

Three factors for greatness or Stradivari's violins are (1) high technical skill, (2) ideal climate for woodworking, (3) patronage of the great. Another amazing quality, one might add, is the lightness of the instrument-only sixteen ounces complete.

Twenty centuries have passed since the inn at Bethlehem was overcrowded because of Ceaser Augustus and his census.

Doubtless there were many big wigs who were staying in that certain inn in Bethlehem on that certain night, but they have long since been committed to oblivion and, except for the census and its resultant conditions at Bethlehem. it wouldn't matter too much if Augustus completely vanished from the history books.

It is generally immaterial that as king of Judea, Herod fortified his kingdom and rebuilt cities and temples long since crumbled into dust. Few people know, and fewer care, that his wife and two sons were murdered at his command. 



I pound cooked beef 11/2 pounds brown sugar shank, chuck, or neck meat quart cider 2 teaspoons salt 1 cup meat stock 1/2 pound suet 2 teaspoons nutmeg 4 pounds apples teaspoons cloves teaspoons cinnam 1/2 pound currants pound seeded raisins 5 tablespoons lemon juice Pare, core, and chop apples. Chop together currants and raisins

Add apples, sugar, cider, and meat stock. Cook about 5 minutes. Grind meat and suet. Add with seasonings to apple mixture. Simmer 1 hour, stirring frequently to prevent burning. Add lemon juice. This mincemeat may be made ahead of time and canned for use throughout the holiday season. (Yield: 4 quarts)






