The Wagner-Dingrell compulsory health insurance bill was by-passed by the last session of Congress. In all probability it will be debated and brought to a vote during the next session. It is thus a live issue, whose significance should be thoroughly understood by the American people before Congress convenes again.

Raymond Moley accurately described the measure when "It proposes a vast range of services for practically everyone who wishes free service . . . It covers all sorts of medical, dental, nursing and hospital services. In part, it would be paid for by a tax on wages and on payrolls and, in part, by general taxation. Its ramifications go into state and local public health, into hospitals, private voluntary health associations and the like

"Nothing was ever conceived or devised which would more effectively reduce the medical profession to dependence on the government and tie state and local agencies to the wheels of Federal government . . . It is a threat which deserves far more public attention than it has yet been receiv-

No one can accurately determine the financial cost of this The best estimates place it at between \$4,000,000,-000 and \$6,000,000,000 a year. It would be a very long step toward complete socialization of medicine. It would make loctors employees of the state, and embroil them deep in politics. It would discourage experiment and research, and destroy initiative. And, finally, it would undercut the finest system of medical care existing in the world.

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





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your attention to Ephesians 5:25-27 as we finish our study on salvation in the church: "Husbands, love wives, even as Christ also loved THE CHURCH, AND GAVE HIMSELF FOR IT; That He might SANCTIFY (purify) AND CLEANSE IT (the church) with the washing of water y the Word. That He might present it (the church) to Himelf a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such "hing." We note first of all that this passage teaches that Christ gave Himself for the church. He actually died for all men, but only those in the church are benefitted by His death, since salvation is IN CHRIST (II Timothy 2:10), redemption is IN CHRIST (Colossians 1:14), one is a new creature IN CHRIST (II Corinthians 5:17) and all spiritual blessings are IN CHRIST (Ephesians 1:7). But to be IN CHRIST also means to be IN HIS BODY, which is the church. We are BAPTIZED INTO CHRIST (Galtians 3:27) and also BAPTIZ-ED INTO HIS BODY (I Corinthians 12:13), which is the thurch (Colossians 1:18). We can now understand why Christ gave Himself for the church; those out of the church are not enefitted by His death. Christ purchased the church with his own blood (Acts 20:28); those out of the church have not been bought with His blood. In the next thought we find that Christ purifies and cleanses the church with the washing of water (baptism) as directed by the Word, and not those out f the church. It is in the act of baptism that our sins are washed away (Acts 22:16), our sins are forgiven (Acts 2:38), and we are saved (I Peter 3:21). Christ adds those who are cleansed and saved to the church (Acts 2:47), therefore those out of the church are still in their sins and in a lost condition. aul reminds us in his writings that we the members of hrist's church have been married to Him; that we are His ride (II Corinthians 11:2; Romans 7:4). Some day Christ is ning back to His bride, the church, and is going to present to the Father (I Corinthians 15:24). Will you be a memer of His church and among the number? In conclusion, we mind you of the language of Paul in Romans 8:1: "There is therefore now no condemination to them WHICH ARE IN CHRIST JESUS (in His body, the church), who walk not after flesh, but after the Spirit." Those in Christ and the church are not condemned; those out of Christ and out of the hurch are condemned. Say! Are you out of Christ and lost?
