 to 1.5) C. Toxaphene-DDT, 2-1 mixture, (3.0 to 4.5) D. Sevin, (2.0 to 3.0) TDE may be substituted for DDT in any of the above mixtures. Add to 1.0 pound of methyl parathion to one of the above recommendations where tobacco bollworms, beet armyworms or resistant bollworms are en-

HOW TO CHECK FOR BOLLWORMS

Examine the terminal buds (upper 3-4 inch of plant) of 100 cotton plants and 100 consective squares and bolls at each of several points in the field, Begin Sevin or Toxaphene, treatment when bollworm eggs and four or five young worms bolls have been injured by small bollworms. Make additional applications as needed. Check fields closely two or three days after each application to be sure repeat application immediately using one recommended COTTON IRRIGATION


