An efficient fire department is equally important. Firemen must be trained, and equipment must be kept in proper repair. Adequate water facilities must be provided. A small town cannot have the kind of fire department that protects a metropolis—but it can have one adequate to meet its needs at moderate cost.

are taught, he said. Doctors are anxious to become associated with VA hospitals to gain this knowledge and are willing to provide their services for lower pay than would otherwise be true, Dr. Hawley said.

He emphasized that all resident doctors learning specialties in VA hospitals are full-fledged doctors taking further training under the watchful eye of specialists, fully accredited to medical specialty boards.

Veterans who fail to repay subsistence allowance overpayments while in education or training under the GI Bill and who later apply for unemployment or selfemployment allowances will have the amounts they owe the government deducted from the latter benefit checks, VA reports.

Explaining that Federal statutes prohibit payment of Government funds to persons indebted to the U.S., VA said instructions will be issued to state unemployment compensation agencies for the recovery of such overpayance claimants.

The ninth positive case of a horse sick with equine encephalomyelitis (sleeping sickness) has been reported in Tarrant County. None of the animals here have been known to have died from the disease.

Dr. J. L. Adrian, Chief State Veterinarian, said it was normal for "a few cases of sleeping sickness" to be reported here every year. He had receiver reports of seven cases. Private veterinarians told the Press of two others, the latest near Eagle Mountain

Veterinarians said the particularly virulent virus causing deaths on the Gulf Coast-Liberty, Hardin, Chambers, Orange, Jefferson and Jasper counties-could not reach here through normal transmission channels for about another month.

Dr. Adrian said the disease may be localized on the Gulf Coast through vaccinations, but reports indicate today it is spreading lightly.

Meanwhile, thousands of horses here have been vaccinated during the last two weeks, although the best time for vaccination is in March or April. Encephalomyelitis seems to be

a hot weather disease, one that dies out with fall frosts. It may

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
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
