

The present board is appointed by the governor and is confirmed although 80 per cent of Texas by the Senate--while the superintendent is elected by the people. Therefore, as the superintendent



This is true because the superintendent, when any disagreement arises, can is wasting time and space and should be abolished. And the paramount effort of 115 is to coordinate all the factors of State Educationand make them harmonious and effective.
