Fred Davis, 19 year old youth, was handed a two year general sentence on two charges, embezzlement and illegal use of United States monies by Federal District Judge R. E. Thomason in Pecos Wednesday afternoon.

The trial began at 10:40 a. m. Wednesday morning when Davis waived a grand jury hearing and a trial by jury. He plead guilty to three charges submitted by Federal District Attorney Frank Hunter of El Paso. Upon the plea of guilty, a second charge of illegal use of United States monies in the amount of \$27.20, was dismissed by the judge upon the recommendation of the prosecuting attorney
