Incidence of Influenza Shows Wide Increase

AUSTIN, TEXAS - The 414 cases of influenza reported in Texas last week, bring the incidence of this disease up to forty percent more than the seven year medium, as shown from the figures submitted by the 181 counties sending in reports ot the State Health Department.

Influenza without complications may be a fairly mild ailment, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, but, he pointed out, complications can turn this disease into a dangerous condition very quickly.

"Many cases of influenza are mild," Dr. Cox said. Giant Double Wheel Ready For State Fair Visitors council here and in Del Rio and



The Skyrider, first double ferris wheel and highest portable ride ever seen in the South, will be introduced to Southwesterners at the 1948 State Fair of Texas, Dallas, October 9-24. Both wheels rotate independently as they chase each other up around in the sky. Complete Chart on Cancer Is Prepared for First Time

For the first time a complete chart on cancer has been prepared for publication with the approval of the American Medical Association and the American Cancer Society.

Prepared by Maxine Davis, noted medical reporter, the complete chart appears in the October issue of Good Housekeeping magazine.

Categories into which the chart is divided include 1the site or location of the cancer; 2-the frequency with which such cancers occur in each sex; 3—the common age at which they occur; 4-details of the doctor's examination; 5—technical laboratory studies; 6 treatment; 7-chances for cure; 8-preventive meas-

"No such comprehensive and succinct investigation of cancer ever has been made available to the public," the magazine declares. "In an illness in which early diagnosis continues to be the most important factor, and fear of examination a con-tributor to delay, this unhysterical presentation of facts renders a unique pub-lic service."

"For the first time in the history of medical science, there is reason to hope for some solutions to the tragic riddle of cancer," Miss Davis writes in an article which accompanies the chart; "In the past, although no one denied cancer's gravity, few scientists studied it. . . . So profound is the subject that few had the courage to in-

vestigate it, and the funds available to them were miniscule. Today money for re-search on a grand scale is being provided, and many investigators are at work.

"Your chances of suffering from cancer are not increasing, but the incidence of cancer is rising. This is bein middle and later life, and as science lengthens our life span, more of us live to be cancer victims.

"Cancer is not necessarily fatal. Cures do exist. Thousands are cured each year. Nevertheless, one in every six who live into middle age is doomed to die of cancer.

"For the first time the federal government has appropriated adequate money. Last year it gave \$14,000, 000 to the National Cancer Institute of the U. S. Public Health Service, staffed by as competent administrators and scientists as can be found. This year the National Cancer Institute has been given another \$14,000... make contracts amounting to \$8,000,000 for construction of essential laboratories.

"Some of this money goes for education of the public and of the medical profes-sion; but the greater part is being spent for research. Research and education are long-time undertakings, and we may regard these appropriations merely as down payments on a bill that easily will exceed \$100,000,000 within ten years."

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
