Jack Kendrick Gives Vivid Report On Scout Jamboree Trip

Expressing his opinion that word pictures could never describe the trip to the National Jamboree of the Boy Scouts that was held this year at Valley Forge, Jack Kendrick, Crane leader gave some of the highlights of the affair that concerned particularly the boys that went from the surrounding councils.

This being the second National Jamboree and the fifth World Jamboree, the mechanisms were all in perfect shape and although no one was required to do anything, all boys participated voluntarily and with wonderful spirit. Four general area councils were held, with the first on Sunday night when 47 thousand boy scouts and leaders lighting that many candles to make a blaze of light that covered the entire hillside. Mr. Kendrick stated that one scout's exclamation of "WHOOOOOOOO" seemed to be the sentiment of all there.

Leaving San Angelo on June 23, the Crane boys were a part of the Concho Valley Council that included scouts from Crane, Big Lake, Texon, Ozona, Sonora, Rankin and McCamey. Rattlesnake rattlers, horned toads and cactus neckerchief slides with the Texas passports were carried by this group for use in swapping with boys from other parts of the country.

Before reaching the camp grounds a sightseeing trip was made through Washington, D. C. and one day while in camp was spent in Philadelphia. Leaving the camp the group was taken to New York where rides on the subway and a trip through the Statue of Liberty were the outstanding attractions for the local boys. From there the route took them to Niagara Falls and then through Canada for about 200 miles coming back into the States at Detroit.

O. I. Courtney of Big Lake was Scoutmaster of the Troop with Jack Kendrick and Leonard Lee of Texon as assistants. Others in the group were Bobbie Robinson, Hawley Van Court and Darrell Vines of Crane; Charles Blue and Jimmy Lee of Rankin; Sonny Jacobson of McCamey, with 23 other scouts.

ANTELOPE SEASON SET FOR OCTOBER 10

AUSTIN, July 25.—Details of the fall antelope shooting season authorized for October 2 to 10 inclusive, by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, are being worked out, according to the Executive Secretary.

The final number of permits to be issued will be determined after results of the present antelope survey in the area west of the Pecos are compiled.

The Executive Secretary said the number of special permits, which cost \$5 each, probably will be less than the 702 permits issued in 1948, the last season that antelopes were hunted legally.

The total bag that year of male antelope was 629. The Executive Secretary explained that more than 90 per cent of the hunters usually got their antelope.

Hunters again will make their application to the Game Department in Austin. Then, because the number of applicants usually exceeds the number of available permits, drawings are made to designate the lucky nimrods.

The hunt is arranged in three-day periods so that the concentrated game wardens may closely supervise the shoot. The overall hunt covers from 30 to 35 ranches in the nine counties. Ranchers are allotted 20 per cent of the permits so that they may designate friends and their families to the hunt. The kill on the ranches ranges from five to sixty male antelope. The maximum ranchers may charge individuals for each three-day hunt period is \$40. Only one antelope may be killed by each hunter.

**JUNE RETAIL SALES SLIP ONE PER CENT IN MAY; UP 18 PCT. OVER LAST YEAR**

AUSTIN, Texas.—Preliminary tabulations placed Texas retail sales at \$538,398,000 in June, falling 1 per cent from May, but rising 18 per cent from June, 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Total durable goods sales rose 6 per cent in June from May and 31 per cent from June a year ago; while nondurable goods sales slid 8 per cent from May, but stepped up 4 per cent from June, 1949.

Household and appliance stores, up 14 per cent, turned in the largest gain in durable goods sales in June from May; followed by sales—increases in lumber and building material, 8 per cent; automotive sales 7 per cent and farm implements 5 per cent.

May-to-June declines in durable goods were registered in jewelry stores, 9 per cent; and hardware and furniture stores, 1 per cent.

In comparison with June, 1949, durable goods sales, automotive sales climbed 39 per cent in June, 1950; lumber and building material, 38 per cent; farm implements 23 per cent; household and appliance

goods, 8 pct.; furniture, 6 pct.; and jewelry, 1 pct. Sales in the hardware stores slid 3 pct. during this period.

Office, store and school supply dealers turned in the largest increase in sales in the nondurable goods group—6 pct.; followed by filling stations, 5 pct.; and food stores, up fractionally.

Monthly decreases in nondurable goods sales were recorded in florists shops, 35 pct.; department stores, 29 pct.; apparel stores, 16 pct.; general merchandise stores and drug stores, 5 pct.; country general stores, 2 pct.; and eating and drinking places, 1 pct.

**Arson Suspected In Costly Fires To Andrews Property**

Arson is suspected in the burning last Thursday morning of the old Tubbs Ranch headquarters house, barn and garage, located about 1 1/2 miles south of the old Gulf Camp in the Sand Hills. The fire was first discovered at 1:15 by men on the Gulf lease who notified Vincent Andrews, who lived in the house.

Mr. Andrews had driven by the Gulf Store to buy groceries when told of the fire.

The house and barn are about 75 yards apart and the garage is approximately 75 feet from the house and there was no stiff wind to have caused all the buildings to burn simultaneously unless they were set on fire, according to M. E. Lear, Sheriff.

Mr. Andrews, who was unopposed for the office of Commissioner of Crane County from Precinct 2, lost everything in the buildings.

The following morning a house located at the McElroy strip in Crane was partially destroyed when it caught on fire about 5 a.m. The house was owned by Joe Elles and occupied by an elderly man who lived there alone.

Defective wiring is given as the probable cause of the fire. The quick response of the Crane Volunteer Fire Department saved the building to some extent.

No More Swatting Of These Pesky Flies If The Advice Of S. D. Plumber Is Followed

You can throw away your swatter, lady, the flies won't bother you. That is, they won't if you do what's been tested by two Tularosa housewives after reading an article about a seemingly sure-fire trick, which appeared in the Deadwood, S. D., paper.

The solution to the whole problem of the house fly is wads of cotton. So say the housewives, and so, says the article.

Mrs. C. A. Green, one of the Tularosa housewives, received a copy of the Deadwood Pioneer from her mother. In it she found the following article written by H. W. Nichols for United Press.

The department of agriculture is interested in a new way to shoo flies—so they won't come back. The department interest stems from the annoyance Mrs. C. S. Gilbert of Richmond, Va., worked up last summer against a passel of flies.

FLY BATTLE

One day she called in a man to fit the water heater and mentioned about her "fly battle". The heater man said not to worry about a thing. Just put a few wads of cotton on the screen door.

The lady didn't believe him and kept on fanning the swatter. That wasn't getting rid of very many flies, so finally in desperation, she decided to do things the heater man's way.

Mrs. Gilbert pitched away the swatter and reached for a box of cotton. She knotted a wad and stuck it through the screen with a bobby pin. She glued some on the front door and on the back door.

The word got around Richmond. Pretty soon, every cottage in the town was decorated with cotton-dotted screens.

Folks called to ask for information, and to learn the name of the water heater man. He eventually was identified as F. X. Thompson. Mrs. G. didn't know why the flies left; neither did Mr. T.

Scientists came to Mrs. Gilbert's door—like flies. One was G. T. French, state entomologist, who was wearing a "show-me" look on his face. He saw no flies on the Gilbert door and concluded that certain colors are against the grain of insects. In this case it was white.

Some local merchants quickly fell in love with Mrs. Gilbert after the word got around. They sold lots of cotton.

Agriculture Secretary C. F. Brannan had no comment. But an aide said maybe he had the solution: (1) The flies may think cotton is their dreaded enemy, the moth; (2) the dumb flies think the cotton in the screen doors is a spider web—Alamogordo News.

Regan, Moss Win Run-Off Places In August Balloting

Rep. Ken Regan of Midland and Judge Paul Moss of Odessa, fought their way into the August 26 run-offs in the heated race for Congress in the balloting last week.

Incomplete tabulations from the Texas Election Bureau in Dallas Tuesday showed Regan leading Moss by 4,278 votes. The tally at the time showed the following with 16 of the 19 counties complete: Regan 22,299; Moss 18,021 and Hervey 8,895.

The key to the eventual winner seems to lie around two factors. First, who will get most of votes that went to Fred Hervey in the primary, and second, who will get the largest number of their supporters to the polls in the August voting.

With many of the important local races decided last Saturday, it is doubtful that 50,000 voters will again make the trip to the polls in August. Just who would benefit by light balloting, no one would even give an opinion, but an all out effort will be made by the two contenders during the coming weeks to organize their support to get the people to the polls on August 26 is assured.

McCamey Shell Pump Station Increases Load

The Shell Pipe Line Company's pump station near McCamey, which has been served by West Texas Utilities Company's 12 K. V. substation since 1928, has been reported as increasing its load. Two 400 h.p. pumping units are being added to this station to pump oil to the Humble Station near Big Lake. Before it was enlarged it consisted of three 400 h.p. units on the Cushing line, three 300 h.p. units on the Houston line. Some of these are spare units.

The demand of the substation now runs a peak of approximately 1100 KW and it is expected to increase to about 1600 KW or probably 1700 KW which will fully load the 2000 KVA substation. The Shell's increase in power requirements at this location is making it necessary to extend another 12 KV feeder circuit from the McCamey substation.
