# Crippled Children Aid

# Told By Dr. G. W. Cox



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. This is a beef arm pot-roast. Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?

A. The arm pot-roast is cut from the chuck section of beef. It is identified by the small round arm bone which is located in the center of one end of the roast. The arm bone pot-roast also contains two or three rib ends. Q. How should this cut be prepared?

A. The arm pot-roast is cooked by braising, in other words by the use of a small amount of moisture and slow heat. When cooked by this meth-od it is tender and flavorful, and comparable to the finest roast. Brown the pot-roast first in a small amount of parable to the finest roast. Brown the pot-roast first in a small amount of fat in a heavy utensil such as a Dutch oven or a large frying-pan with a cover. When browned, add liquid—water, tomato juice or other vegetable liquid; cover tightly and cook over low heat until tender, usually about 3 to 4 hours. If desired, vegetables may be cooked with the pot-roast, adding them during the last few minutes of the cooking time just long enough for them to become tender by the time the meat is done!

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this


