The bond issue calling for the expenditure of \$90,000 for a hardsurfaced road to the Benedum Field is the major of the two proposals, with the other calling for the expenditure of \$65,000 for improvements on the Upton County



Wilshire Oil Co. of Los Angeles Monday filled a daily pumping potential of 227 barrels of 36.8 on a 12 minute drilstem test from gravity oil for its No. 23-148 (originally No. 1) McElroy Ranch Co., discovery producer from the Wolfcamp, basal Permian, lime in western Upton County.

The rating was derived from an 18-hour pumping gauge of 170 barrels of oil, with no water. The well had been treated with 10,000 gallons of acid Nov. 27 through 640 perforations at 7,750 to 8,000 feet in 5 1-2 inch casing cemented at 10,797 feet. It had flowed initially from the Wolfcamp after plugging back to 8,005 feet from the Ellenburger in which it half mile west of Slick-Urschel failed in drilling to 13,977 feet. No. 1 Arvilla E.
