"SPRINGS WITHOUT WATER"

2 PETER 2:17

"But there arose false prophets also among the people, as among you also there shall be false teachers, who shall privily bring in destructive heresies, denying even the Master that brought them, bringing upon themselves swift destruction-These are springs without water, and mists driven by a storm; for whom the blackness of Darkness hath been reserved."

Since Peter expressly tells us that false teachers are "springs without water" and that they are condemned to hell-it will be well to ask what are the marks of a false teacher? Centainly the first thing to be considered is that they are teachers, and that they are teaching something even though it is false. Hence we ask, where is the logical place to look for Paul in Acts 20:21-22, tells us that these teachers will spring from within true religion and certainly this is so, they have done it and are doing it now. One of the first traits of falseness is Hypocracy-for they promise freedom while they are servants of cor-Peter 2:19). They are Vain in showing off their zeal and piety (2 Pet. 2:18). They tremble not they dare God to punish their iniquity (2 Pet. 2:10). They are creatures without reason, speaking in matters of which they are ignorant. (2 Pet. 2:12.) All these mark false teachers, but probably the greatest mark of all is that they have forsaken the right way. (2 Pet. 2:15.) Peter compares false-teachers to Balaam whom God rebuked by causing a dumb ass to speak, stopping his madness. (2 Pet. 2:16).

Someone asks, "Why do these false-teachers not quit their falseness and preach Christ?" Again Peter answers by telling us that they love the hire of wrongdoing. (2 Pet. 2:15). Balaam would not have approached God so many times to find out about cursing Israel if it had not been for the lavish words offered by King

It may be said that Satan is no piker when it comes to offering rewards to false-teachers-so that he might enslave the world in sin.
