Second Draft Call Issued; Local 121 Asked For Twelve More Men

A MASS OF FIGURES

In this second article relative to the potential cost of operation of a County Hospital, we have a mass of figures to report to El Paso for their phyfrom the office of the County Auditor of Crane County as sical examinations on August 18. to their experience in operation.

The statistical sheet in the office showed that the institution cost the county \$62,893.59 for the first year of operation, ending in October of the past year. The sheet supplied for their examinations. the following data:

Inquiring with other county officials, we learned that all of the "gold trimmings" have been eliminated since the end of the first year of operation. So with this information, we inquired as to what the present personnel of the hospital consisted. Here is what they HAVE TO HAVE to maintain the hospital to meet standards:

We thought that these figures might also be of interest to the property taxpayers of Upton County.

On a visit to the hospital for further information, other to his death. facts were found that might prove of some interest. That is in regard to patients.

From the records, we found that during the past month, 47 patients had entered the hospital, and of this number only Odessa Wednesday morning, with 26 were from Crane County. McCamey had accounted for burial at the Moran Cemetery 13 of the patients, while Odessa had four admitted. On July 31, there were two patients in the hospital.

The hospital informants said that July was an average ed stay following the burial. month as far as McCamey patients were concerned in ratio to the total admitted; therefore, it wouldn't be out of proportion to say that McCamey is furnishing about one-fourth of the patients to the hospital.

Asked, "What effect do you think a County Hospital in McCamey would have on your institution?" we were informed that it would probably cause only fewer patients for their hospital . . . and less revenue.

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RUSSIAN WHO-DONE-IT

Who invented the electric light? If you say Edison, you are wrong-it was a Russian named Yablochkov. Who devised the telegraph? If you say Morse, you're wrong againit was another Russian named Yakobi. The radio? No, it wasn't Marconi-it was still another Russian named Popov. How about the first successful flying machine? If you answer "the Wright brothers," you'll have to go the bottom of the class—a Russian called Mozhaisky flew like a bird near St. Petergburg 20 years before the Wrights took off at Kitty Hawk.

These, and similar revelations, are discovered by Edmund Stevens in the Christian Science Monitor. He found them in a Soviet magazine called the Literary Gazette. They show, he says, one of the ways the Soviety party "woos the Russian national pride. The move corresponds to a vital need of Russians to vindicate their self-respect and destroy the residue of an old sense of inferiority. It also increases the Russians' confidence in their capacity to catch up with and outstrip the rest of the world technically at the present time." It is, in other words, an example of the kind of morale-building propaganda the government is now feeding the Russian masses

Moreover, it is an example of how the Soviet bosses will use any untruth or half-truth to serve their ends. A story has been going the rounds concerning a British Communist who went to a meeting of Russian strategists in Moscow. He was perplexed as to how to argue some ideological point or other in England. The Russians gave him an answer, to which he objected that it wasn't true. The Russians looked at him in amazement-and then burst into gales of laughter over such naivete. It is said that the incident was described to the top Russians, including Stalin, and that they burst into laughter also.

This story may be apocryphal but it has a point. Communist thinking holds that the end justifies the use of any means. If a lie will work, it is told. Words are twisted out of all semblence to what they mean to other nations. That is touched on in General Walter Bedell Smith's revelations of his experiences as Ambassador to Moscow, which appeared serially in the Saturday Evening Post and are now out in book form. He, Secretary Marshall, and other Americans he says, "Naively assumed that the word 'democracy' means the same thing to the Politburo that it did to us." Events proved that nothing could have been more wrong. The Russians gave 'democracy' a new meaning which suited them, and thus managed to give interpretations to international agreements which were the exact opposite of what the West had intended. This policy is one of the principal reasons of PARTNERSHIP for our failure to meet the Russians on common ground."

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


