Casebier Named 112th New District Judge

Garland Casebier, 39 year old Fort Stockton attorney, was named by Gov. Allan Shivers Monday as district judge of the 112th Judicial District.

He succeeds Judge J. B. Randolph, who died last week.

Casebier took the oath of office at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in the district court room at Fort Stockton. Judge Alan Fraser of Alpine administered the oath as friends and officials looked on.

The 112th district includes Kimble, Sutton, Crockett, Upton and Pecos counties.

Casebier's name was one of three or four which had been named in inner circles as possible choices.

Coke Stevenson, former governor, had presided over the district as temporary judge during the illness of Judge Randolph.

A Pecos County resident since he was 18 months old, except for two years he practiced in Wood County, Casebier moves up from the post of Fort Stockton city attorney. His present position and one as assistant county attorney during the war have been his only dips into public life.

Casebier graduated from Sul Ross College with a B. S. degree and studied law at the University of Texas. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Casebier of Fort Stockton.

The newly appointed judge—he received word of his appointment at 4:30 p. m. Monday—is married and the father of two boys, John Andrews, 9, and Frank, 5. His wife is the former Miss Glory Britton of Quitman, an East Texan whom the judge met at Fort Stockton.

Although he will take office Tuesday, Casebier will face an immediate election campaign. District judges' terms run for four years. Judge Randolph would have completed his current term this year.

Clean Up Before Trying To Kill Out Insects

AUSTIN—There is no easy road to the abatement of insects and rodents, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Frequently people get enthusiastic about the destruction of the insects and believe that, if an airplane flew over the town, or if a huge fogging machine rolls through town spreading an insecticide, the insects will be killed instantly and peace from the insect nuisance will remain forever. This is an erroneous and, unfortunately, bad practice, because it creates an unwarranted sense of security.

Before any killing is anticipated, a thorough clean-up of the community should be carried on. This means cleaning up the rubbish and garbage and eliminating all insect feeding and breeding places. It might mean the draining or filling in of wet areas for destruction of the mosquito larvae. When this is done, one will be surprised how few insects are left to become a nuisance and, perhaps, a public health problem.
