



2. He could, if he decided they were necessary, build Co.; CJM Packing Co., and buygovernment plants and factories to produce commodities ers for major packers. of any kind.

3. He could establish priorities for materials, on either P. Lowe of Crane also consigned voluntary or compulsory basis. Mr. Flynn observes, "Here cattle. is the power of life and death over every industrial enterprise in the land.'

He could regulate all exports and imports.

He could establish maximum prices on any materials and facilities.

6. Finally, he could lay down any rules he deemed part of their pay in salt. necessary to make the Act operative. .

These rules would have all the power of law. And, to cap the climax, he could "make such inspection of the books. records and other writings, premises or property of any person and make such investigations and conduct such hearings as may be necessary to appropriate to the enforcement or Of this provision, Mr. Flynn administration of this act." says: "Here is the power of seizure and search upon a hitherto unimaginable scale.

It seems unbelievable that a "dictatorship bill" could ever become the law of this land. It is frightening to think! that such a bill should even be seriously proposed in a free country. 



"Wartime excise taxes, still in effect four and a half years after the war ended, are depressing certain lines of coat sleeves by Frederick the business," says the Houston Press.

"The original chief purpose of these taxes was to dis- wiping their noses on their courage travel and business-as-usual, thus releasing trans- sleeves. portation facilities, manpower and materials for war work. They continue to serve that purpose when all lines of business needs every possible encouragement to produce and sell, thus providing more jobs and more government revenue from individual and corporate income taxes.

The Executive Secretary of the Illinois Federation of Retail Associations said, "If these taxes are not eliminated at once, they are here to stay. They were imposed as a wartime measure, at which time promises were repeatedly that they would be removed after the war. Anything less than outright repeal of them amounts to betrayal." He also said that many retail merchants were reducing handbag lines, discontinuing furs, and cutting jewelry inventories to a bare minimum, because of the adverse influence of the taxes on sales. The depressing effect of this is felt by manufacturers, distributors, labor and everyone else involved.

e is a very important factor in this problem. Retailers find themselves faced with increasing buyer resistance to the affected items, because people are putting off the purchases in th chope that Congress will repeal the taxes. In the interest of our economic welfare, Congress should act without further delay
